REMARKS: SWEARING-IN CEREMONY FOR GENERAL VESSEY
JUNE 21, 1982

First let me congratulate General Vessey, our Nation's tenth Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. And he's a 10 all right. When I announced General Vessey's appointment last March, I referred to him as a soldier's soldier. That characterization was on the mark but also an understatement.

After being called to active duty in 1941, Jack Vessey received a battlefield commission at the Anzio beachhead in 1944. He commanded forces in the U.S., Europe, Korea, Thailand, and Vietnam. Still given the way things are in this town, I have a feeling his new assignment will be the most hair raising of them all. General, with all the flak you'll be getting, it might be a good idea to start wearing a helmet again.

But our new man possesses that unique blend of the seasoned combat leader and the perceptive strategist -- a blend that makes him a true soldier-statesman and worthy of the title "Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff."

General Vessey, in selecting a man of your caliber, we also honor your profession and all those with whom you serve. And perhaps this is a good time to recognize General Bolte (Boltee), who was your division commander in Italy during WW II and who is here. General Bolte, thank you for turning out such a fine soldier as Jack Vessey.

In my speech at the United Nations last Thursday, I reminded the world of the words of a former Army Chief of Staff, Dwight

Eisenhower, who said that our foreign policy is not difficult to state: We are for peace, first, last and always. The truth of those words cannot be challenged, but it is especially fitting for a former soldier to have said them.

No one wants peace more than the soldier. For the soldier understands better than anyone the pain and destruction of war. And I know General Vessey must carry inside him the sorrows of buddies lost on foreign fields and the memories of young men under his command who never returned home.

But, as the General would tell you, peace cannot be secured by words or hopes alone. The U.S. has a dual approach to international stability. On the one hand, we are committed to strengthening our defense readiness and military capabilities. At the same time, we also hope to enhance our security through negotiations on intermediate range missiles, on strategic nuclear weapons, on the prevention of accidental war, and on conventional force reductions. I'm proud of that agenda for peace.

General Vessey, as my principal military advisor, I will look to you and the other members of the Joint Chiefs to counsel me on how best to achieve our unselfish goals. But my initial command to you is this: Keep us strong and keep us ready, so that we may keep the peace. Good luck and congratulations.

I. PURPOSE

To thank the Members in this group for their efforts at developing the budget compromise which eventually won on the House Floor and to urge their support for the Budget Resolution as reported by the Conference Committee.

II. BACKGROUND

The Members in the budget working group began meeting upon the unsuccessful conclusion of the budget negotiations between the White House and the House Democratic Leadership in an attempt to develop a bipartisan compromise that could win on the House Floor. The group consisted of the Republican Leadership, representatives of "Gypsy Moth" Republicans, and representatives of "Boll Weevil" Democrats.

The working group met approximately six times, for many hours, in an effort to reconcile and reach a compromise on the interests of the disparate groups which were represented. All of the Members made sacrifices in an attempt to compromise when faced with difficult decisions on issues of particular importance to their districts or regions.

At the conclusion of the first series of meetings conducted by this group, the budget compromise which was developed was defeated on the House Floor. However, an expanded budget group began another series of long meetings and further sacrifices were made with the result being a budget compromise that eventually won a majority of votes.

Throughout the budget negotiations, the working group sought to develop a compromise which was acceptable to the President. During consideration of the Budget Resolution in the House, these Members also worked very hard to retain the essentials

of the President's program by soliciting votes against other proposals and by working to deliver the votes of other "Gypsy Moths" and "Boll Weevils" for the bipartisan compromise. The combined efforts of these Members resulted in the passage of a budget resolution which was acceptable to the President.

BRIEF REMARKS: SENATORIAL TRUST RECEPTION
JUNE 21, 1982

First, let me welcome you, the members of the Senatorial Trust, and thank you for what you've been doing. This may surprise you, but for many years the U.S. Senate was not on the top of my hit parade. Session after session, it voted to spend more, tax more, regulate more, and meddle more in the lives of American citizens.

I'm told that Henry Adams once wrote, "If I ever turn anarchist, it will be for the fun of murdering a senator." Obviously, that never crossed my mind . . . well, not often . . . but I think we all felt the frustration.

Then in 1980, you helped to give us the first Republican Senate in 25 years. What a wonderful gift that was to find in our election day stocking. And I cannot tell you how absolutely essential and central it is to what we're trying to accomplish for this country. Without a Republican Senate, without Howard Baker as the Senate Majority Leader, we'd probably be getting the Cabinet confirmed about now. So let me say thanks right here to our Republican Senators and our Republican leadership. They've done a wonderful job.

I know you are working hard to keep that Republican majority, and there is no higher priority this year. From my experience over the last 17 months, one thing I can say for sure -- the more Republican the Senate is, the more responsible it is.

And while I'm on the subject of responsibility, let me bring you up to date on what's happening with the budget. Although we didn't get everything we wanted, I was pleased the Senate-House Conference Committee reached an agreement. Now it is up to both bodies to pass the resolution and then for the individual committees to implement it. It's in the committees, especially in the House, that the whole thing may come unravelled by those pushing their special interests and pet projects. But I want you to know eagle-eye Reagan is going to be sitting here watching the show, and you can be sure I'll let out a yell -- or maybe a television address -- if the Congress returns to business as usual.

There are tough votes ahead for our people in the Senate, and they will need your support. We need to give them some pats on the back and encouragement for the election campaign this fall. A Republican majority simply must be returned to the Senate so that we can carry out our programs. The progress we have made so far will evaporate if we do not have that Republican edge, and I know you will help us keep it.

I was thinking a minute ago that this crowd is so supportive and so friendly, when the job here is over, I might just run for the Senate myself. But gatherings like this get my political juices flowing; so why don't I come down there, shake a few hands, and say thank you more personally.
