Senator Bentsen is a co-sponsor of the Packwood resolution and has given little indication that he is willing to change his position. Bentsen is concerned about the technology transfer to a country which he perceives to be unstable and suggests that we simply keep our American AWACS in Saudi Arabia. He has indicated that he might be willing to change his position if there were an agreement on joint command of the AWACS. You have had one phone conversation with Bentsen (September 17), but so far, he has remained opposed. Governor Clements of Texas had a conversation with Bentsen and reported Bentsen's concerns about the security of the technology. Both Clements and Senator John Tower have discussed this with Bentsen.

Bentsen is facing re-election in Texas and is obviously concerned about his Jewish constituency. While there is strong opposition to the sale among many Jewish groups, particularly in the San Antonio area, the Jewish community in Houston (Bentsen's home town) is split on the issue. While it is doubtful that Bentsen will change his position, you should address his concerns about the security of the technology and see if he has any other substantive problems.

President's Meeting with Senators

- -- Thank you for joining with me today to discuss an issue of vital importance to our national security: the sale to Saudi Arabia of AWACS aircraft and F-15 enhancement items.
- -- This sale serves our national security interests in two important ways: 1) It strengthens our strategic posture in that vital part of the world; and 2) it provides the cornerstone for initiatives designed to bring Saudi Arabia and other moderate Arab states into the peace process.
- -- In 1978, the Senate approved the sale to Saudi Arabia of much more sophisticated aircraft -- the F-15s -- at a time when that country did not face the threat occasioned by the Soviet invasion and occupation of Afghanistan, the Iran-Iraq war and Iranian stability, and Soviet advances in Ethiopia, Libya, Chad, and the Yemens.
- I find it inconceivable that the Senate might now disapprove a less-sophisticated package at a time of greater threat to Saudi Arabia and its vital oil facilities.
- -- The only reasons I could see for this negative action would be if the package presents a risk to Israel or an unacceptable risk of technology compromise. This package presents neither risk.
- -- As I told Prime Minister Begin, and the American public, I remain firmly committed to Israel's security. I would not have approved this package if it adversely affected Israel's qualitative edge.
- -- To ensure against misuse and technology compromise, we negotiated with the Saudis a very detailed series of arrangements providing for full U.S. participation in the program, safeguards against sharing data with third countries, and the most detailed security plan ever developed in connection with an arms sales.



Its pages will always remind me of a lesson in the Old Testament: that one generation goes and another comes, but the Earth remains forever. The riches of our environment belong to all generations.
