PURPOSE: To enable you to participate in the "Days of Remembrance of Victims of the Holocaust" observance; conducted under the auspices of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council, which was established on October 7, 1980.

BACKGROUND: Established by Public Law 96-388, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council is tasked with providing appropriate observances on an annual, national and civic basis to commemorate the Days of Remembrance. They are also to plan, construct and oversee the operation of a permanent living memorial museum; as well as plan for carrying out the recommendations of the 9/27/79 Report of the President's Commission on the Holocaust.

President Carter addressed the first observance, held in the Capitol Rotunda, on April 24, 1979. He also spoke before the President's Commission on the Holocaust and guests in the East Room on the occasion of the submission of this 9/27/79 report. Yours will be the first Presidential participation in a Days of Remembrance observance to be held at the White House. The Jewish community considers your acceptance of this request to be a gesture of the highest order. This is a solemn, reverential observance and not a religious event.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL COUNCIL DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY REMARKS
APRIL 30, 1981

IT IS A PARTICULAR PLEASURE FOR ME TO BE WITH YOU TODAY. THIS CEREMONY HAS MEANING NOT ONLY FOR JEWISH PEOPLE AND THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN PERSECUTED, BUT FOR ALL OF US WHO WANT TO PREVENT ANOTHER HOLOCAUST.

JEREMIAH WROTE OF DAYS WHEN JEWS WERE CARRIED OFF TO BABYLON, AND JERUSALEM WAS DESTROYED. JERUSALEM "WEEPS IN THE NIGHT, AND TEARS RUN DOWN HER CHEEKS," HE SAID.

THE HOPE OF OUR CEREMONY TODAY IS THAT EVEN A TORTURED PAST HOLDS PROMISE IF WE LEARN ITS LESSONS. ACCORDING TO ISAIAH, THERE WILL BE A NEW HEAVEN AND A NEW EARTH, AND THE VOICE OF WEEPING WILL BE HEARD NO MORE.

Carl Pursell - R

Plymouth, Michigan, southeast Michigan, southeast section of the state, 2nd District. 3rd term. Serves on Appropriations Committee (Transportation and Labor, HHS, Education, and Related Agencies Subcommittees).

As Co-chairman of the N.E.-Midwest Coalition, Pursell has actively raised questions implying that the economic package discriminates against the "frost belt." Michigan's high unemployment and the auto industry's health are major concerns. He is close to Governor Milliken and claims that he is only concerned about the way that Michigan is treated by the economic package.

In his conversation with you, Tauke reiterated his hope that the Administration would work with Members from all sections of the country and not forget about the problems of the Northeast and Midwest.

Harold "Cap" Hollenbeck-R

East Rutherford, New Jersey
(parts of Bergen and Hudson Counties)
9th District, 3rd term. Serves on
the Science and Technology Committee
and the Committee on Standards of
Official Conduct. Previously uncom-
mitted on the bipartisan Budget
substitute, ostensibly due to his
concern that it may not have a bene-
ficial impact on the Northeast.
Has been contacted twice by Secretary
Donovan and three times by White House
Legislative Affairs staff.

Bill Green - R

New York City, New York, silk-stocking district, 18th District, 2nd term. Serves on the Appropriations Committee. Concerned about spending decreases in urban programs such as mass transit, housing, and urban renewal. Also that additional spending cuts in bipartisan budget proposal are at expense of Northeast.

The Congressman traveled with you on Air Force I on March 13, 1981.

The Congressman has been extremely helpful to you during the recent markup of your rescission requests before the Appropriations Subcommittee on HUD.

Peggy Heckler - R

Wellesley, Massachusetts, southeast part of the state including Fall River, 10th District. 8th term. Her district includes Boston suburbs in the north and Fall River, the district's largest city in the south. This district may be redrawn, pitting her against Barney Frank, a liberal sophomore Democrat from Brookline, Massachusetts. She serves on the Science and Technology and Veterans' Affairs Committees.

The Congresswoman is Co-chairman of the Congresswomen's Caucus. She has requested on several occasions a meeting with the President to discuss the appointment of women in the Administration.

The President discussed the budget resolution with Peggy the week of April 20, 1981. She is concerned that the Gramm-Latta resolution discriminates against the northeast corridor (in comparison to Jones' proposal) and that a vote for the Administration's bipartisan package will jeopardize her probable fight against Frank.

Matt Rinaldo - R

Union, New Jersey, Southwest of greater Newark, northeastern section of state, 12th District. 5th term. Serves on House Energy and Commerce Committee and the Select Committee on Aging.

As he indicated in his telephone conversation with you he has a Democratic district and is sensitive to labor issues. Rinaldo wants to support you but remained undecided, as he historically does on tough votes.
