TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH SMALL BUSINESS

- Your visit, through the auspices of Elizabeth's office, is a very welcome one indeed. Few groups are as close to my heart as the small businessmen and women of America. II. BACKGROUND

The centennial of Franklin D. Roosevelt's birth is January 30, 1982. A committee has been formed to commemorate this occasion.

John Roosevelt, who passed away in April, 1981, had invited the President to lay a wreath at the former President's grave on January 30th. Mr. James Roosevelt may re-issue that invitation.

James Roosevelt may also mention his desire to be reappointed to the President's Commission on Executive Exchange. Lyn Nofziger's office indicates that he will be appointed to a third term on the Commission.

Although a life-long Democrat, James Roosevelt supported the Reagan-Bush ticket in 1980. In a recent letter he sent to the President inviting him to attend Chapman College's Founder's Day, Mr. Roosevelt recounts finding a quote of his father's while browsing through some old books: "Are you better off than you were last year?" Reminded of the President's campaign slogan, "Are you better off than you were four years ago," Mr. Roosevelt wrote, "How strongly I feel that if the question is asked again, we will be able to say, 'Yes, we are!'"
