MEETING WITH ALL REPUBLICAN MEMBERS OF THE SENATE

DATE: Wednesday, October 7, 1981

LOCATION: The State Dining Room

TIME: 9:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. (one hour)

I. PURPOSE

To discuss the proposed sale of the air defense enhancement package (AWACS) to Saudi Arabia.

II. BACKGROUND

Of the 53 Republican Senators, only 17 can be counted as "firm supporters" of the Saudi arms sale. The remaining 36 break down as follows: 10 are expected to support, but have not committed yet; 8 are undecided and actively seeking a "compromise"; 17 have signed the Packwood resolution (5 of these could possibly be peeled off); and 1 Senator (Hatfield) votes against all arms sales on principle, but may help if he can.

In recent weeks, the idea of achieving some "compromise," or modification of the assurances to provide for joint control of the AWACS has become tantamount to a yardstick for measuring our chances of success. The compromise idea is attractive for two reasons. First, despite the fact that the Administration has made a persuasive case to demonstrate the sale does not pose a serious threat to the security of Israel, many Senators remain susceptible to intense political pressure from the Jewish lobby groups. A compromise would provide the "new evidence" these Senators feel they need to justify supporting the package. Second, a compromise could allay concerns about the stability of the Saudi government or security of the AWACS technology.

Many Senators who have been briefed in detail on the existing assurances agree that, absent specific joint control language, we have already achieved an acceptable package. However, any insistence on a public litany of Saudi concessions is objectionable to that country, and could jeopardize the progress we have made.

While attempts may continue to modify the language or to find some legislative initiatives to satisfy Congressional concerns, we are facing the possibility of one committee vote on AWACS this week (House Foreign Affairs Committee). The Senate Armed Services Committee and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee have postponed their votes until the Senate reconvenes on October 14.

There are two current developments which will also have some bearing on consideration of the AWACS package in the Senate. First, a Sense of the Senate Resolution by Senator John Warner and Senator Sam Nunn has gained some support and already has a bipartisan sponsorship of 9 senators. The resolution will be introduced on Wednesday. It requires certification by the President of certain conditions contained in the Letter of Offer and Acceptance agreed to by the Saudis. One effect of this proposal will be to give wavering senators something "new" to justify their decision to support the sale.

Second, the assassination of President Anwar Sadat has also raised the level of discussion on AWACS; however, as yet the full impact of this event on the arms sale remains unclear.

Talking PointsPresident's Meeting with Republican Senators

- Thank you for joining with me today to discuss an issue of vital importance to our national security: the sale to Saudi Arabia of AWACS aircraft and F-15 enhancement items.
- This sale serves our national security interests in two important ways: 1) It strengthens our strategic posture in that vital part of the world; and 2) it provides the cornerstone for initiatives designed to bring Saudi Arabia and other moderate Arab states into the peace process.
- In 1978, a Democratic Senate, with significant Republican support, approved the sale to Saudi Arabia of much more sophisticated aircraft -- the F-15s -- at a time when that country did not face the threat occasioned by the Soviet invasion and occupation of Afghanistan, the Iran-Iraq war and Iranian stability, and Soviet advances in Ethiopia, Libya, Chad, and the Yemens.
- I find it inconceivable that a Republican Senate might now disapprove a less-sophisticated package at a time of greater threat to Saudi Arabia and its vital oil facilities.
- The only reasons I could see for this negative action would be if the package presents a risk to Israel or an unacceptable risk of technology compromise. This package presents neither risk.
- As I told Prime Minister Begin, and the American public, I remain firmly committed to Israel's security. I would not have approved this package if it adversely affected Israel's qualitative edge.
- To ensure against misuse and technology compromise, we negotiated with the Saudis a very detailed series of arrangements providing for full US participation in the program, safeguards against sharing data with third countries, and the most detailed security plan ever developed in connection with an arms sales.
- These negotiations were conducted after we had received from Senator Baker and others of you your concerns about this sale. Thus, I believe we have been fully responsive to the Congress, especially the Senate, and that we have gone as far with the Saudis as we can and should go.
- I intend to win this battle and am prepared to use all the means available to me to do so. Success is important both to our Mideast policy and to my goal of reestablishing a bipartisan foreign policy consensus. The first step, however, is ensuring that we of the Republican Party speak with one voice.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss Senator Bumpers' amendment to the Regulatory Reform Bill currently working its way through the Senate Judiciary Committee

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Laxalt has recommended that Senator Bumpers meet with you to discuss his amendment to the Regulatory Reform Bill. Senator Laxalt is supporting the Bumpers amendment and thinks that it is terribly important to have Bumpers supporting our effort when the bill reaches the floor.

The Vice President and staff from his Regulatory Relief Task Force met with Senators Laxalt and Bumpers last week to discuss the Bumpers amendment. The Vice President has been consulting with White House staff on the acceptability of the amendment. He will meet with Senator Bumpers to update Bumpers on that review. He will present a compromise to Senator Bumpers and will inform you during this meeting of what Senator Bumpers may or may not have agreed to regarding this compromise.

Additional information on the Bumpers amendment is provided as an attachment.

Senator Bumpers is also a possible supporter of the sale of the air defense package to Saudi Arabia. He has studiously avoided making a commitment to either side up to this point. Senator Laxalt suggests that you discuss the AWACS situation with him.

The Bumpers Amendment

Bumpers Amendment

- Tell Senator Bumpers you understand he has an amendment to the Regulatory Reform bill which he would like to discuss.
- Tell him that you are aware of the discussions that he and the Vice President have been having.
- Tell him that we support the basic thrust of what his amendment is trying to accomplish. Tell him our amendment is simply designed to clarify what he has stated is his interpretation of one critical part of it and make sure that our deregulatory efforts are not thwarted by an ambiguous interpretation of what his amendment would require.
- Ask the Vice President for an update on the situation.

On The Subject of AWACS

- Tell the Senator that you have been watching his actions on the air defense package with great interest. Tell him you have been told he has avoided making a commitment up to this point and you are very pleased that he has done so.
- Tell him that the AWACS package is very important to the United States as well as to the kingdom of Saudi Arabia and the state of Israel. Tell him that you don't think that Saudi Arabia, Israel, or the United States can afford to see the package disapproved and thereby miss this opportunity to build a very strong link into the whole military, diplomatic and political situation in the Middle East.
- Ask him what his current thinking is on the subject and press him to support the package.

THE BUMPERS AMENDMENT

The so-called "Bumpers" Amendment would make some very complicated changes to the scope of judicial review of agency regulations. The thrust of the changes is to give the courts much more authority to review and reverse agency action -- and thus to make it easier for this Administration's opponents to challenge deregulation in the courts. (The amendment was developed some time ago to make it easier for the business community to challenge Carter Administration regulations.)

Most appellate judges oppose one part of the amendment, as does a substantial body of academic opinion. The Administration has testified against this same particular provision.

Senator Bumpers and Senator Laxalt met with the Vice President last week on this issue. There is a compromise solution, which the Vice President can present to Senator Bumpers before the meeting with the President. Senator Bumpers might not accept the solution on the spot, but he is also unlikely to reject it out of hand.

Senator Laxalt has recommended that Senator Bumpers meet with you to discuss his amendment to the Regulatory Reform Bill. Senator Laxalt is supporting the Bumpers amendment and thinks that it is terribly important to have Bumpers supporting our effort when the bill reaches the floor.

The Vice President and staff from his Regulatory Relief Task Force met with Senators Laxalt and Bumpers last week to discuss the Bumpers amendment. The Vice President has been consulting with White House staff on the acceptability of the amendment. He will meet with Senator Bumpers to update Bumpers on that review. He will present a compromise to Senator Bumpers and will inform you during this meeting of what Senator Bumpers may or may not have agreed to regarding this compromise.

Additional information on the Bumpers amendment is provided as an attachment.

Senator Bumpers is also a possible supporter of the sale of the air defense package to Saudi Arabia. He has studiously avoided making a commitment to either side up to this point. Senator Laxalt suggests that you discuss the AWACS situation with him.
