#### I. PURPOSE

To discuss legislative strategy on the tax bill, reconciliation and block grants. Also, to receive the Senate and House reports from the Republican leaders.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Tax bill:

House Ways and Means and Senate Finance have conducted hearings on the President's tax reduction proposals. Ways and Means is scheduled to start mark-up, possibly next week.

Reconciliation:

House committees have until June 12 to achieve their various spending cuts mandated under the Budget Resolution. House Democrats are mobilizing to break the Budget Resolution ceiling by restoring and adding programs cut by the Resolution. Dave Stockman proposes to defeat the Democratic strategy by a vote on the House Floor.

Block Grants:

The President's four Block Grant proposals (Health, Education, Social Services and Emergency Hardship Assistance) have been rejected by the House Energy and Commerce Committee, House Ways and Means, and House Education and Labor. In the Senate, all four Block Grant proposals are snagged in Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee. To recoup these losses, Dave Stockman is proposing to consider Block Grants under the reconciliation process when the measure comes before the House for a Floor vote. In the Senate, negotiation is continuing with the Labor and Human Resources Committee

#### I. PURPOSE

This meeting of the Cabinet was scheduled to discuss the sale of surplus butter stocks and review our progress on waste, fraud and abuse.

#### II. BACKGROUND

The principal issue being dealt with in this Cabinet meeting is the recommendation from the Department of Agriculture to sell surplus butter stocks. This matter has been under review since early May; however, there are differences among Cabinet members which should be reviewed prior to a decision.

The attached papers explain the views of USDA, NSC, and State. The views may be summarized as follows:

USDA -- The Department is proposing the sale of up to 100,000 tons of surplus butter prior to its turning to lard. Selling it at the present time would take advantage of a world market condition in which other butter suppliers are out of stocks. Such a sale now would also provide some degree of revenue to the Treasury.

OMB -- Concurs in the USDA recommendation.

State - Opposes USDA's recommendation because the major potential buyer for our butter exports either directly or through a third party would be the Soviet Union. State believes the Administration would be criticized for selling subsidized butter to the Soviets at prices significantly lower than those charged U.S. customers. Such a sale could hurt, in State's view, our trade relationships with other countries.

NSC -- NSC opposes USDA's recommendation because it would undercut our East-West trade policy and be misunderstood by our allies.

USTR -- While originally concerned about reaction among our allies, Bill Brock has satisfied himself that the reaction would not be significantly adverse and is in support of USDA's recommendation to sell the butter stocks.

- I. <u>SUBJECT</u>: Sale of Surplus Butter Stocks (Commodity Credit Corporation)
- II. ORIGINATOR: Richard E. Lyng, Deputy Secretary
- III. ACTION FORCING EVENTS: This matter has been under inter-departmental and White House review for some time.
  - IV. <u>STATEMENT OF THE ISSUE</u>: USDA seeks approval of the sale of 100,000 tons of surplus CCC butter stock for export.

CCC butter would be sold to the highest bidder but at prices no lower than the prevailing "world price." Successful bidders (exporting firms) would be free to specify the final export destination. The alternative, it seems to us, is to have huge quantities begin to turn rancid and be almost a total loss.

#### V. ANALYSIS:

- A. Rationale for making the sales at this time:
- 1. CCC is utilizing all existing domestic outlets, yet uncommitted butter inventories presently are approximately 200,000 tons and continue to increase by approximately 8-9 million pounds each week.
- 2. The cost of carrying these surplus stocks is burdensome, storage capacity is severely taxed, and some of the butter could soon go out of condition.
- 3. Presently all traditional suppliers of butter for the world market are virtually out of exportable stocks, thereby permitting a "window" for sale of CCC butter without creating adverse effects upon the world price for butter.
- 4. This action is consistent with current Administration initiatives to affect necessary changes in the dairy support program in order to avoid future buildups of CCC dairy inventories as was permitted during the previous Administration.

- B. A number of concerns have been expressed:
- 1. This action will stimulate criticism that the U.S. is making butter available to consumers in foreign countries (including the Soviet Union) at prices far lower than to our domestic consumer.
- 2. Such action will make the U.S. Administration initiatives more difficult when voicing objections about the unfair trade policies of other nations i.e., Japanese rice sales, EC wheat subsidies, etc.
  - 3. This action may be in violation of GATT subsidy rules.
- 4. This action will annoy some of our trading partners, especially New Zealand.
- VI. <u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: The USDA recognizes the validity of the above mentioned concerns. Notwithstanding these considerations, <u>we strongly recommend the approval of this action</u>.
