them up the Grand Staircase and into the State Dining Room where they will be served juice.

8:10 a.m. Guests are encouraged by butlers to take their

seats for breakfast.

8:15 a.m. Breakfast is served.

The Vice President will make opening remarks during breakfast, to be followed by other speakers.

9:00 a.m. THE PRESIDENT arrives the State Floor via the elevator and proceeds through the Cross Hall doors into the State Dining Room where he will be announced.

He will proceed to the podium just inside the Cross Hall doors and will make brief remarks.

At the conclusion of his remarks, the PRESIDENT will proceed back through the Cross Hall doors and will take his place in front of the Blue Room doors for the receiving line. (The Blue Room doors will be closed.)

Thank you very much, and good morning. Although I haven't had a chance to meet many of you individually yet, rest assured that I've taken a personal interest in each of your appointments. I know you're on the job, and the good work you are doing. I'm very grateful.

About this time in any administration, priorities have a way of getting confused. I don't want that to happen to us. Never lose sight of one crucial point: all of us are temporary stewards of American Government, in office for a brief time to carry out some very important goals. Our quest is to return our Government and our economy to the American people. We of this Administration are not here to become bureaucrats — advocates of the status quo. We are here to return Government to the positive, efficient and limited role it was meant to play in our lives.

To achieve the renewal of America, we must renew America's values of family, work, and neighborhood. We must restore our moral climate at home and strengthen the prospects for peace in the world. Our people must have incentive again to work and save and invest. The world must be sure of both our peaceful intentions and our willingness and ability to protect the peace.

Our goal in all this is a healthy and strong America, morally, economically and militarily.

To receive a \$50 million check from the Overseas Private Investment Corporation.

II. BACKGROUND

The Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) will present to you a \$50 million check to go to the U.S. Treasury from their record profits this year.

As you know, OPIC is a profit-making agency that promotes economic development in developing countries by encouraging private American investment through the issuance of political risk insurance, loan guaranties, and direct loans to small businesses. During your Administration, OPIC has reached new levels of growth through a focused business strategy, an accelerated marketing program and prudent financial management. The success of this approach enables OPIC to make this return of capital -- the first in OPIC's history.

OPIC officials estimate that by the close of the fiscal year on September 30, the agency will have issued some \$4.0 billion in political risk insurance over the past 15 months, a record volume nearly equal to the previous five years combined. At the end of FY 1981, OPIC reported a new income of \$76.2 million. Today's return of \$50 million represents nearly half of the \$106.2 million of Congressional appropriations received by OPIC when it began operations.

Craig, and all of you associated with OPIC, please accept my heartfelt thanks, and I know I say that not just for everyone here, but also for American taxpayers and the recipients of your good works.

I was heartened by your comments, because, yes, I do believe the private sector is the best engine for economic growth and opportunity in the developing world. I said before I left for Cancun last year that the problems of hunger and poverty are deeply rooted; and we would resist the idea that massive transfers of wealth can somehow produce new wealth. Our message was and remains: The road to prosperity and human fulfillment is paved with economic freedom and individual incentives. The proof is in what you have accomplished, and I'd like to think you've only just begun.

The other point you've proved is that it is possible to introduce efficiencies and run Government on a business-like basis. I hope your example will set a trend for other Government agencies. Of course, not all of them can make a profit.

My gosh, \$50 million. Don Regan, are you here? Maybe I better give this check to you. If I put it in my pocket and Nancy sends this suit to the cleaners, we may never have a chance to balance the budget.

I. PURPOSE

The Cabinet will receive a briefing from Jim Baker, Ed Rollins, and Dick Wirthlin regarding the political outlook. Following this briefing, the Cabinet Council on Human Resources will take up the issue of Indian Policy.

II. BACKGROUND

The political outlook will provide important frames of reference for activity conducted from now through Armistice Day.

Indian Policy Issues have been developed by a working group chaired by Kenneth Smith, Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs in the Department of Interior. Two major Indian gatherings are occurring in the upcoming two weeks. Secretary Watt is speaking to one of the groups. If the Administration sets forth its Indian Policy at this Cabinet meeting, the policy can be transmitted at these meetings by Administration spokesmen. There are five specifics issues for discussion: support of a new Congressional resolution which supports tribal self-government and the government-to-government relationship; request for expanded membership of the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations to include representatives of Indian Tribes; move the White House liaison for federally-recognized tribes from the Office of Public Liaison to the Office of Intergovernmental Relations; establishment of a Presidential Advisory Commission on Indian Reservation Economies; and support direct funding to Indian tribes under Title XX Social Services block grants to states. These issues are discussed more fully in the attached briefing memorandum.
