I. PURPOSE

To continue the dialogue on the proposed Fiscal Year 1983 budget with Republican Members of the Senate Finance Committee and enlist their support.

II. BACKGROUND

In an effort to generate Republican congressional support for passage of the Fiscal Year 1983 budget, the Administration has entered into discussions with members of the Leadership and key Committees. The Senate Finance Committee has major responsibility for consideration of principal elements of the budget proposal.

There is a good deal of interest among Finance Committee members in modifying the 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act. Chairman Dole, for example, has mentioned the possibility of repealing the leasing provisions and expanding the minimum tax. Senators Danforth, Heinz, Chafee, and Packwood suggest repealing the third year of individual tax cuts. Senators Symms and Heinz oppose the revenue raisers contained in the 1983 budget proposal.

By March 8, the Finance Committee must submit its budget recommendations to the Senate Budget Committee. It is anticipated that Finance will endorse the Administration's numbers with the caveat that if economic conditions change, they may alter these figures.

Another subject which may come up at this meeting is the idea of using the debt limit resolutions as a vehicle for enacting spending and revenue changes to reduce the deficit.

- -- I am pleased all of you could be here today. I understand that Rich Williamson met with you yesterday and you discussed our Federalism Initiative in some detail.
- -- Our proposal for a revitalized federalism demonstrates
 the valuable input city officials have given us over the
 past year. We have tried to include many of your

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH REPUBLICAN MEMBERS OF THE SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE

- -- Thank them for their crucial leadership support last year as members of the Finance Committee to enact our tax package.
- -- I realize this is a difficult time for the economy. But in seeking solutions it is imperative to avoid the quick-fixes which have left a legacy of stagflation, high interest rates, unemployment, and inflation.
- -- Last year we inherited a very difficult economic and financial situation. With your help we have charted a new course -- but it will require time to take full effect. The economic difficulties our program seeks to overcome have required years to develop. There is no overnight solution.
- -- If we change the basic thrust of our program, it will never get a chance to work, and we will lapse back into the depressing cycle of low growth and high inflation that has brought us where we are today.
- -- The deficits we are facing are certainly troublesome. Deficits do matter and they do concern me greatly. For years, we have attempted and failed to balance the budget with higher taxes. We have succeeded only in wrecking the economy; we can't make that mistake again.

- -- We must also insure that the tax system is run efficiently and fairly. That is why I have proposed a program to eliminate abuses and obsolete incentives, and to make major improvements in tax collection and enforcement. We must not be thrown back into a series of "stop-and-go" measures. We must have the good judgment and resolve to stick with our program.
- -- At the same time, we must do something about the explosion of costs of entitlement programs. The Finance Committee will have the key role in re-examining the bulk of these automatic spending programs.
- -- I welcome your thoughts and suggestions on our budget proposals and tax loophole closing measures.
- -- Now I want to call on Don Regan and Dave Stockman for a few comments before asking Howard and Bob to kick off the discussion.

SELECTED TAX REVISIONS

Completed Contract Method of Accounting. Current regulations allow contractors to defer tax on income from long-term contracts until the year that the contract is completed. This completed contract method of tax accounting permits full deferral of income even when progress payments are received by the contractor throughout the term of the contract and certain costs are currently deducted.

The Administration proposes to amend existing regulations and, effective January 1, 1983, to disallow the use of the completed contract method of tax accounting. Taxpayers will be required to use either the percentage of completion method or the progress payment method of accounting for long-term contracts. The percentage of completion method permits current deductions for allowable costs but requires reporting income according to the percentage of the contract completed in the tax year. The progress payment method allocates costs to long-term contracts and defers their deduction until payment is received.

Repeal Business Energy Tax Credits. Under current law, businesses are allowed investment tax credits for energy property in addition to the regular investment tax credit. Some energy tax credits expire at the end of 1982, but others extend through 1985 and beyond. Current law also provides an excise tax exemption, or an equivalent tax credit, for gasohol.

With decontrol of oil and some natural gas prices, businesses no longer need additional investment incentives for energy conservation and development of alternative energy sources. Such subsidies interfere with business decisions by preempting free market resource allocations.

Effective January 1, 1983, the Administration proposes to repeal all business energy tax subsidies and to repeal special provisions allowing states and localities to issue tax-exempt industrial development bonds to finance low-head hydroelectric facilities and other energy property. Transition rules will mitigate the effect of repeal on taxpayers who have relied on existing law.

Restrict Tax-exempt Bonds for Private Activities. Current law permits states and localities to issue tax-exempt revenue bonds for industrial development, housing, and other specific purposes. The volume of tax-exempt bonds issued for use by private business has grown rapidly over the past few years, raising the cost of financing traditional public projects such as schools and roads. There is no requirement under current law that industrial development bonds serve a genuine public purpose. In addition, tax-exempt financing combined with Accelerated Cost Recovery and the investment tax credit can result in unintended tax benefits.

Corporate Minimum Tax. Corporations currently must pay a minimum tax, in addition to regular income tax, equal to 15 percent of certain tax preferences. This "add-on" minimum tax is not limited to those corporations that pay very little or no regular income tax. It may apply to any corporation that has reduced its tax liability through the use of designated tax preferences.

The Administration proposes to repeal the add-on minimum tax, effective January 1, 1983, and to replace it with an alternative minimum tax that would apply only to those corporations that pay very low regular rates of tax. Corporations will be required to pay the greater of their regular income tax or an alternative tax equal to 15 percent of their alternative tax base in excess of \$50,000. This alternative tax base consists of regular taxable income plus certain tax preferences. The investment tax credit will not be allowed against the:

Other Tax Code Change. Technical changes will be proposed to close other tax loopholes.

IMPROVED TAX COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT

withholding on Interest and Dividends. Currently no tax is withheld on interest and dividends paid to domestic taxpayers, although taxes are withheld from wages. Companies that pay interest and dividends are required to report the amount of interest and dividends to both the IRS and the recipients. About 9 percent to 16 percent of taxable interest and dividends are currently not reported, while the comparable figure for wages and salaries is only 2 percent to 3 percent.

Under the proposal, 5 percent of payments of taxable interest and dividends would be withheld. Withholding and reporting, where feasible, would be extended to U.S. government securities. Corporations and nontaxable individuals filing exemption certificates would be exempt from withholding. Taxpayers aged 65 or older with a tax liability of \$500 (\$1,000 on a joint return) or less would also be exempt from withholding. This will exempt elderly couples earning less than \$14,907 in 1983.

corporate Income Tax Payment Speedup. Corporations generally are required to pay at least 80 percent of their current year tax liability in estimated payments due on the 15th day of the 4th, 6th, 9th, and 12th months of their taxable year. The remaining liability is payable in two equal installments due on the 15th day of the 3rd and 6th months following the close of their taxable year. An exception to the estimated tax payment rules permits corporations to base their estimated tax payments on the full amount of their prior year's tax liability. For large corporations, the estimated payments must be at least 65 percent of their current year's liability (75 percent in 1983 and 80 percent thereafter).

In order to collect corporate taxes on a more current basis, the Administration proposes, for tax years beginning after 1982, to increase the required estimated tax payment from 80 percent to 90 percent of the current year's liability and to require that all remaining liability be paid in one payment on the 15th day of the 3rd month following the close of the tax year. In addition, large corporations making estimated tax payments based on prior year's liability will be required to pay at least 85 percent of their current year's liability in 1985 and 90 percent thereafter.

- o IRS Staff Increases. In order to improve the efficiency of enforcement and collection activities, the Administration proposes to increase the IRS enforcement staff by more than 5,000 persons.
- Other Provisions. Additional technical measures will be proposed to facilitate TRS collection and enforcement efforts.
