TALKING POINTS

- Welcome to the 1st meeting of the Republican Leadership for the 2nd Session of the 97th Congress. I look forward to having such sessions regularly.

- Wish that I could tell you that the six-week recess period had been easy and restful. But, I can't -- I've been working on the State of the Union Address, which I will deliver tonight at 9:00 p.m., the FY '83 budget which will be submitted on February 8th, and other legislative initiatives.

- To understand the State of the Union, we must look not only at where we are and where we are going, but at where we've been. Since last January, we've cut the rate of increase in government spending nearly in half, brought about the largest tax reductions since the beginning of this century, cut the growth of new regulations in half, and begun to restore that margin of military safety that insures peace.

- But we have only begun. The way ahead will not be easy. But we must continue on the course we have charted, a carefully integrated plan for recovery.

- I will propose tonight, and in the budget, major savings by dismantling the Department of Education and the Department of Energy, by eliminating ineffective and unnecessary subsidies for business, by cutting waste and duplication government-wide and by reforming many entitlement programs.

--I will propose preserving the tax reductions that will stimulate savings and investment.

--I will propose making government again accountable to the people. This initiative is at the heart of our legislative agenda for 1982. We will return approximately \$50 billion in Federal programs to state and local government, together with the means to finance them, and a transition period of nearly 10 years to avoid unnecessary disruption. We will assume full responsibility for Medicaid. As part of the financially equal swap, the states will take over aid to families of dependent children and food stamps.

--I will ask Dave Stockman and Don Regan to describe the program more fully, but I want to emphasize that we will be consulting with you and state and local officials before sending this proposal to the Congress.

AFTER STOCKMAN AND REGAN COMPLETE THEIR BRIEFING:

--Last meeting, I recall Bob Michel leading off. This time, it's your turn, Howard, and then Bob's.

AT CONCLUSION OF GENERAL DISCUSSION:

--What we accomplished last session was made possible in large measure by the teamwork and leadership that represented in this room. I hope we will stand together again this year.
