BACKGROUND INFORMATION  
ON  
PAPERWORK AND REGULATORY RELIEF FOR SMALL BUSINESS

Today President Reagan and Vice President Bush are releasing the Information Collection Budget for Fiscal Year 1982 and announcing a new list of Federal regulations and paperwork requirements to be reassessed by the Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief. Small businesses will benefit particularly from the paperwork reductions achieved by the Information Collection Budget process and the new regulatory and paperwork reviews. The President and Vice President are also directing the agencies to take maximum advantage of the Regulatory Flexibility Act to ensure that Federal regulations do not impose disproportionate burdens on small businesses.

The Information Collection Budget sets limits on the burden (measured in "burden hours") Federal agencies may impose on individuals, businesses, and state and local governments through reporting and recordkeeping requirements. Each year, the agencies and the Office of Management and Budget determine paperwork "budget cuts" achieved by streamlining or eliminating existing forms and recordkeeping requirements. This year's budget reduces Federal paperwork by nearly 200 million burden hours--a 13 percent reduction from the paperwork that existed when President Reagan took office. This is the equivalent of 95,000 work-years, and amounts to over one hour of saved time for every man and woman in the United States.

The new list of regulatory and paperwork reviews is the fourth in a series of Federal rules designated for in-depth agency review by the Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief. The three earlier lists, designated in 1981, included many requirements that imposed disproportionate burdens on small enterprises. The new list announced today is focused on additional small business issues--such as paperwork under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA), several credit reporting and disclosure laws, and small business export policies. Reduction in these and other regulatory burdens will permit small businesses to compete more effectively with larger firms, leading to lower costs to consumers, greater retirement security for employees, and other important benefits.

Facts

General Dozier, back home following his release from Red Brigade terrorists, will have attended a prayer breakfast at the Washington Hilton immediately preceding his call on you (call scheduled for 9:30 a.m. and to end at 9:45 a.m.).

Discussion/Talking Points

- Reiterate your admiration for the General's bearing under conditions of dire stress;
- Praise Mrs. Dozier for her courage and support during her husband's ordeal;
- Note the constructive words of support he gave for Europe's role in NATO in his first public remarks following his liberation;
- Express special U.S. respect for, and gratitude to Italy for its superb achievement in the conduct of the liberation operation;
- Tell Dozier we also appreciate the gesture which Italian President Pertini extended in honoring him at a special luncheon in Rome;
- Ask the General if he has any special insights concerning his ordeal he would care to share.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION  
ON  
PAPERWORK AND REGULATORY RELIEF FOR SMALL BUSINESS

Today President Reagan and Vice President Bush are releasing the Information Collection Budget for Fiscal Year 1982 and announcing a new list of Federal regulations and paperwork requirements to be reassessed by the Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief. Small businesses will benefit particularly from the paperwork reductions achieved by the Information Collection Budget process and the new regulatory and paperwork reviews. The President and Vice President are also directing the agencies to take maximum advantage of the Regulatory Flexibility Act to ensure that Federal regulations do not impose disproportionate burdens on small businesses.

The Information Collection Budget sets limits on the burden (measured in "burden hours") Federal agencies may impose on individuals, businesses, and state and local governments through reporting and recordkeeping requirements. Each year, the agencies and the Office of Management and Budget determine paperwork "budget cuts" achieved by streamlining or eliminating existing forms and recordkeeping requirements. This year's budget reduces Federal paperwork by nearly 200 million burden hours--a 13 percent reduction from the paperwork that existed when President Reagan took office. This is the equivalent of 95,000 work-years, and amounts to over one hour of saved time for every man and woman in the United States.

The new list of regulatory and paperwork reviews is the fourth in a series of Federal rules designated for in-depth agency review by the Presidential Task Force on Regulatory Relief. The three earlier lists, designated in 1981, included many requirements that imposed disproportionate burdens on small enterprises. The new list announced today is focused on additional small business issues--such as paperwork under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA), several credit reporting and disclosure laws, and small business export policies. Reduction in these and other regulatory burdens will permit small businesses to compete more effectively with larger firms, leading to lower costs to consumers, greater retirement security for employees, and other important benefits.
