I. PURPOSE

To respond to a request by Senator David Boren for a private meeting with the President on the subject of the economy, and also to discuss the tax bill.

II. BACKGROUND

Although a relatively junior member of the Senate, Senator David Boren (D-Oklahoma) has quickly gained influence and credibility, particularly in terms of his role in establishing the so-called "Nunn/Boren" group. This group consists of approximately 14 conservative Democratic Senators who have often been extremely helpful to the Administration on matters of major legislative importance.

In late March, during negotiations on the Budget Resolution, Boren had asked to meet privately with the President on economic issues, promising that he would not use such an opportunity for press advantage. A meeting was scheduled for April 1, but due to a last minute schedule conflict, we had to cancel it.

Boren is extremely concerned about the shape of the economy and has mentioned fears of a depression. He has discussed his concerns with Mr. Holmes Tuttle, and Mr. Tuttle agreed with Boren. You should bear in mind that Boren voted against passage of this year's Budget Resolution.

Boren serves as a member of the Senate Finance Committee which has reported tax legislation to increase revenues by \$21.1 billion in FY 83. Three-fourths of these revenues will be raised through compliance measures and closing tax loopholes. Though Boren has indicated a strong belief that major economic issues should be addressed in a bi-partisan fashion, he nonetheless joined all other Democrats on the Finance Committee to vote against reporting the tax bill. He did, however, vote against Senator Long's motion

to delay the third year. Boren has repeatedly voted for the third year although he expresses reservations about this provision and threatens to vote against it at some point. At one time, Boren suggested deferring the third year or establishing a trigger mechanism whereby the third year would only be allowed if the economy had improved by that time.

Senator Russell Long is working hard to get all Democrats in the Senate to oppose the tax bill. Thus far, he has failed to get such a commitment from all Democrats, but he does have a credible group of supporters who could cause us difficulties when the bill comes up for Senate debate on Tuesday, July 20. It would be very helpful if you could convince Senator Boren of the need to support this legislation.

To discuss their concerns about housing assistance in general and specifically the Evans/Corcoran initiative that was introduced last March. Congressmen Evans and Corcoran will attempt to convince the President that their proposal can assist the housing market while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

II. BACKGROUND

Believing that the Democrats would succeed with a stimulus proposal that would cost the Treasury billions of dollars, in March Tom Evans and Tom Corcoran sought to amend the urgent supplemental with their own stimulus program to be financed by transferring up to \$1 billion from the Synthetic Fuels Corporation to provide emergency assistance to home buyers.

The Administration adopted a "neutral" position on the Evans/Corcoran amendment, believing that their endeavors to obtain a rule allowing them to offer the amendment would fail. They did.

Both Evans and Corcoran, and 129 other Republicans, voted to sustain your veto of the urgent supplemental that contained money to buy down mortgage interest rates. They believe that they did so at some political risk and that the "appearance of fiscal responsibility could very easily pale in the face of a determined campaign to characterize this vote as being 'against housing' and 'against jobs'."

It is likely that another Democrat-sponsored housing bailout proposal will be introduced on the next supplemental.

Tom Evans is the member-at-large from Delaware and a member of the Core Group. He is a member of the House Banking Committee. Tom Corcoran is a 3rd termer from Illinois' 15th district, which includes Ottawa and Aurora. He is a member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee.

This year's will be the 24th observance of Captive Nations Week and the $\underline{\text{first time}}$ a signing ceremony for the proclamation has been held. This fact, along with the strong and forthright proclamation issued last year, is being very well received in America's ethnic communities and is perceived as a visible demonstration of your concern for their interests and concerns.

Most of those in the audience will be Americans of Eastern European ancestry. Many of them have experienced, either first hand or through their friends and relatives, the harshness of communist forms of government.

On the dais will be members of the House and Senate leadership and several former Congressmen and former Senators who were among the original sponsors of the Captive Nations Week Proclamation. The Vice President is also expected to join you.

MEETING WITH SENATOR DAVID BOREN (D-OKLAHOMA)

DATE: Monday, July 19, 1982 LOCATION: The Oval Office TIME: 3:00 p.m. (15 minutes)

I. PURPOSE

To respond to a request by Senator David Boren for a private meeting with the President on the subject of the economy, and also to discuss the tax bill.

II. BACKGROUND

Although a relatively junior member of the Senate, Senator David Boren (D-Oklahoma) has quickly gained influence and credibility, particularly in terms of his role in establishing the so-called "Nunn/Boren" group. This group consists of approximately 14 conservative Democratic Senators who have often been extremely helpful to the Administration on matters of major legislative importance.

In late March, during negotiations on the Budget Resolution, Boren had asked to meet privately with the President on economic issues, promising that he would not use such an opportunity for press advantage. A meeting was scheduled for April 1, but due to a last minute schedule conflict, we had to cancel it.

Boren is extremely concerned about the shape of the economy and has mentioned fears of a depression. He has discussed his concerns with Mr. Holmes Tuttle, and Mr. Tuttle agreed with Boren. You should bear in mind that Boren voted against passage of this year's Budget Resolution.

Boren serves as a member of the Senate Finance Committee which has reported tax legislation to increase revenues by \$21.1 billion in FY 83. Three-fourths of these revenues will be raised through compliance measures and closing tax loopholes. Though Boren has indicated a strong belief that major economic issues should be addressed in a bi-partisan fashion, he nonetheless joined all other Democrats on the Finance Committee to vote against reporting the tax bill. He did, however, vote against Senator Long's motion

to delay the third year. Boren has repeatedly voted for the third year although he expresses reservations about this provision and threatens to vote against it at some point. At one time, Boren suggested deferring the third year or establishing a trigger mechanism whereby the third year would only be allowed if the economy had improved by that time.

Senator Russell Long is working hard to get all Democrats in the Senate to oppose the tax bill. Thus far, he has failed to get such a commitment from all Democrats, but he does have a credible group of supporters who could cause us difficulties when the bill comes up for Senate debate on Tuesday, July 20. It would be very helpful if you could convince Senator Boren of the need to support this legislation.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH SENATOR DAVID BOREN (D-OKLAHOMA)

- -- Tell Senator Boren how glad you are that the two of you finally have an opportunity to get together. Express your regret that your previously scheduled meeting had to be cancelled.
- -- Tell Boren you have been greatly impressed by his role as a key player on major economic issues and that you are interested in hearing his thoughts on our general economic situation. (Boren should take this opportunity to express his views and recommendations on the economic situation.)
- -- At some point in your discussion, bring up the matter of the tax bill. Tell Boren you are convinced that the bill reported by the Senate Finance Committee will produce a real downward trend in deficit reduction and improve the equity of the tax system.
- -- Stress the fact that the Finance bill achieves over 75 percent of the revenue increases through compliance and base broadening measures.
- -- Tell Boren you are firmly committed to the third year of the individual tax cut and also the indexing provisions which were enacted last year. These provisions will serve to alleviate the tax burdens among individuals and at the same time, provide the psychological benefits of consistency as a means to encourage personal savings and investment.

- -- Assure Boren that you do not want to raise taxes any more than he does, and that you do have some reservations about certain items in this bill. However, it is a good bill, and a positive step toward bringing order to our economy. Make the point to Boren that you hope there can be a bi-partisan effort to pass this bill, and seek his own support.
- -- Thank Boren for coming down to meet with you. Tell him you appreciate his input and hope you can work together on these and other legislative items.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss their concerns about housing assistance in general and specifically the Evans/Corcoran initiative that was introduced last March. Congressmen Evans and Corcoran will attempt to convince the President that their proposal can assist the housing market while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

II. BACKGROUND

Believing that the Democrats would succeed with a stimulus proposal that would cost the Treasury billions of dollars, in March Tom Evans and Tom Corcoran sought to amend the urgent supplemental with their own stimulus program to be financed by transferring up to \$1 billion from the Synthetic Fuels Corporation to provide emergency assistance to home buyers.

The Administration adopted a "neutral" position on the Evans/Corcoran amendment, believing that their endeavors to obtain a rule allowing them to offer the amendment would fail. They did.

Both Evans and Corcoran, and 129 other Republicans, voted to sustain your veto of the urgent supplemental that contained money to buy down mortgage interest rates. They believe that they did so at some political risk and that the "appearance of fiscal responsibility could very easily pale in the face of a determined campaign to characterize this vote as being 'against housing' and 'against jobs'."

It is likely that another Democrat-sponsored housing bailout proposal will be introduced on the next supplemental.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH CONGRESSMEN TOM EVANS (R-DE) AND TOM CORCORAN (R-IL)

- jobs opportunities but that you believe strongly that subsidizing credit now for any entity will work against economic recovery.
- -- Say that you are trying to cope with the tenacity of the high level of interest rates that are hurting not only the housing industry, but this nation's entire economy.
- -- Say that you believe that a responsible budget and reduced deficits are the only way to put an end to high interest rates.
- -- Tell them that accepting one bailout will open the floodgates to others for thrifts, agriculture, autos, and small business and will cost this country many billions of dollars.
- -- Ask them what incentives would exist for any financial institution to begin lowering interest rates if the government agrees to continue to subsidize higher rates?
- -- Ask them to stick with the programs they ve worked so hard for and policies that will provide a predictable and stronger economic climate, which will force interest rates down.

Tom Evans is the member-at-large from Delaware and a member of the Core Group. He is a member of the House Banking Committee. Tom Corcoran is a 3rd termer from Illinois' 15th district, which includes Ottawa and Aurora. He is a member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee.

THE WHITE HOUSE, THE FIRST LADY'S GARDEN

I. PURPOSE

This reception is being held to congratulate the members of the United States Davis Cup Tennis Team and the members of the United States Ski Team for their outstanding performances in international competitions.

II. BACKGROUND

The United States Davis Cup Tennis Team, coached by Arthur Ashe, won the 1981 World Championship in Cincinnati on December 13, 1981 by defeating the team from Argentina. The Davis Cup Tournament is an international team tennis competition in which teams from 30 nations compete in a series of elimination matches throughout the year, culminating with the final championship match at the end of the year. This year, the American team advanced to the semi-finals by defeating the Swedish team earlier this month. In that match, John McEnroe brought victory to the American team in a grueling 6½ hour match. The American team will now play the Australian team in October. The

winner of that match will play either France or Chile for the championship in November.

The United States Ski Team competes internationally in both alpine (downhill) and cross-country sking. This past year, the American team had its best year ever in representing our country abroad. The American team, overall, placed third in the World Championships this year, behind Austria and Switzerland. Many individuals on the American team distinguished themselves with historic firsts: Phil Mahre won the overall men's World Cup for the second straight year; his brother, Steve Mahre, became the first American to win a gold medal; Christin Cooper became the first American woman to win three medals (two silver and one bronze); and, Bill Koch won the first World Cup nordic title ever for the United States. With these same athletes, the U.S. Ski Team anticipates a good showing in the 1984 Winter Olympics.

Following this presentation, members of the Davis Cup Team will take their places in front of the grape arbor to be photographed with the PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN.

Following this group photograph, a presentation of a Davis Cup medallion and a warm-up suit will be made to MRS. REAGAN, and a presentation of a warm-up suit will be made to the PRESIDENT.

RECEPTION FOR DAVIS CUP AND U.S. SKI TEAMS JULY 19, 1982

Nancy and I are especially pleased to welcome you to the White House, our national home, this afternoon. I realize many of you have broken training to be here and we appreciate it. We ask, however, if you feel a sudden urge to run windsprints, please just avoid the rose garden.

No one belongs on these grounds or in these halls more than you. Someone once said youth was America's oldest tradition, but I would amend that to be youth striving for excellence. You live that tradition. You have worn your country's colors in contests around the globe. Setting world records and winning world championships, you have made your countrymen proud. In you we have looked for courage, excellence and honor, and in you we have found it.

Each of you has had moments of glory in your careers. But one recent moment typifies the inspiration all of you have given to our people. I'm sure you can guess that moment in tennis I'm thinking of.

After six and a half hours of play, the largest indoor crowd in Davis Cup history had been whipped to a frenzy, stomping and shouting, "USA, USA." They say the crowd couldn't sit down and the players could barely stand up. It had been the longest match

John McEnroe ever played: 79 games in five sets of grueling, exquisite tennis.

"In the fifth set I was feeling it," John said, "but I hung in there." That was John's moment. As physically, emotionally and mentally drained as he was, John reached within himself for the talent and tenacity to persevere.

We won the game and will go on to face Australia in September. But at least one newspaper reported that by the time it was over, the game didn't seem as important. The reporter wrote, "It seemed they were fighting for excellence."

On behalf of all Americans, I want to thank John and each of you for the inspiration you give us, on snow as well as on the courts. If every American strives for individual excellence, we can find it together as a nation. Watching you, we renew our faith in ourselves and our country.

It is a thrill to have the Davis Cup here at the White House, and to celebrate with you your tennis and skiing accomplishments. Your country is very proud of you. We thank you for the honor you bring us, wish you luck in the future, and leave you with a very American challenge: that you continue to live up to the best and the highest standards you know.
