I. PURPOSE

To pay tribute to Raoul Wallenberg. In tandem, to pay tribute to the bipartisan congressional support this Resolution received, as well as timely recognition of the Jewish community during their New Year observances (the Jewish New Year ends on Thursday, October 8, with the celebration of Yom Kippur).

II. BACKGROUND

S. J. Res. 65, cosponsored by 58 Senators and H. J. Res. 220, cosponsored by 280 Members of the House of Representatives, proclaims Raoul Wallenberg to be an honorary citizen of the United States, and requests the President to ascertain from the Soviet Union the whereabouts of Raoul Wallenberg and to secure his return to freedom.

Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish national long suspected of being a Soviet prisoner, is credited with saving the lives of more than 100,000 Jews in Hungary prior to the defeat of Hitler's army. Congressman Tom Lantos, the prime sponsor of the resolution in the House, was saved by Raoul Wallenberg. Lantos was a 16 year old youth working for the Hungarian underground.

This Spring, "60 Minutes" aired a segment on Wallenberg. Upon seeing this, the President called Secretary of State Haig and told him he wanted to strongly support the efforts of those sponsoring the Wallenberg resolution.

In addition to the Congressional and Jewish community invitees to today's ceremony, Wallenberg's sister, Nina Lagergren, wife of the Chief Justice of the World Court in the Hague, and Wallenberg's brother, Guy von Dardel, have flown in from Sweden for this event. Also in attendance from Vienna, Austria, will be Simon Wiesenthal, Chairman of the Simon Wiesenthal Center in Los Angeles, and the man who has been involved with the Wallenberg matter for more than 20 years.

I. PURPOSE

The meeting has been scheduled to review our general approach to the Cancun Summit.

II. BACKGROUND/PURPOSE

The Cabinet Council on Economic Affairs is developing options for your consideration that will, following your decisions, form a Reagan administration program for promoting economic development among developing countries. The program will consist of: (a) a philosophical framework, emphasizing the importance of freer trade, an improved investment climate, and aid that encourages productive/self-sustaining enterprise; and (b) a series of particular initiatives that are consistent with this framework.

The elements of the program will be discussed with you in the next few days.

This meeting has been scheduled to discuss the broader strategic question -- essentially a procedural and political question -- of how to approach the issue of "global negotiations" at the Cancun Summit.

III. THE ISSUE FOR DISCUSSION AT THIS MEETING: HOW TO APPROACH THE QUESTION OF "GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS"

Your advisers differ on this subject. State is preparing an options paper that may serve as a basis for discussion.

You will recall that: the Ottawa Summit Declaration commits the summit members to "participate in preparations for a mutually acceptable process of global negotiations in circumstances offering the prospects of meaningful progress." The press release from the preparatory Cancun meeting (in which the U.S. participated) states that the Cancun Summit will "facilitate" global negotiations. Many nations now choose to interpret this as a sign or commitment that the U.S. is willing to return to the Global Negotiations preparatory meetings at the U.N.

Your advisers seem to differ on both: (a) the political questions as to the effects one or another of these options would have at home and abroad; and (b) the practical questions as to whether or not one or another of these options would best advance your international development program.

The 1980 Strawberry Queen, Miss Cynthia McWhorter, is a student at Fairmont State College. The 1981 Strawberry Queen, Miss Sherree Evangelist, is a dental hygienist.

I. **PURPOSE**

To respond to the request of Senator Harrison Schmitt (R-New Mexico) for the President to present the Congressionally authorized gold medals to the crew of the Double Eagle II.

II. BACKGROUND

In August, 1978, Ben Abruzzo, Maxie Anderson, and Larry Newman -all businessmen from Albuquerque, New Mexico -- became the first aviators to pilot a balloon across the Atlantic. The flight of the Double Eagle II across the Atlantic Ocean took almost six days and nights. The crew was aloft for more than 137 hours and traveled 3,120 miles between their take-off from Presque Isle, Maine and their landing in a barley field in Miserey, France.

The crew of the Double Eagle II succeeded where seventeen earlier expeditions had failed and five people had died. Upon completion of this trans-Atlantic crossing in a helium-filled balloon, the crew was considering a flight around the world in 30 days.

On June 13, 1979, Congress enacted a law authorizing specially struck gold medals to be presented to each of the balloonists in recognition of their distinguished feat as aviation pioneers. These medals were never presented during the previous Administration despite Senator Schmitt's efforts to schedule such a presentation.

In addition to the balloonists and their wives, Senator Schmitt has requested that the full New Mexico Congressional delegation attend this event.

I. PURPOSE

> To express special thanks to Congressman Larry McDonald, who supported the economic package 100%; and to express appreciation for his ongoing counsel and friendship.

II. BACKGROUND

> Larry McDonald represents the 7th Congressional District of Georgia (northwest corner of the state). Now serving in his third term, Larry is a member of the Armed Services Committee. The Almanac of American Politics 1982 characterizes Larry as "one of the nation's most unusual Congressmen", presumably because he is a medical doctor (urologist) by profession, has been a member of the John Birch Society, and maintains one of the most conservative voting records in the House (e.g., American Conservative Union rating of 100%).

Larry McDonald is the only House Democrat with a 100% voting record in favor of the economic package who is not also a member of the Conservative Democratic Forum (CDF). The other nineteen House Democrats with perfect voting records--all CDFers--were invited to meet with the President in the Oval Office on September 14th. At that time they received the President's special thanks and presented him with a "boll weevil" tie and other memorabilia.

Taken together, Larry McDonald and the 19 CDF 100%ers constitute the core of the Administration's Democratic support in the House. Although Larry has met with the President on numerous occasions in conjunction with the economic recovery package, he has not yet received the special recognition afforded his CDF counterparts.

I. PURPOSE

To respond to the request of Senator Harrison Schmitt (R-New Mexico) for the President to present the Congressionally authorized gold medals to the crew of the Double Eagle II.

II. BACKGROUND

In August, 1978, Ben Abruzzo, Maxie Anderson, and Larry Newman -all businessmen from Albuquerque, New Mexico -- became the first aviators to pilot a balloon across the Atlantic. The flight of the Double Eagle II across the Atlantic Ocean took almost six days and nights. The crew was aloft for more than 137 hours and traveled 3,120 miles between their take-off from Presque Isle, Maine and their landing in a barley field in Miserey, France.

The crew of the Double Eagle II succeeded where seventeen earlier expeditions had failed and five people had died. Upon completion of this trans-Atlantic crossing in a helium-filled balloon, the crew was considering a flight around the world in 30 days.

On June 13, 1979, Congress enacted a law authorizing specially struck gold medals to be presented to each of the balloonists in recognition of their distinguished feat as aviation pioneers. These medals were never presented during the previous Administration, despite Senator Schmitt's efforts to schedule such a presentation.

In addition to the balloonists and their wives, Senator Schmitt has requested that the full New Mexico Congressional delegation attend this event.





I. PURPOSE

To pay tribute to Raoul Wallenberg. In tandem, to pay tribute to the bipartisan congressional support this Resolution received, as well as timely recognition of the Jewish community during their New Year observances (the Jewish New Year ends on Thursday, October 8, with the celebration of Yom Kippur).

II. BACKGROUND

S. J. Res. 65, cosponsored by 58 Senators and H. J. Res. 220, cosponsored by 280 Members of the House of Representatives, proclaims Raoul Wallenberg to be an honorary citizen of the United States, and requests the President to ascertain from the Soviet Union the whereabouts of Raoul Wallenberg and to secure his return to freedom.

Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish national long suspected of being a Soviet prisoner, is credited with saving the lives of more than 100,000 Jews in Hungary prior to the defeat of Hitler's army. Congressman Tom Lantos, the prime sponsor of the resolution in the House, was saved by Raoul Wallenberg. Lantos was a 16 year old youth working for the Hungarian underground.

This Spring, "60 Minutes" aired a segment on Wallenberg. Upon seeing this, the President called Secretary of State Haig and told him he wanted to strongly support the efforts of those sponsoring the Wallenberg resolution.

In addition to the Congressional and Jewish community invitees to today's ceremony, Wallenberg's sister, Nina Lagergren, wife of the Chief Justice of the World Court in the Hague, and Wallenberg's brother, Guy von Dardel, have flown in from Sweden for this event. Also in attendance from Vienna, Austria, will be Simon Wiesenthal, Chairman of the Simon Wiesenthal Center in Los Angeles, and the man who has been involved with the Wallenberg matter for more than 20 years.

In this Nation's history, only one other individual has been granted honorary United States citizenship, and that was Winston Churchill. That was in 1916, 65 years ago.

I. PURPOSE

The meeting has been scheduled to review our general approach to the Cancun Summit.

II. BACKGROUND/PURPOSE

The Cabinet Council on Economic Affairs is developing options for your consideration that will, following your decisions, form a Reagan administration program for promoting economic development among developing countries. The program will consist of: (a) a philosophical framework, emphasizing the importance of freer trade, an improved investment climate, and aid that encourages productive/self-sustaining enterprise; and (b) a series of particular initiatives that are consistent with this framework.

The elements of the program will be discussed with you in the next few days.

This meeting has been scheduled to discuss the broader strategic question -- essentially a procedural and political question -- of how to approach the issue of "global negotiations" at the Cancun Summit.

III. THE ISSUE FOR DISCUSSION AT THIS MEETING: HOW TO APPROACH THE QUESTION OF "GLOBAL NEGOTIATIONS"

Your advisers differ on this subject. State is preparing an options paper that may serve as a basis for discussion.

You will recall that: the Ottawa Summit Declaration commits the summit members to "participate in preparations for a mutually acceptable process of global negotiations in circumstances offering the prospects of meaningful progress." The press release from the preparatory Cancun meeting (in which the U.S. participated) states that the Cancun Summit will "facilitate" global negotiations. Many nations now choose to interpret this as a sign or commitment that the U.S. is willing to return to the Global Negotiations preparatory meetings at the U.N.

Options, at this stage, include the following:

- -- State that the U.S. does not favor U.N.-sponsored "global negotiations" period -- arguing that the U.N. might be an appropriate forum for general discussion (not "negotiation"), but that a practical approach to progress must be centered in appropriate functional organizations (GATT, World Bank, etc.) and in regional organizations (e.g., Caribbean Basin). NOTE: This combination of activities could be referred to by the U.S. as an "acceptable process of global negotiations."
- -- State that the U.S. does not now favor a return to preparations for global negotiations at the U.N. (for same reasons as above), but that it does favor further discussion of the appropriate basis, agenda, and fora for global negotiations at a follow-on meeting of the Cancun group -- while it will also seek to advance its program for development through GATT, World Bank, regional efforts, etc.
- -- State that the U.S. cannot now accept "global negotiations" in the sense that has been contemplated in the U.N. preparatory sessions, but that the U.S. would be willing to resume discussions of this topic at the UNGA in exchange for the Cancun participants' acceptance of certain specified conditions. NOTE: Appropriate conditions might include:
 - o assurances that "global negotiations" agenda and procedures will protect the competence, functions, and powers of the specialized agencies and fora (GATT, IBRD, IMF, etc.);
 - o assurances that the "global negotiations" agenda will give greater considerations to the relative contributions made by all states in the areas of opening markets, improving the investment climate, and providing assistance; and
 - o assurances that "global negotiations" agenda items are to be approached in a practical spirit of shared responsibility, rather than a confrontational spirit of bloc politics.

Each of the foregoing options is less than most of the participants at Cancun will want, and less than many expect. This procedural "shortcoming" could be offset somewhat by the seriousness and coherence of the substantive Reagan approach to development that you would advance.

Your advisers seem to differ on both: (a) the political questions as to the effects one or another of these options would have at home and abroad; and (b) the practical questions as to whether or not one or another of these options would best advance your international development program.
