MEETING WITH PRESIDENTS OF LABOR UNIONS  
JUNE 11, 1981

Good morning. I'm very glad you could all come. I don't want to make you sit through a long-winded speech, because I think it will be much better if we could have a dialogue. But I did want to say how very much I appreciated your support for our economic recovery program.

You know it's always been a source of pride to me that I hold a lifetime membership in an AFL-CIO union. I mention this only because I want you to know how much I understand, and agree with you when you say, "What's good for workers is good for America."

Frankly, I believe our goals are the same: Reduce unemployment, create jobs, and improve your members' paychecks while bringing down interest rates and inflation, so they can afford to buy their own homes and send their children to college.

We all know we have to support the people at the bottom of the ladder, and of course the people at the top can take care of themselves. But what I keep trying to point out is that the man who's been largely forgotten is that fellow who built the ladder in the first place.

That's why, in addition to the budget cuts already approved, we really need a multi-year, across-the-board tax rate reduction of 25 percent for every American worker.



Without a reduction at least that large, workers are going to be hurt very badly by the huge tax increases built into the system by the last Administration. That's what the tax debate is all about. So if you can just help us pass our tax proposal, then we'll know that your members will finally have a real chance to get ahead again.

In that spirit, I'd really appreciate hearing your suggestions now as to how we can best communicate this information to the working men and women of America. So please feel free to give me your ideas.

RECEPTION: NON-FEDERAL SUPPORTERS OF ECONOMIC PROGRAM  
JUNE 11, 1981

Well thank you. My goodness, I never even got an ovation like that when I was George Gipp. Believe me, it's reciprocal, because Nancy and I have been looking forward to meeting you today and welcoming you to the White House.

You know back around the turn of the century, an English gentleman named Samuel Butler remarked that the advantage of doing one's praising for oneself, is that one can lay it on so thick -- and in exactly the right places. Well, I did come to give some generous praise, but not to myself, or to anyone in our Administration. I came to pay tribute to you -- the new Superstars of American grass roots politics.

In looking at your list, I saw that you represent a cross-section of Americans from all backgrounds and different regions of the country. In fact, you remind me very much of that one special interest group I spoke of on Inauguration Day -- the one too long neglected which really needs help -- "We the people."

And that seems perfect, because thanks to your efforts supporting the Gramm-Latta spending resolution, you gave all our people a tremendous victory. Not a victory for one party, but for more bipartisan cooperation, and for less inflation, and for a Government that, finally, will begin living within its means again.

The bottom line is that millions of Americans are renewing their faith in our political system - all those

people who had waited so long just to have someone in Washington listen, and care, and take action. So from all of them to all of you, may I say, simply, thank you for what you did for your country.

Now before you start feeling too good, I must confess I'm not letting you out of here scot-free. Because we need your help with another, vital, bipartisan piece of legislation . . . and I think you know what I'm driving at. We absolutely must have an across-the-board, three-year, 25 percent rate reduction for every American taxpayer. And we're not going to settle for less.

There are those who demand we settle for less, and who demand proof in advance that what we propose will work. Well, history demonstrates clearly that tax rate reductions do work. On the other hand, we're living with the proof that what they want to continue doing not only has not worked, but will never work. So I wonder if you'd agree with me that those who brought about our present economic mess, are not automatically, simply by virtue of having done that, now qualified to bring an end to it? And I wonder why they never answer the one question I keep asking: Why is it inflationary if you keep your money, but not inflationary if Government takes it and spends every last cent?

Their alternative in no way compensates for the huge tax increases built into the system over the next three years. Yet we're asked to believe their proposal is more compassionate to working people. Who's kidding whom?

Let's cut through the fog. Our opponents want more money from your family budgets so spending on the Federal budget can remain high. It's that simple. Well, maybe it's time millions of you remind them of a few simple facts: That it's your money . . . not theirs. That you earned it . . . they didn't. And that you have every right to keep it . . . and they have no right to keep taking more of it away. And when they insist we can't reduce taxes, spending, and balance the budget too, one six word answer will do: "Yes We Can! Yes We Will!"

For too long, Government has stood in the way, taking more of what our people earn, no matter how hard they try. It's almost become economics without a soul.

That's why the ultimate goal of everything we're trying to do is to give this economy back to you the American people. You're the most valuable resource we have, and you're the ones who can save our future. Some say the future looks impossible, filled with danger and uncertainty and scarcity.

But the future has always looked bleak, until people with brains, and faith, and courage, who dreamed and dared to take great risks, found a way to make it better. People like Robert Fulton, and Eli Whitney, and Thomas Edison, and Henry Ford and Albert Einstein. Einstein himself gave us the formula when he said: "Everything that is really great and inspiring was created by individuals who labor in freedom."

So our message today is simply: Help us to pass these incentives so we can help you. We want nothing more than to turn you loose so you can make the 1980's the most exciting, successful decade our Nation has ever known. Years of renaissance for America's entrepreneurs. Years when millions of free men and women went out and found the energy to make us secure . . . created revolutionary technological breakthroughs .. rebuilt our inner cities, and in the process, created millions of new jobs, stronger families, and real hope for young Americans everywhere.

That's the kind of country I want to leave for our children, and I know you do too. And if we keep working together, just like we have, I know we're going to succeed and save that American dream we all love.
