PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: DRUNK & DRUGGED DRIVING WEEK PROCLAMATION SIGNING MONDAY, DECEMBER 13, 1982

Good afternoon. For too many years, people approached the problem of drunk driving as if it were an unavoidable disaster like hurricanes or floods. Well, we have learned that is not the case. We have learned that we are not helpless.

Action can be taken when people are concerned enough. And people not only are concerned, they are mad. They want this slaughter on our highways to stop, and they want those who threaten the public safety to be held accountable for their actions.

Fach year approximately 25,000 lives are lost in alcohol related auto accidents. An additional 700,000 persons are injured each year in crashes involving alcohol. Our loved ones are not being killed in drunk driving "accidents" and I put the word accident in quotations -- they are dying because some of our Nation's motorists have chosen to turn their vehicles into weapons. Citizen's groups, legislators, judges, police officers, people from all over the country, are saying: "That's enough -get these killers off our roads and get them off now."

Last April, I appointed a Presidential Commission on Drunk Driving to explore the problem more fully and to work with State and local governments in developing effective programs. John Volpe, the Chairman of that Commission, has some encouraging information as a part of the Commission's interim report. Apparently a potential drunk driver, who knows he stands a good chance of being caught and prosecuted, is less likely to drive at all. For this deterrent to be effective, however, State and local law enforcement officials must make it clear that they mean business and that the drunk or drug-influenced driver will be a prime target for apprehension and conviction.

Clearly there is no single solution to the drunk driving problem. The Commission has noted several approaches, including a New York State program that is self supporting -- it pays for its expenses through fines levied on drunk drivers. We are going to give careful consideration to all of the Commission's findings and ideas, and we're going to look hard at what the Federal Government can do to help State and local governments combat drunk driving. Fastening that seatbelt is the best thing an individual can do to lessen the threat.


As we launch Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week, we do so with an increasing momentum. There is much to be done but the American people are beginning to see progress -- laws are changing and traffic deaths are declining in those States that already have strong drunk driving programs. In Maine the highway death rate has dropped to an all-time low and alcohol-related highway crashes have been reduced by 42 percent since stronger laws went into effect. In Maryland the highway death rate is at a 19-year low, due to strict enforcement of laws against drunk driving. I'm confident the future will see a sharper drop in traffic deaths as this country takes the strong steps necessary to make our Nation's highways safe again. Page 3

I also want to express my gratitude for the leadership and energy that many Members of Congress and others have shown on this issue, and I've asked them to join me this afternoon. Let us resolve to make National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week the beginning of a national campaign that will not end until death by drunk and drugged drivers is brought under control. Together, with conscience and commitment, we can reduce the menace of these drivers and protect the lives of our fellow citizens.



- 7:45 p.m. Guests begin to arrive the SouthWest Gate Diplomatic Reception Room and are led up the Grand Staircase to the State Floor into the State Dining Room and the East Room.
- 8:20 p.m. Social Aides begin to line guests up for the receiving line in the State Dining Room. As many guests as possible should be in the State Dining Room with remaining guests in the Cross Hall.
- 8:30 p.m. PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN proceed to the State Floor via the elevator and continue into the Red Room, from the south door of the Red Room into the Blue Room. They take their places for the receiving line in front of the windows.

As soon as THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN are in place, Social Aides start the guests out of the south door of the State Dining Room into the Red Room, through the south door of the Red Room into the Blue Room, past THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN, past the fireplace, and into the Cross Hall. Guests are then ushered into the East Room for more refreshments.

- 9:30 p.m. At the termination of the receiving line and after a brief mix and mingle, THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN proceed to the Residence via the elevator.
- 10:00 p.m. All guests depart via the Grand Staircase, Diplomatic Reception Room.
