II. BACKGROUND

The House and Senate recessed late Friday night (2:30 a.m., Saturday) after completing action on several major bills. They will return November 29, the Monday after Thanksgiving, for a lame-duck session to consider Appropriations bills and, perhaps, other items.

Among the many items approved on Friday by the Congress for your signature were the Job Training Bill, the Export Trading Companies legislation and the Banking Deregulation measure--- each a major Administration priority. II. BACKGROUND

Patriarch Diodoros, elected in February, 1981, to head the Jerusalem Patriarchate (one of the five ancient Christian Patriarchates) arrived in the United States on September 16th for a six-week pastoral visit, his first to this country. PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: RECEPTION FOR INTERNATIONAL CHAPTER OF THE
YOUNG PRESIDENTS' ORGANIZATION
TUESDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1982

Thank you and welcome to the White House. I understand that to be a member of this organization you have to become president of a substantial concern before the age of 40. I think I missed out by about 30 years. I know for certain your enterprises are in better financial shape than mine . . . Say, do you suppose I could arrange a merger with Bendix?

I've always thought that there were three kinds of people in this world: those who make things happen, those who watch things happen, and those who ask "what happened?". All of you obviously are in the first category. But I would like to tell you a little of what's happened in Washington, especially in regard to the economy.

From our very first day in office, we've been working to clean up an economic mess that had been years in the making. The inflation rate was in double digits by January 1981 when we checked in here. Interest rates had climbed from less than 7 percent in 1976 to 21.5 percent. Productivity was dropping. The savings rate was dropping. Taxes, unfortunately, did not drop. They were smothering the incentives of individuals and businesses -- and I know incentive is word you well understand. Taxes actually doubled in the 5 years before we arrived.

Our first priority was to break the back of inflation because it touches on nearly every other economic problem we

faced. Well, we've done it. We have cut inflation by more than half; since January it has averaged 5.1 percent. The prime interest rate isn't 21.5 percent anymore. It's down to 13 or 13.5 percent. We've cut taxes and people are saving more.

Earlier I mentioned determination. Right now we are paying the price for those in Washington who did not have determination. Instead of facing problems, they spent and spent, taxed and taxed, and borrowed and borrowed. The result? Nearly 11 million of our people are out of work. I can't tell you how painful it is to me that each day millions of Americans who want to work cannot find it.

We all wish that there were some quick and easy cure for this terrible economic illness that was so long in the making. One thing is certain -- we can't afford to go back to the bankrupt policies that got us into this tragedy in the first place. All that would lead to is more unemployment, more taxes, more inflation and more, more, more economic problems. Those who want to return to the policies of the past are lost in the wilderness. They are so disoriented they don't know what to do except repeat their previous mistakes. They would take our economy deeper into the woods if we followed them. Well, I don't believe the American people want to return to the scene of the disaster.

That is one reason they want the balanced budget amendment. Yet the will of the people has been thwarted by a liberal

minority in the Congress who know such an amendment would mean an end to their big-spending, business-as-usual ways.

As I said in Virginia the other day, to those who are faint-hearted and unsure, I have this message: If you're afraid of the future, then get out of the way, stand aside. The people of this country are ready to move again. They are ready to move with a force and vigor you Young Presidents can appreciate. Thank you.
