PURPOSE I.

To satisfy a request by Congressman Bob McClory (R-Ill) for the President to meet with Messrs. Rowland and Kelly, cousin and grandson of the founder of Goelitz Confectionary Company, of Chicago, which is supplying the President with jelly beans.

II. BACKGROUND

The President's jelly beans are being supplied by Goelitz Confectionary Company, which is located in Representative McClory's district in northeastern Illinois. McClory has represented this strong Republican district since 1963, after service in the Illinois General Assembly.

Bob McClory is the ranking Republican on the House Judiciary Committee. The Judiciary Committee will be considering legislation regarding Regulatory Reform, the Criminal Code Revision, Fair Housing Enforcement, the Voting Rights Act, Immigration and Refugee Policy, and various constitutional amendments. Mr. McClory has previously suggested that the new Administration defer initiatives on controversial constitutional amendments in order to concentrate its efforts on our economic woes.

Mr. McClory will be a strong supporter of regulatory reform and a strong supporter of Republican positions on other issues.

Mr. Rowland, who makes jelly beans in California and previously supplied the President, and Mr. Kelly will present the President with a supply of jelly beans.

I am grateful that all of you could come here today.

I hope the briefing so far has been a productive one for you. I know it is helpful to us.

The task before us is enormous. We <u>are</u> on the brink of an economic calamity, but it is not our economic system which is at fault. The American system is sound. Our job is to get back to the concepts on which our Republic was founded. One of the first priorities is a return to the idea of federalism, a concept basic to our Constitution.

Those of you in State legislatures and those of you in township and county government work every day in the very laboratories of democracy. You are the representatives closest to the people. You are the officials who see first-hand the programs that work and those that don't. You are the people who know best what is good for your States and your communities.

I have long believed State and local governments often can be more efficient and responsive than the Federal bureaucracy. Programs administered at that level of government can be better targeted to benefit intended recipients and not a host of anonymous bureaucrats. I plan to transfer as many programs as are appropriate to your responsibility, along with the tax resources to finance them. The tax cuts I am proposing will make a larger tax base available to you.

It will take all of us working together to turn things around. Together, we <u>can</u> turn them around, and I have asked you here today to enlist you in this common endeavor. I would like to get your guidance as we finalize the plans for the comprehensive economic package I will submit to Congress next week, and then continue to work with you as we work to put it into effect.

I know you have been spending a great deal of time with my senior economic advisers this afternoon doing just that, but I would like to hear from you directly. I am going to open the floor, now, because we need to hear <u>your</u> comments.
