TALKING POINTS: PRIVATE SECTOR INITIATIVES BREAKFAST
SEPTEMBER 21, 1981

- Good morning. I hope you enjoy your breakfast here at the White House -- we've tried to strain the Medflies out of the orange juice.
- Over the past 20 years, the bureaucracy has replaced individual and community responsibility for dealing with local problems. And the more massive the Government intrusion, the less satisfying the results in terms of truly helping people.
- If you look closely at what makes programs effective, it is not the infusion of Federal dollars, but the infusion of private initiative. We in the Administration intend to reverse the trend of Government intervention and instead strengthen private leadership in the community.
- The community, better than Washington, knows what its own problems are and how best to solve them. And it is in the private sector that the most creative and energetic solutions are found.
- I am establishing a Presidential Task Force on private sector initiatives to be made up of leaders from the

corporate, foundation and voluntary sector, who will take the lead in encouraging private solutions to community problems.

-- I am instructing the Cabinet to conduct a review of programs, regulations, and statutes to identify barriers to private sector involvement. We also intend to create incentives through public/private partnerships to invest in areas like low-income housing, mass transit and health promotion for employees.

-- I also intend to speak out on this subject and raise its importance both inside and outside the Administration. It is essential that Americans not rely on the attitude, "Well, let Uncle Sam do it."

-- Now since those of you in this room have already demonstrated your commitment to a strong private sector, I would like to hear what you have to say.....

Features of the President's Private Sector Initiatives Program

1. Dialogue opened with private sector leaders at breakfast meeting Monday, September 21, 1981.
2. President makes major address on this subject before the National Alliance of Businessmen, Monday, October 5, 1981.
3. Presidential Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives will be appointed to highlight and promote examples of private sector leadership and recommend how government impediments to private sector investment can be removed.
4. A private sector initiatives "Goodwill Ambassador" will be appointed to represent the President in speaking engagements, to make special reports to the Cabinet and to chair the Task Force.
5. President will ask the Cabinet to identify impediments to private sector investment and involvement in each agency area and take specific action to correct these barriers and replace them with incentives for private sector involvement. Initial report due to the President within six months.
6. Senior White house staff will begin monthly meetings with private sector leaders on specific issues to promote leadership.
7. National "Volunteer of the Year" awards will be elevated to the Presidential award level with recognition dinner each April.
8. Joint ACTION/White House one day meetings will be conducted in six cities to promote the role of volunteers from the workplace, churches, unions and other sectors.
9. A series of successful private sector project leaders will be invited to the White House to discuss their efforts with Senior Staff and to be congratulated by the President.

Biographical Sketches

William Aramony

A life-long leader in community service organizations, Mr. Aramony is presently President of the United Way of America. He also is a trustee of the National Council on Philanthropy and Secretary-General of the International Council of United Fund Raising.

William J. Baroody, Jr.

Mr. Baroody is President of the public policy think tank, American Enterprise Institute. He assumed this role in 1978 after having served as the first Director, Office of Public Liaison at the White House and in several positions at the Department of Defense, as well as with the Congress. AEI is conducting on-going research of society's mediating structures (i.e., church, family, etc.) and their role in addressing community problems and is organizing a special study of private sector initiatives.

William S. Bricker

Mr. Bricker is National Director of the Boys Club of America, a century-old movement comprised of 1100 clubs serving one million young people. Chartered by Congress, Boys Club helps disadvantaged youth to realize their potential for growth and development. Mr. Bricker has spent his entire career working for young people and is strongly committed to private sector, self-help efforts.

John H. Filer

Mr. Filer became Chairman of Aetna Life and Casualty, the largest publicly-owned insurance corporation in 1972. He is widely known as Chairman of the Commission on Private Philanthropy and Public Needs (known as the Filer Commission), and for his active role in the National Alliance for Businessmen (Chairman); and the Clearinghouse on Corporate Social Responsibility, an insurance industry coalition addressing community issues.

Jean L. Harris, M.D.

Currently, Dr. Jean Harris is Secretary of Human Resources for the Commonwealth of Virginia. She was formerly a Professor in the Department of Family Practice at the Medical College of Virginia. Active in numerous community organizations, she is the President of the Southern Institute for Human Resources, Chairman of the Virginia State Task Force on Women and Alcoholism, and Vice-Chairman of the National Commission on Alcoholism and Alcohol-Related Diseases. She is the recipient of virtually countless awards for her outstanding contributions to medicine and mental health.

John E. Jacob

Mr. Jacob is presently serving as Executive Vice President of the National Urban League. He has held various posts within the Urban League since 1965. Other organizations in which he has been active include: Howard University Board of Trustees, Timely Investment Club, and various California state associations.

Donald E. Kendall

Mr. Kendall, chairman and CEO of PepsiCo Inc. Serves as the Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. In addition to serving on the board of over a dozen companies and organizations, Kendall has served as Chairman of NAB, National Center for Resource Recovery, and the Emergency Committee for American Trade.

Robert D. Lilley

Until his retirement in 1976, Mr. Lilley was President of AT&T. He is a Trustee Emeritus of Columbia University, a trustee of the Victoria Foundation, and a director of several corporations. He is also Chairman of the Local Initiatives Support Corporation, which is a widely supported venture to stimulate private investment in community development projects.

Henry Lucas, Jr., D.D.S.

Former Chairman of the National Black Republican Council, Dr. Henry Lucas currently chairs the New Coalition for Economic and Social Change. A dentist, he has been active in numerous medical and dental associations. In 1976, Ebony magazine selected him as one of the 100 most influential Black Americans.

Leslie L. Luttgens

Mrs. Luttgens is Chairman, Council on Foundations. She serves on the board of several Bay Area corporations and is the former President of the Recovery Foundation. Mrs. Luttgens has spent 30 years in the voluntary sector and is committed to discovering new methods of funding local community problems.

Cornell C. Maier

Mr. Maier is Chairman, President, and CEO of Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation. Joining Kaiser in 1949, his experience has included responsibility for sales, plant management, division management and corporate planning. Mr. Maier is Chairman of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, a member of the Business Round Table and a director of the National Urban League.

Under Mr. Maier's leadership, Kaiser has adopted Oakland, its headquarter's city, by initiating a jobs program for the disadvantaged and forming partnerships with public schools and the University. Kaiser has also launched a national media campaign urging other firms to develop jobs for inner city youth.

Jeremiah Milbank

Mr. Milbank is the President and founder of the J.M. Foundation. He also is President of Cypress Woods Corporation, Director of International Minerals and Chemicals Corporation, Vice President of Boys Club of America, President of ICD Rehabilitation and Research Center and was Financial Chairman of the Republican National Committee from 1969-1972.

Elder Thomas S. Monson

For nearly eighteen years Elder Monson has served on the Council of Twelve Apostles of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints. In addition to multiple committee assignments, he serves as First Vice Chairman of the General Church Welfare Committee, which directs all welfare activities for LDS worldwide. Professionally, Elder Monson has had a distinguished career in publishing and printing. He is President and Chairman of the Board of the Deseret News Publishing Company and is a former member of the Board of Directors of Printing Industry of America. He also serves as a member of the National Executive Board, Boy Scouts of America and is a member of numerous state and local volunteer groups.

James S. Munn

Mr. Munn is a partner with the firm Kargianis and Austin. In addition to serving on the executive boards of several companies, Mr. Munn has been very active politically and with civic organizations in Washington state. Together with other business and community leaders, he has organized the Northwest Institute for Private Giving and Voluntary Action.

William C. Norris

Mr. Norris founded Control Data Corporation in 1957 as a pioneer in computer technology. Today it has sales of \$3 billion and assets of \$6 billion. Mr. Norris has a strong interest in small business and organized the Northwest Growth Fund and the Minnesota Seed Capital Fund. As an advocate of

corporate initiatives in solving community problems, Control Data has programs in education (PLATO system) health, agriculture, technology exchange and Rural Venture which plan and manage revitalization efforts for inner cities and poverty-stricken rural areas.

Juan J. Patlan

Mr. Patlan is currently President of the Mexican American Unity Council, Inc. He has been very active in economic development in San Antonio and after receiving millions of dollars of government aid over the years, Mr. Patlan now considers himself a Reagan "convert" and is convinced the best route to solving community problems is through private initiatives.

William S. White

After a career in management consulting Mr. White, in 1969, assumed the role of President, Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, the nation's largest private foundation (\$30 million annually). Through its community school concept and other grant programs, the Mott Foundation has long been a proponent of community self-help.

I. PURPOSE

To respond to Senator Jesse Helms' request for a photo opportunity and brief meeting with you to present a replica of the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse and certificate from the Save Cape Hatteras Lighthouse Committee on behalf of the Committee.

II. BACKGROUND

The Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, located on North Carolina's Outer Banks, is over 200 years old. It is one of the country's most famous lighthouses; its unique candy-strip exterior makes it the most recognized lighthouse on the East coast. It has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Since its construction, this structure has been threatened by erosion of the beach. Experts have recently indicated that a major storm could destroy the lighthouse at any time. Senator Helms and Secretary Watt have agreed on a cost-sharing arrangement to raise funds to save the lighthouse where private efforts will raise a portion of the funds and the federal government will provide the remainder.

Concerned citizens in North Carolina and around the country have formed the Save Cape Hatteras Lighthouse Committee to raise these funds, and Senator Helms and North Carolina Governor Jim Hunt serve as co-chairmen. Two options are being considered to save the structure: (1) move the structure away from the shore; and (2) encircle the lighthouse with a steel revetment.

I. PURPOSE

To meet and have a photo opportunity with seven Republican Members, in order to demonstrate the President's concern about the impact of high interest rates in the Northwest and to reaffirm the need to restrain federal spending.

II. BACKGROUND

These seven Republicans represent Districts that are heavily impacted by the timber industry. Because the housing and timber industry have been in a slump, these Republicans receive a lot of political heat. This meeting will help them assure their constituents that the President is aware of the concerns in the Northwest and that he is making the tough decisions to reduce deficits in order to help ease the level of interest rates.

Sid Morrison, in his first-term, represents the 4th District, the central part of Washington. He is the Freshman Class Whip and serves on the Agriculture Committee.

Denny Smith defeated former Ways and Means Chairman Al Ullman in the 1980 election. He represents the 2nd District of Oregon and serves on the Interior and Insular Affairs and Veterans Affairs Committees.

Gene Chappie also defeated a Committee Chairman in the 1980 elections, after serving 16 years in the California Assembly. He represents the 1st District and serves on the Agriculture Committee.

Larry Craig is a first-termer from the 1st District of Idaho. He serves on the Education and Labor and Interior and Insular Affairs Committees.

BACKGROUND Cont'd.

George Hansen is from the 2nd District of Idaho and is in his 6th term. He serves on the Agriculture Committee and the Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Committee where he is the ranking Republican on the Subcommittee on Domestic Monetary Policy.

Joel Pritchard is in his 5th term representing the 1st District, Seattle area, of Washington. He serves on the Foreign Affairs and Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committees.

Norm Shumway, a second-term Member, is from Stockton, California. He represents the 14th District and serves on the Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs and Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committees.

These seven Republicans all support the President's effort to restrain federal spending and this meeting will provide an opportunity to demonstrate Congressional support for additional spending cuts.

- Thank the seven Republicans for their support of your economic package.
- Acknowledge that the economy of their region -- the Northwest United States -- has been particularly hard hit by high interest rates.
- Emphasize that if the Congress is serious about reducing interest rates -- then the Congress is going to have to help hold down government spending.
- Point out that Paul Volcker, Chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, agrees that the only way to get interest rates down is to cut spending.
- Stress that we can't reverse the excesses of previous Administrations and Congresses oversight.
- Ask for their help and support in your efforts to reduce the federal deficit.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss the proposed sale of enhanced air defense equipment to Saudi Arabia and the Administration's legislative strategy.

II. BACKGROUND

Congressmen Clem Zablocki and Bill Broomfield, as Chairman and Ranking Republican respectively of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, will play pivotal roles in Congressional approval of the sale of enhanced air defense equipment to Saudi Arabia.

On April 27, Congressman Clarence Long (D-Maryland) introduced House Concurrent Resolution 118 disapproving the sale of AWACS aircraft, conformal fuel tanks and air-to-air missiles to Saudi Arabia. Two hundred and fifty-two House Members, including seventy-seven Republicans, have cosponsored the legislation. On September 17, a companion resolution of disapproval was introduced in the Senate listing fifty sponsors.

Chairman Zablocki has not announced publicly his position on the proposed sale but there are strong indications that he is inclined to be supportive of the Administration.

Congressman Broomfield is on record as opposing the sale though he is not a sponsor of H.Con.Res. 118. Broomfield will not do anything which would embarrass the Administration.

BACKGROUND (cont'd)

During the period of pre-informal and informal Congressional notification, which will conclude September 29, the Administration has undertaken comprehensive briefings for Members on the proposed sale. Formal Congressional notification is scheduled October 1. The Committee anticipates Floor action on a resolution no earlier than October 13.

The Administration's legislative strategy is for the Senate to consider first a resolution of disapproval. The House is being urged to avoid precipitous action which would have the effect of placing additional pressure on the Senate to act contrary to the Administration's position.

It is anticipated that Congressman Zablocki will not link his cooperation on this matter to Republican support of other legislation affecting foreign policy. Zablocki, sensitive to the traditional opposition of Republicans to foreign aid, has indicated he will not take a foreign assistance bill to the Floor until he has assurances of the support of 125 Republicans for the legislation. A complicating factor arose with the 226-165 defeat on September 17 of the State Department FY 82-83 Authorization bill. One hundred and thirty-one Republicans voted against passage of the bill. Zablocki, in particular, is incensed at the lack of Republican support for "the Administration's bill."

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING
WITH CONGRESSMEN ZABLOCKI AND BROOMFIELD

- This Administration is totally and unequivocally committed to proceeding with the sale of enhanced air defense equipment to Saudi Arabia because it will make a substantial contribution to the security of the United States and the West. I would not support the sale were it otherwise.
- Saudi Arabia must have the capacity to defend its concentrated and aeriually vulnerable oil facilities from attack by regional adversaries. Because of the reliance of the U.S. and other Western Nations on Saudi oil, disruption in the supply would have disastrous security and economic implications.
- What we are doing with Saudi Arabia represents an important next step for the peace process. In order for the current process to proceed, Saudi Arabia, as the most influential of the moderate Arab States, must play a greater role.
- This package will not pose any substantial threat to the security of Israel. Each of the four elements in the Saudi air defense enhancement package has been carefully tailored to ensure that it makes good military sense without providing a capacity which exceeds Saudi needs. Safeguards will be established to ensure that the intelligence equipment will not be compromised.

- Because much erroneous information surrounds the proposed sale, it is hoped that the Foreign Affairs Committee will review objectively the Administration's testimony and act accordingly.

- House defeat of a resolution of disapproval is difficult at best. The Senate will be urged to act first.

I. PURPOSE

II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Albert Lee Smith, working with the Republican Study Group headed by Congressman Dick Schulze, circulated a petition pledging support for Presidential vetoes.

155 Members of Congress have signed the petition which pledges to the President "to support any veto that you may exercise to achieve your budgetary aggregate."

The petition was circulated to show support for the President's economic package, but Congressman Smith agreed to wait to present the petition later in the year to re-enforce the anticipated veto signals that would be used to limit upcoming appropriations bills and to restrain other legislation.

Albert Lee Smith is a first-term Republican from Birmingham, Alabama. He serves on the Budget and Veterans Affairs Committees. Congressman Dick Schulze (R-Pa) serves on the Ways and Means Committee. He is in his 4th term serving the communities south-west of Philadelphia. Schulze heads the Republican Study Group which is an informational caucus of Republicans that helps develop conservative legislative initiatives and positions.

Both Members have been long-time supporters of the President.
