I. PURPOSE:

To indicate that omnibus farm legislation which is not in line with the aggregate cost of the Senate-passed version will not be acceptable to the Administration, and to seek bipartisan support and cooperation to achieve a House-Senate Conference measure which the President can sign.

II. BACKGROUND

The Senate completed initial Floor consideration of the farm bill (S. 884) on Friday, September 18th. The House completed initial Floor consideration of similar legislation (H.R. 3603) on Thursday, October 22nd. House and Senate Conferees were appointed during the week of October 26th; and the first farm bill conference meeting to work out differences between the House and Senate bills is scheduled to convene at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, November 4th.

As passed by the Senate, the commodity provisions of S. 884 are about \$3 billion over the Administration's Mid-Session Budget when out years are considered. It is in substantial agreement with a compromise proposal sent to the Senate during Committee markup. This level was achieved on a series of several close votes on the Senate floor reducing the Committee bill by more than \$3 billion.

In comparison, H.R. 3603 is about \$6 billion over the Senate farm bill and about \$9 billion over the Mid-Session Budget. Republican and Democratic Members of the House Agriculture Committee generally supported the higher spending levels during House Floor consideration of the farm bill. Both OMB Director Stockman and Agriculture Secretary Block have stated that they will recommend a

veto of the farm bill on budgetary grounds unless the cost of the final Conference version is in line with S. 884. The President is sending a letter to all farm bill conferees, dated November 4th, which states in part that "Unless the Conference Committee takes action to reduce the cost of the programs in the bill to a level close in line with the Senate version, I will have no responsible choice but to veto the legislation."

It is important to note also that the House stripped H.R. 3603 of its sugar price support program and adopted another amendment to eliminate acreage allotments and poundage quotas on peanut production. The Administration's positions have been to abide by the will of Congress on sugar and to support the original House Agriculture Committee provision on peanuts.

In order to obtain a farm bill the President can sign, it is vital for Senate Conferees to adhere very closely to their original bill, particularly on the dairy, wheat and feed grain provisions. Likewise, it is necessary for House Conferees to recede to the Senate in these areas. Particularly on the House-side, bipartisan cooperation is essential to success.

Meeting: Republican and Democratic Leader of Agriculture
Committee

Subject: 1981 Farm Bill

- Welcoming comment.
- I know that all of you understand the importance of having a stable farm policy for ensuring that our nation's farmers and ranchers have the information they need to make plans.
- But farmers and ranchers also have a big stake in the success of our efforts to control inflation and bring down interest rates.
- In developing farm legislation, I hope that we can strike a balance so that we can provide an adequate program for agriculture without jeopardizing the budget.
- The House version of the Farm Bill would cost \$16.6 billion over the next five years, which is about \$6 billion more than the bill passed by the Senate.
- Even the Senate bill is substantially above our budget projections -- by about \$3 billion.
- Both Dave Stockman and Jack Block have advised me that they would recommend a veto of a farm bill conference report that added more to our budget than the Senate bill.
- I want you to know that I am prepared to accept their recommendation and act upon it.
- We are prepared to give ground a little and accept a farm program that is more costly than the budget projections.
- I hope you will recognize that we really can't go above the Senate bill, however, and that the House members will have to give some ground too.
- Jack Block advises me that farm bills have historically been a bipartisan effort. *farm bill conference report*
- I don't see any reason to depart from that tradition this year.
- As I noted earlier, farmers have a big stake in controlling Federal spending.

- Bringing down inflation and interest rates will help them far more than any Federal program.
- Now I want to turn the meeting over to Jack Block, who will tell you what we see as the major issues that need to be resolved.

The problem is getting together on a common position on peanuts and sugar.

Note on peanuts and sugar if questioned: The Administration position on sugar is to abide by the will of the Congress. Given the loss of the House Agriculture Committee provision on peanuts, which the Administration earlier supported, the Administration position now is to support the peanut language in the Senate bill (known as the Mattingly amendment).

Meeting: Republican Agriculture Committee Members, House and Senate

Subject: 1981 Farm Bill

- Welcoming comment
- I just met with a bipartisan group to talk about the Farm Bill.
- I let them know that both Jack Block and Dave Stockman are prepared to recommend a veto of a farm bill that is more costly than the Senate version, and that I am prepared to accept that recommendation.
- I firmly believe that farmers and ranchers have just as big a stake in the success of our efforts to control spending as any other business sector.
- We must maintain a credible posture of restraint on spending, even if it means a veto.
- As all of you know, the House bill would cost \$6 billion more than the Senate bill and \$9 billion more than the budget projections.
- I believe it is important for Republicans to stick together on this issue.
- We should not allow the Democrats to try to drive a wedge between House and Senate Republicans.
- We should not allow the argument to go unchallenged that it is impossible to provide a sound farm program within the budget limits.
- I hope that you will work in conference to get out a bill that I can sign.
- Now I want to turn the meeting over to Jack Block, who will lay out the major issues from our perspective.
