PURPOSE: To promote, and request support for, the tax package in the Polish American community and to solicit comments on how to communicate the goals of the economic program to Polish Americans.

BACKGROUND: It is estimated there are 6 million Americans of Polish descent. They have significant political influence in key geographic areas, eg. Chicago, New Jersey, Pennsylvania. Their support for the tax package is important because of the influence they wield in their communities. Issues that concern them are: the growing numbers of Polish refugees fleeing to Austria and the hope that the U.S. can help ease the situation; and the lack of Polish American appointees to positions in the Administration.

They will be assembled at 10:15 and have had a foreign policy briefing by the Vice President and a tax package briefing by Norm Ture, Assistant Secretary of Treasury for Tax Policy.

POLISH AMERICAN

TALKING POINTS

- I'm aware that Polish Americans traditionally have not been Republicans, and I assume that holds for a number of you in this room as well. But you have been among the staunchest of Americans and that is how I seek your support today.
- You know the economic crisis we face. You've seen what taxes and inflation have done to the family budgets, not to mention the Federal budget.
- America's ethnic groups are renowned for their diligence, self-reliance, and faith in the future. Some of you perhaps, and certainly your forebears, came to this country with little. But hard work, sacrifice, faith in your God and yourselves made your communities prosper.
- We need to re-awaken that spirit. You can help, in our program to reduce the size of government and lower the tax burden on the American people.
- The tax bill will benefit small businessmen, which so many Polish Americans are.
- The estate tax provisions of the bill will enable you to pass along your hard-earned accumulated earnings and investments to your families, and not have the largest portion go to the Federal government.
- In short, the tax program is aimed to help you and all Polish Americans who have worked so hard to build a better America.
- Before closing, let me say I know the concern some of you have about appointments of Polish Americans to positions in this Administration.
- We are constantly seeking qualified individuals and will increase our efforts to identify Polish Americans to fill some of these positions.
- I believe we all are proud of General Ed Rowny and I know he will do a brilliant job as our Chief Arms Negotiator.
- We will continue to look for other individuals like General Rowny who contribute so much to this government and this Administration.
- Finally, let me assure you that we are keeping a close watch on the situation in Poland. We are aware of the growing refugee problem in Austria and will be looking at ways to ease the burden on those who are fleeing. And may I commend you for the work you have done in raising money for food and medicines to be sent to the people of Poland.

ITALIAN AMERICAN

TALKING POINTS

- When I spoke to many of you at the Foundation's dinner last September here in Washington, I emphasized that, the one thing more than any other, in which Italian-Americans can take pride, is their love and respect for the family.
- One of the things our tax program will do, if enacted, is help families better manage their own lives. The estate tax provisions especially will help in this regard.
- The small business provisions can help revitalize our neighborhoods and the reductions on individual tax rates will give each wage earner in the family more money to do with as he chooses.
- Ethnic groups, like Italian Americans, are known as those who save, and plan for the future. This is the history of their success here in America.
- I know that Italian Americans, including those of you in this room, traditionally have not been Republicans. But your group is among the most loyal of Americans and it is as Americans that I urge you to support my economic program. Our countries economic revitalization may depend upon your help and support.
- Our wish is to restore initiative and a sense of purpose by removing, wherever possible, federal interference from your lives.
- Now let me talk on another point: I know the question of appointments is on your minds. I know there was concern originally over my nomination of Max Rabb, but I'm happy to learn of your endorsement of Max and your offer to support him in that position.
- Regarding other areas, we are continually seeking to place Italian-Americans in high level positions in the government. To date, there have been 15 Presidential level appointments and 5 Italian Americans are serving in high level posts on the White House staff.
- We're not through yet, and we will continue to seek out well-qualified individuals in our efforts to bring the best into government service.
- This is a great country and with your continued help and support, we'll make it an even better one.

I. PURPOSE

To meet with Senator Robert Packwood (R-Ore.), Chairman of the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee, to discuss S. 898, a comprehensive regulatory reform bill for the domestic telecommunications industry.

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Packwood has introduced S. 898 in the Senate, but Representative Jim Broyhill (R-N.C.), the original author of the legislation in the previous Congress, has not introduced the bill this session and is uncertain about whether this Administration should lend support. The bill, highly sensitive and controversial, would essentially allow AT&T to get into new fields. Major computer firms, newspapers and television interests oppose the bill. Secretary Baldrige has testified in support of the general thrust of the legislation. (See Tab A)
