# MEETING WITH SENATOR EDWARD ZORINSKY (D-NEBRASKA)

#### I. PURPOSE

To discuss the proposed Saudi AWACS sale.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Senator Zorinsky co-sponsored the Packwood Resolution and voted in favor of it in the Foreign Relations Committee, but recently has given some indication that he is having second thoughts about his position.

You recently asked him to represent you as part of the U.S. delegation attending the funeral of Moshe Dayan in Israel. He seemed highly appreciative of this, especially in view of the fact that he is Jewish and this was his first trip to Israel. Unfortunately, however, he and Roger Jepsen spent forty-five minutes with Prime Minister Begin and even more time with Defense Minister Sharon. They were intensely lobbied during these meetings.

In spite of this, we have had several indications that Zorinsky is uncomfortable opposing you and there is some possibility that you may be able to turn him around. As you recall, he did not take your phone call just prior to the vote in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and he has received a great deal of criticism from his constituents for his apparent rudeness. He subsequently wrote you a letter apologizing. He said in his letter that he "did not want to go into the locker-room with the Gipper at half-time and come out following the instructions of the other teams coach."

In his letter, Senator Zorinsky also mentioned that he has had a longstanding request to meet with you on "various foreign policy issues." He says he is willing to include the AWACS sale on the list of items to be discussed. This meeting fulfills this request.

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Senator Zorinsky has just accepted the President's invitation to be his official representative at the Antigua Independence Day celebration, October 29-November 2. The senator will be accompanied by his wife, Cece.

# Talking Points

# President's Meeting with Senators

- -- Thank you for joining with me today to discuss an issue of vital importance to our national security: the sale to Saudi Arabia of AWACS aircraft and F-15 enhancement items.
- This sale serves our national security interests in two important ways: 1) It strengthens our strategic posture in that vital part of the world; and 2) it provides the cornerstone for initiatives designed to bring Saudi Arabia and other moderate Arab states into the peace process.
- -- In 1978, the Senate approved the sale to Saudi Arabia of much more sophisticated aircraft -- the F-15s -- at a time when that country did not face the threat occasioned by the Soviet invasion and occupation of Afghanistan, the Iran-Iraq war and Iranian stability, and Soviet advances in Ethiopia, Libya, Chad, and the Yemens.
- -- I find it inconceivable that the Senate might now disapprove a less-sophisticated package at a time of greater threat to Saudi Arabia and its vital oil facilities.
- -- The only reasons I could see for this negative action would be if the package presents a risk to Israel or an unacceptable risk of technology compromise. This package presents neither risk.
- -- As I told Prime Minister Begin, and the American public, I remain firmly committed to Israel's security. I would not have approved this package if it adversely affected Israel's qualitative edge.
- -- To ensure against misuse and technology compromise, we negotiated with the Saudis a very detailed series of arrangements providing for full U.S. participation in the program, safeguards against sharing data with third countries, and the most detailed security plan ever developed in connection with an arms sales.
- -- These negotiations were conducted <u>after</u> we had received from Senator Baker and others of you your concerns about this sale. Thus, I believe we have been fully responsive to the Congress, especially the Senate, and that we have gone as far with the Saudis as we can and should go.
- I intend to win this battle and am prepared to use all the means available to me to do so. Success is important both to our Mideast policy and to my goal of reestablishing a bipartisan foreign policy consensus.

Senator Pryor is one of the original co-sponsors of the resolution to disapprove the sale, but he shows substantial signs of being uncomfortable with this position. He says that if he were not so far in front on the other side, he would like to help us, but feels he can not in view of his early, public position in opposition to the sale.

You met with him on October 14 and you also had a telephone conversation with him from Air Force One on your way to Grand Rapids last month. After each contact, he has remained uncomfortably opposed.

This meeting was scheduled as the last face-to-face meeting for you prior to the vote at 5 p.m. on the advice of several of his colleagues. They maintain that he has frequently been subject to change up until the last minute on important votes.
