I. PURPOSE/ISSUES

This meeting is to discuss the following issues re pending Voting Rights issues:

- 1) Whether to "nudge" Senator Thurmond toward acceptance of a compromise position that has been developed by Senator Dole. (The compromise relates to "Section 2" -- and the provisions of the House Bill that could be construed to require proportional representation.)
- 2) Whether to support the compromise (which is likely to pass overwhelmingly) -- with or without Senator Thurmond's having done so.
- 3) Whether to limit support to support for the Section 2 compromise alone (leaving opportunity for possible "bail-out" improvement on the Senate floor).
- 4) When and how to announce support for the compromise (if accepted). Note: Senators Dole, Mathias, and Kennedy are scheduled to hold a press conference on this at 4:00 p.m. today.

PURPOSE I.

To review the results of the breakdown of the recent budget discussions and to discuss Administration and Republican Congressional strategy.

II. BACKGROUND

In an effort to break the stalemate over budget proceedings in the Congress, bipartisan discussions have been conducted for the past month. Those discussions, which the President reviewed with the GOP Leadership on April 20, failed to produce a compromise package.

As Congress prepares to proceed with legislative action on the First Concurrent Budget Resolution, it will be helpful to discuss strategy and options with the Republican Leadership. It is essential to maintain a cohesive Republican legislative effort, and this meeting will provide an opportunity to seek advice and to discuss how the Administration and House and Senate Republicans should proceed as the Budget Committee begins markup of the Budget Resolution.

In addition to expressing the desire to continue a close working relationship with these Republican Leaders, it is important that you encourage the House and Senate Republicans to work together as this budget process evolves.

TALKING POINTS

- -- Indicate that when you last met with this group you were hopeful that there would be a budget compromise.
- -- Express your disappointment at the lack of agreement on a budget compromise and mention that it was clear that the Democratic Leadership was not interested in reaching an agreement.
- -- Express optimism that the Administration will be able to work with the Congress to fashion an acceptable budget.
- -- Stress that Republican unity is essential, if we expect to be successful in the budget process and in the fall elections.
- -- Thank the Republican Leadership for their support and help during these very difficult and sensitive negotiations and ask for their advice as to our strategy for dealing with the budget.
- -- Following the discussion, again point out how important it is for Republicans to work together on these critical economic issues. Stress the importance of House and Senate Republicans maintaining a united effort in face of the partisan actions by Congressional Democrats. Encourage the Members to keep in touch and to share their observations with you and your staff.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss the First Concurrent Budget Resolution.

II. BACKGROUND

The Senate Budget Committee will begin markup of the First Concurrent Budget Resolution on Tuesday, May 4 at 9:30 a.m. Chairman Domenici plans to report the Resolution no later than Friday, May 7 at noon. Domenici is anxious to comply with the May 15 deadline on the Budget Resolution. The Committee faces a number of difficult decisions, particularly in view of the fact that we have been unable to reach accord on a budget package with the Democratic leadership in the Congress. the absence of a bipartisan package, Domenici has expressed concern about the possibility of bringing his Committee together on a viable budget document. He not only faces the possibility of strong opposition from the Democratic members of the Budget Committee but he may also have trouble holding his own Republican troops together. Domenici and the other Republican members of the Budget Committee will be seeking quidance from the Administration on such issues as COLAs, revenue enhancers, and defense. In order that we do not lose control of the budget issue, it is important that you give these members a clear understanding of where you are on the budget issue and encourage their support and cooperation.

TAPING: NATIONAL CABLE TV CONVENTION MAY 3, 1982

Good afternoon to all of you in Las Vegas. I want to thank you for inviting me to speak to you in person today, but with Vice President Bush overseas someone had to stay in Washington and mind the store. And in the midst of the current budget wrangle, it's quite a job trying to keep all those hands out of the till.

But even though I'm in Washington, I'm still with you in spirit, because the spirit of cable television is something I heartily applaud. At one time cable mainly offered viewers clear reception; today it offers a clear alternative, and what a successful alternative it is. With 250,000 new subscribers each month, cable must qualify as one of America's fastest growing industries. This growth is a genuine tribute to your ingenuity and vitality.

I sometimes find it hard to comprehend the sheer scope of your achievement. As you may know, I started out and brownesser at radio station WHO in Des Moines, Iowa. We programmed only one channel and that seemed like a hock of a big job. But you're programming between 12 and 108 channels. And I'm told cable systems are now in 13,000 communities, which means you probably serve more sommunities than I had listeners 2.4

That growth will continue, for in the last few years you've seen an end to rules that restricted you from vying with other technologies. The days when regulations kept you from competing

are gone. Decisions like those should be made in the marketplace, not by regulators in Washington.

As fast as you're moving, it's hard to imagine where the cable industry will be in 5 to 10 years. But an industry as devoted as you are to the free market is well-equipped to meet the challenges of the 80s. And while I am at it, let me congratulate John Saeman (See-man), your new chairman. I know he will provide you with expert guidance in the next year, just as Al Gilliland (Gill-a-land) has in the past year.

So again, the best of success to you in your endeavors and my best wishes to you all.

TAPING OF RADIO SPOT: PRIVATE SECTOR INITIATIVES MAY 3, 1982

Greetings. All Americans -- Republicans, Democrats and Independents alike -- can agree that people should be encouraged to help their neighbors, especially in time of need. Lending a helping hand is basic to the American character. A century ago it took the form of barn raisings and other community activities, when everyone joined in to help a family in trouble.

Our country has grown since those days, but the American people have not lost those qualities of generosity and neighborly concern. This is the reason that last year we established a Presidential Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives to make people aware of all the good things that can be done.

Complex and sophisticated as things are today, there is still a vital role for individuals with compassion. So many social and charitable organizations with worthwhile programs need your help. Your financial contribution is always appreciated, but just as important, they can use your time and energy. Getting directly involved in helping others is a rewarding experience and there's enough to be done for everyone to play a part.

There may be no barns to raise in your community, but together we can raise the quality of life of the less fortunate. We can raise the level of good will by letting others know we care. And while nobody can do everything, each of us can do something. So today I ask that you take time to think about

getting involved.

TAPING: PRIVATE SECTOR INITIATIVES MAY 3, 1982

My fellow Americans, I want to talk to you about something I have believed in for a long time -- our Nation's unique tradition of volunteer spirit, of partnership, of neighbor helping neighbor.

As you know, we have launched a nationwide effort to tap this vast reservoir of talent and concern. It's called the President's Task Force on Private Sector Initiatives. Bill Verity is the Chairman, and since December 2 when the Task Force was announced, Bill has been working on this project full time. He and his task force have a big job ahead of them, but I know they will be successful. Let me share with you some of the goals of the Task Force.

Basically, the Task Force is encouraging citizens to find out where needs exist in their own communities and then organize to meet these needs. The response has been as heartening as it is exciting. And people are getting involved, not because the government is becoming less involved, but because it is healthy to have citizen participation in the community.

There are so many things that can be done and so many people out there are doing them. There's the union that builds special seating equipment for physically disabled children; the citizens in Midland, Texas who repair the homes of the elderly and the poor, the company that provides job training to refugees; and

even one organization, founded by a policeman, that makes the dreams of the terminally ill come true.

Your friends and neighbors are doing these wonderful things. The American people perform some \$62 billion worth of labor every year for volunteer organizations across the country. And that's in addition to the \$47 billion they contribute in cash to charitable and religious organizations. Sometimes we forget that there are 425,000 private organizations out there providing public services in job training and placement, health care, transportation, education, housing, nutrition services and youth activities. You can help Bill Verity and his Task Force spread these good works.

I am asking you to seek out models for private sector initiatives -- in schools, churches, civic groups, businesses, unions, foundations -- and tell us about them. We would like to spread these good examples so that other communities can benefit from them.

The Task Force has put together this form [show form] to make the job easier for you. When you return the completed form it will be entered into our project bank and will be available to other organizations.

- Write to us about obstacles that the government has placed in the way of Private Sector Initiatives and we'll work to remove them.

- Work with your governors and mayors and urge them to form local private sector task forces, if they haven't already done so.
- Put private sector initiatives on your work agendas this year.
- Talk to your boards of directors, your local community leaders and urge them to form a community partnership.
- Encourage your local newspapers, radio, and television stations to publicize exemplary volunteer or community activities.

We want to rebuild America -- not from the government down, but from the people up - all of us together as partners, community by community. I'm asking you to join us. Join us to help rediscover America -- not the America bounded by the Potomac River, but the America beyond it. The America whose initiative, ingenuity and industry have made our country the envy of the world. The America whose rich traditions of generosity began with single acts of neighbor caring for neighbor.
