I. PURPOSE

The purpose of the meeting will be to thank your Council for their efforts in implementing the youth exchange initiative which you announced at the Versailles Summit.

II. BACKGROUND

For the Versailles Summit in June, 1981, the United States initiated an expanded youth exchange program among the summit countries as a response to the "successor generation" problem. The other countries responded enthusiastically, and the initiative is producing results. The U.S. commitment will result in a doubling of student exchanges from 15,000 to 30,000 over the next three years. The effort in the United States is a joint private sector/ government venture. The interface between the two is the President's Council for International Youth Exchange of almost 100 top businessmen who have volunteered to assist. Most of them will be in the meeting on Wednesday afternoon, along with other guests who have an interest in the youth exchange field. This Council has already raised almost \$2M of the \$10M goal for the private sector. \$1M was donated by the Presidential Inaugural Trust, and the other \$800,000 from business sources. This splendid effort is due in large part to the energetic efforts of Charles Wick, your personal representative for youth exchange.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: PRESIDENT'S COUNCIL FOR INTERNATIONAL YOUTH EXCHANGE THURSDAY, JANUARY 20, 1983

First, I want to welcome you and thank you for taking time from your busy schedules to come to Washington. These remarks are also being videotaped for the Williamsburg Conference for International Youth Exchange, so to all of you attending that conference let me extend a welcome.

This is such a distinguished group -- both here and in Williamsburg -- perhaps I shouldn't tell the story of the mama mouse who was trying to teach her offspring the ways of the world, when she was confronted by a great big cat. Fortunately, she was a pretty quick-witted mouse, so she began barking like a dog. The cat immediately wheeled around and hightailed it back to where it came from. Turning to her little ones, the mouse said, "That shows the importance of a second language."

Well, we do need a second language, the language of understanding. Two years ago today, I took the Oath of Office. In my remarks that day I said, " . . . peace is the highest aspiration of the American people. We will negotiate for it, sacrifice for it . . . " I still believe deeply in those words, and the best way -- the only way -- to that peace is through understanding among nations.

Some of you may remember what Winston Churchill said of the United States following World War II, "What other nation in history, when it became supremely powerful, has had no thought of territorial aggrandizement, no ambition but to use its resources

for the good of the world?" I think that was one of the finest chapters in our history. But today, almost 40 years later, there are many in the world, especially young people, who have no personal memory of that period, who do not understand America and what she represents. They do not know that America still possesses the spirit that Churchill described.

That lack of understanding is a serious problem for our future. And that is where you, the members of the President's Council for International Youth Exchange, enter the picture. You and I strongly believe in the American ideal. We trust our system and our values enough to know that young people from other countries, if they have a chance to visit us and live among us, will come to understand the American experience.

And there is another side to this idea. While we receive guests from other countries, we will also send our own young people to experience other cultures and to carry the American values to their host countries.

To help promote the exchange, last May I proposed the International Youth Exchange Initiative, which was endorsed by the leaders of the six other countries at the Versailles Economic Summit. And, I'm pleased that representatives from our Versailles partners could be here today.

I want to thank the members of the President's Inaugural
Trust for the donation of \$1 million to the Youth Exchange
program. And I understand that almost another million has been
pledged by Equitable Life, Atlantic Richfield, NVF, Phillips
Industries, Time, Westinghouse and Archer-Daniels-Midland. I'm

confident these are the first of many donations from the private sector to reach our goal of \$10 million over the next 3 years.

The Council's work underscores our strong belief in the private sector's role in building the bridges of understanding.

Understanding cannot be measured. But our reward will come from those first, awkward introductions when a young person meets his or her host family, and just months later, from those teary-eyed good-byes as friends part company. So, thank you all for being part of this transformation of nations into individuals.
