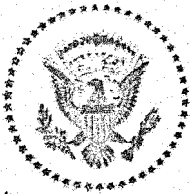

I. PURPOSE

To sign a proclamation designating May as National Arthritis Month.

II. BACKGROUND

On April 6, 1983 the President signed S.J. Res. 32, authorizing the proclamation of National Arthritis Month. Senator Symms, who co-sponsored S.J. Res. 32 with Senator DeConcini, had asked for a bill signing ceremony. However, there was not sufficient time to schedule that ceremony and this signing of the actual proclamation was the alternative.

Senator Symms has a very personal interest in this, as his wife, Fran, suffers from a crippling disease, scleroderma. Last year Senator Symms sponsored a Joint Resolution to proclaim National Scleroderma Week and a proclamation was signed on February 5 for the week of February 7-13, 1982. Senator and Mrs. Symms attended a meeting with you on February 25, 1982 on the subject of scleroderma.

Senator and Mrs. Symms will also be accompanied by John Wiswall of Wilmington, Delaware, who suffers from rheumatoid arthritis, and is the 1983 Arthritis Foundation Poster Child. John is 19 years old and will enter the University of Southern Maine this Fall as a freshman. He will be accompanied by his parents, Charles and Doris Wiswall, and Victoria Principal, star of the T.V. series "Dallas", who is the incoming General Chairman of the Arthritis Foundation.

Although arthritis has limited John's mobility, it has not limited his character or spirit. John has earned an Eagle Scout Award, was on his junior high school's jogging team ("running" on crutches or in his wheelchair), and recently earned his driver's license using special hand controls on the family car. He has also received numerous awards as testimony to his achievements and perseverance.

I. PURPOSE

I. PURPOSE

II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Frank Wolf (R-VA) is a sophomore Member, representing most of Fairfax County, Virginia. During his first term in the House of Representatives Congressman Wolf was a strong and consistent supporter of the President's economic program.

Congressman Stan Parris (R-VA) also represents a portion of Fairfax County. He, too, has been a vocal and avid supporter of the President's legislative initiatives.

The Fairfax County Neighborhood Watch program is a joint effort involving police and citizens working in close cooperation to reduce crime and bring lawbreakers to justice. There are 1,000 citizens providing information and assistance on a daily basis in 328 neighborhoods in Fairfax County. To replace these volunteers with police officers would cost the county an estimated \$30 million a year.

Crime Stoppers, which has a 98 percent national conviction rate, is a cooperative effort among citizens, the police and the media. Its success rate is due to its innovative system of giving persons a graphic description of crimes, a number to call, a reward, and by guaranteeing anonymity to informants. Like Neighborhood Watch, the Crime Stoppers program is not supported by tax dollars.

This meeting will include Fairfax County officials and community leaders responsible for the success of these programs in their area.
