I. PURPOSE:

To participate in a unique teleconference set up to explain the new Job Training Partnership Act and emphasize your commitment to working toward solving our unemployment problems.

II. BACKGROUND:

On October 13 you signed the Job Training Partnership Act which calls on state and local officials to work together with the private sector to train some one million Americans each year. This teleconference is sponsored jointly by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Alliance of Business. It will be beamed to 37 cities where audiences will be made up of Chamber and NAB officials, local business people as well as local officials. The entire program will last some two hours, although your participation will be for approximately 20 minutes at the beginning of the program. After you leave, there will be a number of panel discussions that will include such speakers as your Assistant Secretary of Labor Agrisani, Governor Richard Thornberg and Mayor William Hudnet.

III. PARTICIPANTS:

IV. PRESS PLAN:

A White House press pool will accompany the President and will be watching the program on a monitor downstairs. Other press will also be watching on monitors in the building.

V. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS:

When you arrive in the studio, the program will begin with a taped opening. During this 5 minute portion, Mark Goode will brief you on the set-up, show you cue cards, etc. Meryl Comer will introduce you. You will make approximately 8 minutes of remarks (on teleprompter) and then take 3 to 4 questions from among the 37 sites across the country. Meryl Comer will introduce the questioner and his location. You will hear the question on an audio feedback and a cue card will list the questioner's name and his location. At the end of 20 minutes, Meryl will thank you and you will depart.

VI. REMARKS:

Opening remarks submitted separately by Speechwriters

Areas of expected questions plus suggested responses are attached.

1. Mr. President, how will the Job Training Partnership Act help to reduce unemployment?
  - o Economic growth creates jobs; a training program, by itself, can't.
  - o But, 40 percent of the program's resources will go to training disadvantaged youth -- the population group with the highest unemployment rate. Improving their job skills can help reduce unemployment.
  - o Our program is designed to give young and poor people the skills that many of them now lack so they can fill real jobs in the private sector.
  - o Some of those jobs are now going unfilled because of the so-called "skills-gap"; an expanding economy in the coming years will create millions more.
  - o Also, the job training program is designed to be run in close coordination with local businesses and local governments.
  - o This will help insure that trainees are not just given skills that Washington decides are needed in the national job market, but skills for jobs that actually exist or are expected to open up in the local community.

2. Mr. President, the unemployment rate is presently 10.4% and there are over 11.6 million unemployed people. What can a training program do when there are so few jobs available?
- o In some cases, jobs are available right now, but too many of the unemployed lack the skills to qualify for them.
  - o Training now, during the recession, will prepare the unemployed, unskilled and semi-skilled for the jobs that will open up when the recovery comes.
  - o Private sector involvement in this training program will help ensure that people are trained with skills that are really needed in the job market.



3. Mr. President, the Job Training Partnership Act calls for a much greater involvement of the private sector in employment programs. Do you believe that the private sector will step up to this challenge?

o Yes, for two reasons:

- because of the private sector's own need for skilled workers and the interest employers have in seeing that a skilled labor pool exists; and
- because of the success we've already seen, through our Private Sector Initiatives effort, in demonstrating the effectiveness of public/private partnership.

o Sceptics who think the private sector won't respond fail to recognize how heavily involved the private sector is already in job training. It invests over \$30 billion a year on its own already.

o The Private Industry Councils which the job training bill sets up are a promising mechanism for matching people trained by these programs to real jobs in the private sector.

4. Mr. President, this Act has been called a first step in New Federalism because it gives Governors substantially greater authority. Based on your experience as Governor of California, do you believe that the States are prepared for this increased responsibility?
- o Yes, of course. My view is not only that Governors, but other local elected officials -- most of them anyway -- are anxious to take on greater responsibility in this and other areas.
  - o Already, Governors and other local elected officials have substantial responsibilities in employment and training areas -- in vocational education the state employment services and other programs. Added responsibilities under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) will just enhance their ability to coordinate jobs programs in their states.
  - o The training program utilizes the block grant approach, central to our Federalism concept. Successful implementation of block grants passed last year -- in most states -- shows how well the Governors can handle increased responsibilities.
  - o Even though CETA was not a very successful program, it did impose real administrative burdens on the states and localities. Local officials showed they could handle them very efficiently to make the best of a flawed program.

5. Mr. President, wouldn't spending this money on public service employment create more jobs and be a better investment of public funds?
- o Public service jobs are make-work, subsidized and dead-end. Most do almost nothing to give the unskilled or low-skilled worker qualifications for long-run employment either in industry or in the expanding service sector.
  - o Our job training program will provide skills needed to build a lasting foundation for future employment.
  - o The Job Training Partnership Act is an investment in people -- to improve their skills so they can find, and keep, real jobs for the future. Public Service jobs are always temporary. They seldom have any future that can be measured in terms longer than a few months at best.

6. Mr. President, this Act has a program for training displaced workers -- those workers who, in many instances, have been laid-off because of foreign competition. Do you see this program helping American workers become more productive and better able to compete with workers from other countries?
- o Yes, such retraining is quite permissible under the new Act, the Governors have the flexibility to use their resources to establish their state programs accordingly.
  - o In such areas, workers who can't go back to jobs they have lost will be able to acquire new skills for jobs in other industries.
  - o We have already started some pilot efforts to help such displaced workers in several local areas.
  - o We hope these experiments can help us learn some of the best ways to help displaced workers.
  - o In these local experiments, funds are available for assistance to displaced workers seeking to relocate in other areas.

7. Mr. President, this law provides for training unemployed people; the Enterprise Zone plan calls for developing jobs in areas where unemployment is highest. Do you expect the Enterprise Zone legislation to pass the new Congress?
- o Certainly hope so -- and have put it on a short list of priorities for the lame-duck session.
  - o RR proposed the bill in March of this year, and the Senate Finance Committee has reported a bill. The House, however, has not yet acted.
  - o The bill has strong bipartisan support and RR expects progress -- if not passage -- in the lame-duck.
  - o The tax and regulatory relief provided designated depressed areas which become Enterprise Zones will help to stimulate business -- and job creation -- in both rural and urban areas.

8. Mr. President, if unemployment continues to rise, will you seek additional funds for public works, public service employment or more training opportunities under the Job Training Partnership Act?
- o We are not thinking about any steps that would take us back to past policies of costly and inflationary make-work jobs.
  - o Remember, in the 7 years from 1975-81, the federal government spent \$66 billion on various employment programs, and unemployment only got worse.
  - o The only real answer is economic growth to create the jobs we need for America's growing workforce -- and our program for economic recovery is going to restore that growth.
