





I. PURPOSE

To show support for increased enforcement of Federal anti-pornography laws.

II. BACKGROUND

This heavyweight coalition of anti-pornography leaders is led by Father Morton Hill, S.J., head of Morality in Media. This coalition met in July, 1982, in the Indian Treaty Room with officials of Justice, FBI, Postal Service, and Customs Service to discuss the decline in virtually all the pornography law enforcement statistics at a time when the pornography industry is at a record high and growing. FBI, Postal Service, and Customs Service enforcement officers privately concede that they have lowered priority for pornography law enforcement. Enforcement agencies have found that Justice Department prosecution policies, weakened in the Carter administration, have not yet been reversed. Except in some child pornography cases, pornography prosecutions have largely ended. On October 3, 1982, the Attorney General sent a mild letter to all U.S. Attorneys encouraging increased action on pornography, but there has been no apparent change, and enforcement officers in the field were not informed of any change in prosecution policy. Prior to your remarks, the coalition will hear short presentations by the agencies involved.

Mr. Ed Zuckerman Morality in Media PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: MEETING WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF MORALITY IN MEDIA MONDAY, MARCH 28, 1983

Well hello and good afternoon. We're delighted to welcome you to the White House. I know many of you have traveled great distances because this mission is so close to your hearts.

Believe me, it's close to mine too. I share your commitment.

We came to Washington determined to begin the long, tough haul of rebuilding America — to strengthen the economy and our defenses, to improve our schools, to reinstill the spirit of community throughout our land. We cannot make America great again without remembering what made our people good. We are a Judeo-Christian Nation bound by deeply held beliefs and values. George Washington himself believed the pillars of our society are religion, morality and bonds of brotherhood between all citizens.

Now we're trying very hard to strengthen those values which never failed America when we lived up to them. But you know, I think our biggest challenge is not that we don't care enough to do what is right -- because we most certainly do -- but that we have so many different things that need correcting. Combatting drugs and organized crime, for example, are at the top of the list. So we haven't yet succeeded in zeroing in on this vicious sex industry -- which is polluting the minds and spirit of America's children. Customs seizures are down, and pornography is invading the airwaves, the mails and our neighborhoods.

I know you've heard from our people, so let me just elaborate a little bit by saying this: We can do a better job;

we can and we should mount an anti-pornography blitz and I'm determined that we will.

I think we can begin by better coordinating the efforts in the Department of Justice, the FBI, Customs and the Postal Service so we get the most from the laws already on the books. Perhaps we in the White House could take the lead on this by organizing an inter-agency task force to bring about better coordination.

Now I believe we also need to establish specific, identifiable goals to combat pornography. We've identified the worst hazardous waste sites in America, and we've begun to go after them. Why can't we do the same thing with pornography? I think we can. Attorney General Smith has given me his assurance that United States Attorneys have a green light — they will be encouraged by us to use their full power to prosecute offenders. And I am asking Customs, the FBI and the Postal Service to intensify their efforts, because it is clear that we can do more.

I think we must also try, as we have with the drug problem, to convince parents, schools and churches that they must get involved in the drive to clean up America.

Local law enforcement officials also have a key role to play in solving this problem; and I'm glad that one of the members of the coalition here today is Henry Hudson, Commonwealth Attorney, who has virtually wiped out pornography in Arlington, Virginia.

Now I think it would be helpful to listen to what you have to say, so I'd appreciate hearing your thoughts.

Thank you, Bill, and my greetings to all of you at the 61st

Annual NAB Convention. I am delighted to take part, although I

wish I could be there with you in person. Let me say at the

outset that I know all of you will miss the guiding hand of Vince

Wasilewski [Waz-il-lewski] now that he has retired. In his 17

years as your president, Vince has accomplished a great deal, not

only for you, but for the millions of Americans served by the

broadcast industry. I feel a special bond with him because of

his Uncle John. The attended Eureka College as I did, and John

Chrof The Greatest

was just about the best darm basketball players and all-around

athlete, Tremember from those days. Congratulations, Vince, on

your Distinguished Service Award. You have earned it. And my

best wishes to Eddie Fritts as he takes over the NAB presidency.

Talking with you brings back a lot of memories of the days I spent as an announcer at WHO Radio in Des Moines. It was during the depression, and I only made \$75 a week, but I remember feeling I was on top of the world. At that time the plums in local station work were opportunities to feed a program to the network. My first plum was covering a swimming meet that didn't happen.

The National AAU championships were held in Des Moines.

Perched high on a diving tower, I was to broadcast a 30 minute slot during the top four or five events of the meet. Just as we went on the air coast to coast, an AAU official, Avery Brundage,



a gentleman who was famous for his participation in a number of athletic debates, chose this moment to start another one. For 30 minutes, to a network audience, I described the costumes of the arguing officials, identified the swimmers who were practicing dives and turns, and at the end of 30 minutes returned the airwaves to the network without having described a single event. Five minutes later the first event took place. To my enormous frustration, the winner of that event established a new national swimming record. Yes, those were the days.

I was heartened and proud recently to learn of your efforts in today's broadcasting industry to encourage American productivity. Through your national "Let's Work Together" campaign, you are using your microphones, cameras and transmitters to inspire our people to greater achievement and a heightened sense of national unity. You have correctly isolated one of our greatest challenges. By increasing awareness, your Broadcasting Industry Council to Improve American Productivity will be an enormous boost in our drive to ensure solid and lasting economic recovery.

As broadcast journalists have been reporting, America has begun to take the first crucial steps into recovery. Times are still difficult for too many of our people, but lately almost every economic barometer has been signaling a bright and hopeful outlook. We're on the move again. This year new and existing home sales have been up, housing starts and permits have been up and overall construction spending has been on the increase.

Our overall productivity is improving and, with your encouragement, I am confident we can send it soaring. The stock market is strong, real wages are rising and our leading economic indicators in February made their biggest jump in 33 years. On top of all that, inflation has risen at an annual rate of just 0.4 percent for the last 6 months — the lowest six month average in 22 years — and in February the consumer price index actually the LASI THAT HAMPENED WAS IN 1965 dropped. Interest rates are now half what they were when I took office and we will get them lower.

In the face of all this good news, our Administration has issued more optimistic growth estimates for our economy. We are now predicting a growth rate for the 4 quarters of 1983 to be 4.7 percent -- a dramatic improvement over last year's sluggish -0.9 percent. There's no doubt about it, the American economy is picking up steam. If we can boost the American spirit too -- as you are doing with your calls to work together for greater productivity -- and if the Congress works with us to do what is necessary, we can embark on a new period of economic greatness unrivaled in all our history.

So, on behalf of all Americans, thanks again for the private sector initiatives of your Productivity Council and for the high standards of integrity and journalistic ethics you promote. For our part, we in this Administration remain committed to relieving unnecessary regulation of your industry and to standing firmly behind the guarantees of freedom of speech and press in the First Amendment to the Constitution.

Good luck to all of you as you bring this convention to a close. I wish I could sit in on your Government, labor and

business productivity session, but I know Ray Donovan will bring back good reports. I look forward to working with you in the months ahead as together we pick up speed along America's recovery trail.


As you in the lumber industry have already begun to see,

America has taken the first crucial steps into economic recovery.

I know times are still very difficult -- many millions of our

people are still without jobs -- but lately almost every economic barometer has been signaling a bright and hopeful outlook. We're on the move again.

This year new and existing home sales have been up, housing starts and permits have been up and overall construction spending has been on the increase.



Our overall productivity is improving, the stock market is strong, real wages are rising and our leading economic indicators in February made their biggest jump in 33 years. On top of all that, inflation has risen at an annual rate of just 0.4 percent for the last six months — the lowest 6 month average in

22 years — and in February the consumer price index actually II HAO DONE THIS ALSO IN DES. THE LAST TIME BEFORE THAT WAS IN 1965. dropped. Interest rates are now half what they were when I took office and we will get them lower.

In the face of all this good news, our Administration has issued a more optimistic estimate for growth in this year's gross national product. We are now projecting a growth rate for the 4 quarters of 1983 to be 4.7 percent -- a dramatic improvement over last year's sluggish -0.9 percent. The growth we so badly need to put our people back to work and restore prosperity has begun. And it's picking up steam every day. Together, we've got America on the mend.

I would like to thank each of you for the care, effort and pride you take in your work. The American home is at the heart of our society, and your industry does so much to improve the quality of life there.

I am sorry I could not be with you in person to celebrate the accomplishments represented by the Daphne Awards. But I would like to congratulate the winners -- and each of you for encouraging them. My best wishes to all of you for a successful year ahead as, together, we keep America on the recovery trail.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: NATIONAL VOLUNTEER WEEK MONDAY, MARCH 28, 1983

Neighbor helping neighbor is truly an American tradition.

And April 17th to the 23rd, we are recognizing that tradition through National Volunteer Week. In communities across the country volunteers are being saluted for their selfless giving of talent, time, and love.

These individuals come from all ages, races, and areas of our country. They comprise a volunteer corps of more than 83 million strong, contributing an estimated \$64 billion of their time and talent each year. Their efforts are as close as the local neighborhood crime watch, the little league field down the block, or the canvasser at your front door seeking a charitable contribution.

They may be elderly citizens helping in a local tutoring program or they may be youngsters brightening the lives of nursing home residents. A volunteer can be a religious leader who establishes a local food bank or a businessman who contributes his management skills to the local schools.

Regardless of their walk of life, the skills they provide, or the activity for which they volunteer, these citizens are genuinely public spirited. They are the best of our citizens.

And did you ever stop to think what it would be like if America's volunteers went on strike, or quit?

Well, I know there'd be a lot of sad little boys in St.

Louis. If not for the continuous efforts of Martin Mathews and

Hubert Dickey Ballantine, recreational programs for that city's youth would wither away.

In Houston, many of the unemployed would go without medical care. Dr. Joel Reed, President of the area's medical society, and some 1,000 doctors and 300 pharmacists, have treated thousands of patients within the last month. If volunteerism stopped, so would their vital service.

If volunteerism ceased, so would the spaghetti suppers and pancake breakfasts, the aerobic jazz marathons, skate-a-thons, raffles, and door-to-door calls that Thomas Sullivan and the Variety Club of Buffalo use to raise funds for the local Children's Hospital.

And the elderly in Waterloo, Iowa, would go without the nourishing home-grown food that's supplied them by Roger Bleeker and the members of the United Auto Workers Local 838 through their Brown Baggers program.

Of course, none of these scenarios will likely take place, because these citizens -- just like millions of other volunteers -- are dedicated to helping others. Our country wouldn't be the decent place it is without their efforts.

I'd like to take this opportunity to salute the Roger Bleekers, the Dr. Reeds, and the Thomas Sullivans of this country.

The poet William Wordsworth once said that the best portion of a good man's life is his little, nameless unremembered acts of kindness and love.

I'm sure I speak for all Americans when I say that these acts, especially during National Volunteer Week, should not go unnoticed. America is truly grateful for the continuing bounty of volunteer generosity. And recognizing the significance of volunteer efforts, I have established an Office of Private Sector Initiatives, in the White House, to recognize and encourage direct citizen action.

I also want to urge those of you who haven't been involved to do so. It's an age-old truth, found in most of the world's religions, that in giving we receive and in healing we are healed. Ask any volunteer why he or she is involved and you will find that volunteering isn't just a means of getting things done but is itself a valuable, fulfilling experience.

We have much to be thankful for in America, but perhaps our most precious assets, our most valuable resources, are our volunteers. This is their week and let's let them know just how much they mean to us. Thank you and God bless.
