

I. PURPOSE

To consult with select Members of the House on arms control policy.

II. BACKGROUND

The Strategic Arms Reduction Talks (START) will resume June 8. A new U.S. START proposal has been advocated and is anticipated by many Members of Congress. The President is expected to make a decision and publicly announce the START proposal this Wednesday.

The report of the Scowcroft Commission on Strategic Forces, which the Administration endorsed, in part proposed the vigorous pursuit of an arms control agreement. In particular, the Commission placed strong emphasis on warhead limitations and reductions as well as throw-weight limitations, all of which are consistent with the current START proposal. The report recommended a de-emphasis on negotiating an agreement based on launcher limitations.

As part of the understanding between the Administration and a "swing" block of Congressmen the Administration agreed to continue to actively pursue arms control negotiations, to reassess current proposals, and to consult with the Congress in return for their support of the funding request for procuring and basing the Peacekeeper missile. On May 24, the House approved 239-186 missile basing funds which the Senate also subsequently supported.

The House is tentatively scheduled to consider on June 15 the FY '84 authorization request for Peacekeeper procurement and additional research and basing funds.

The Members in attendance include the Chairman and ranking Republican of the Armed Services, Foreign Affairs and Intelligence Committees, the ranking Republican on the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, the leaders of the "swing" block, and active proponents of the Administration's arms control policies.

I. PURPOSE

To consult with these Senators in terms of the Administration's follow-up on the arms control recommendations contained in the Scowcroft Commission Report.

II. BACKGROUND

On May 25, 1983, the Senate passed S. Con. Res. 26, which released FY 1983 funds for MX missile basing. During debate on this issue, a number of Senators raised serious concerns with regard to arms control issues as they relate to further MX missile production and basing. In response to these concerns, you sent a letter to Senators Bill Cohen and Sam Nunn outlining your strong support for the Scowcroft Commission's recommendations on modernization and arms control (copy of letter attached). You mentioned in that letter your personal view that we must develop a lasting and bipartisan consensus on these issues and indicated that you would work closely with the Congress to maintain this consensus in arms control initiatives. With the help of your letter, the Senate passed S. Con. Res. 26 by a vote of 59-39. Despite this respectable margin of support, 19 Republican Senators sent you a letter the day following the vote reiterating their concern that follow-up action in the area of arms control will be crucial to their continued support for the MX (copy of letter attached).

The next step in the MX debate will be Senate action on the defense authorization bill which is tentatively scheduled for Senate floor action in late June. Without continued progress in the arms control dialogue with the Senate, we will be in a difficult position for this next MX vote. Your meeting today with this bipartisan group of Senators for the purpose of consulting on arms control issues will be viewed as a positive effort on the Administration's part to uphold their commitment to maintain a viable consensus on this issue. The group you are meeting with includes the 19 Republicans who wrote to you after the MX vote as well as a number of Democrats who supported the MX Resolution but will need continued assurance of the Administration's intentions to pursue arms control initiatives.

Dear Bill:

Thank you for your recent letter on our strategic modernization program and its relationship to our arms control proposals. Your letter represents the bi-partisan spirit which I believe will help achieve our common goals of ensuring effective deterrent forces and equitable and verifiable arms reductions.

The fundamental U.S. goal in negotiations concerning arms reduction, and especially in our approach to the START negotiations, is to seek agreements that would enhance security and stability by reducing overall force levels while permitting modernization of U.S. forces necessary for a credible deterrent. As you know, the Scowcroft Commission noted that elements of our START proposal are consistent with and supportive of the Commission's findings. I agree whole-heartedly with the essential theme of the Scowcroft Commission's approach to arms control: the attainment of stability at the lowest possible level of forces.

The Scowcroft Commission's recommendations on modernization and arms control are integrally related. Our action with respect to these recommendations must be equally comprehensive. That is why I am now reviewing our START proposal in order to develop such modifications as are necessary to reflect the Commission's approach, which I share. To cite just one example, the Commission report recommended that the proposed limit on deployed ballistic missiles currently contained in the U.S. START position be reassessed since it is not compatible with a desirable evolution toward small, single-warhead ICBMs. There are a number of alternative approaches available to integrate this and the other Commission recommendations into our approach to arms reductions. As modifications are made to our START proposal, I will continue to seek stability at the lowest possible level of forces.

The planned deployment of the Peacekeeper missile as proposed by my Administration is compatible with the long-term objective of the Scowcroft Commission Report. The Peacekeeper missile, deployed in a mix with small single-warhead ICBMs, would permit us to maintain the effectiveness of our deterrent and enhance stability.

At the same time, let me emphasize that we do not seek a first strike capability. To this end, we will constrain the number of Peacekeeper missiles to the minimum number needed to assure the effectiveness of our deterrent and no more. Our task, of course, would be much easier if the Soviets would agree to work with us to reduce the ratio of accurate warheads to missile silos. Clearly, consistent with our national security requirements, the overall level of Peacekeeper deployment will be influenced by Soviet strategic programs and arms reductions agreements.

In addition, I fully recognize the central role that the small, single-warhead ICBM plays in the overall modernization program recommended by the Scowcroft Commission Report. We will promptly undertake a major effort to bring the proposal of a small, single-warhead ICBM to fruition on a high priority basis.

In considering the implementation of the essential ICBM modernization program, the Scowcroft Commission also recognized that a series of decisions involving both the Executive Branch and the Congress would be necessary in the months ahead in order to determine the future shape of our ICBM force. Further, it noted that not all of these decisions can or should be made in 1983. The deliberate approach to decision making proposed by a number of members of Congress is fully in keeping with the intent of the Scowcroft Commission Report. I fully recognize that a lasting consensus on such an important issue must be built up carefully and I intend to take the time necessary to forge that lasting consensus.

I urge all concerned, however, to keep in mind that if we draw out critical elements of the decision-making process unnecessarily, we encourage the Soviets to delay in negotiations while continuing apace in their own weapons modernization programs.

To avoid this, I am seeking a clear show of support from Congress to signal U.S. resolve. A case in point is the clear necessity of approving funds promptly to procure Peacekeeper missiles. Working together, this should be achievable while simultaneously meeting our mutual desire to deal with deployment issues, whenever possible, in a careful, deliberate manner.

You have suggested that certain additional initiatives could be helpful in moving us toward our goals of security and stability at reduced levels of forces. One of the most prominent of these initiatives is the idea of a "guaranteed build-down."

The principle of a mutual build-down, if formulated and implemented flexibly, and negotiated within the context of our modified START proposal, would be a useful means to achieve the reductions that we all seek.

It would, if properly applied, reinforce our intent to cap the number of strategic ballistic missile warheads on both sides and to cause each side to reduce those levels steadily and substantially over time.

It could be implemented flexibly and with reasonable latitude for each side to balance the forces it deploys and reduces. Variable ratios as appropriate, would encourage more stabilizing rather than less stabilizing systems.

It could be implemented in conjunction with an agreed floor which, when reached, would trigger the suspension of the build-down rule, subject to renegotiation.

As you have acknowledged, any build-down concept must recognize the importance of strategic modernization and the necessity of maintaining a balance during the reduction process to deal with asymmetries in U.S. and Soviet forces. It would, of course, require agreement on effective verification measures, including counting rules for all systems.

My Administration is currently examining the structure of a build-down proposal which would meet these criteria and would facilitate a START

agreement embodying substantial reductions in nuclear forces. I will work with you and your colleagues to develop such a proposal.

Finally, I want to stress the extraordinary. contribution made by the Scowcroft Commission. It provided an opportunity for non-partisan analysis of an exceptionally difficult issue as a prelude to obtaining necessary bi-partisan support for critically needed modernization of our strategic forces. While not prescribing the details or the timing, the Commission report suggested certain directions that the continued evolution of our complementary strategy for arms reduction could take. Over the short term, follow-on arrangements involving members of the Commission, as well as close coordination with the Congress, will be extremely helpful both technically and politically in thinking through this evolution. However, we are giving careful consideration to determining which follow-on arrangements best meet our common objectives.

In this regard, I do see merit in a panel with bi-partisan composition and with staggered terms of membership to provide advice and continuity in this area. I will work with the Congress, building upon the experience of the Scowcroft Commission, to strengthen and supplement our consultative and advisory processes to assure a lasting, national, bi-partisan consensus concerning arms control initiatives -- a consensus which will deserve to be sustained from one Administration to the next.

Dear Mr. President:

Following the Senate's MX vote yesterday, we were gratified by your statement reconfirming your Administration's commitment to serious arms reduction efforts.

We wish to emphasize that our support for releasing FY 1983 funds does not represent a consensus on the need to deploy 100 MX missiles in Minuteman silo launchers. Rather, yesterday we effected our part of an agreement with your Administration to proceed with a militarily controversial program in exchange for a strong commitment to proceed seriously and immediately with a reformulation of the U.S. START proposal, a meaningful guaranteed build-down proposal, development of a more survivable, small, single-warhead ICBM, and creation of a bi-partisan, durable arms control panel.

In the next several weeks, we hope to see development by the Administration of a meaningful build-down proposal for nuclear arms reductions. Several key points should be borne in mind in framing such a proposal.

The build-down proposal developed for presentation to the Soviet Union must be simple enough to be understood and fair enough to be negotiable.

The build-down concept should be looked upon as a complement to, but not a substitute for, START. The build-down aims solely at achieving meaningful and rapid reductions in U.S. and Soviet forces while permitting those types of weapons modernization programs which enhance stability. It should not be structured to attempt to achieve the more complicated, longer-term objectives of START.

To be workable and negotiable, the build-down concept must be applied comprehensively to all strategic nuclear warheads.

If applied in the spirit in which the build-down concept was developed, variable ratios could enhance achievement of a more stable nuclear environment. To achieve true stability, each side must be satisfied that its forces are, and will remain, secure.

Yesterday's vote did not constitute approval of the full MX program. In the near future, the Senate will address additional and equally important milestones, which will determine the fate of the MX program. Most immediate will be the authorization and appropriation of funds for opening the MX production line. Two factors will bear heavily on our position on these and any subsequent steps in the MX program: The Administration's continued sincerity in developing and implementing a framework for weapons modernization and arms control -- in particular, its attitude and actions on the build-down proposal -- and developments in arms control negotiations with the Soviet Union.

Mr. President, we believe the present debate over the MX missile offers an opportunity to forge a broad and effective consensus around an arms policy which combines arms reductions and modernization programs in a manner which promises to enhance stability. With good faith and hard work by all, we can create a framework for real progress.

We look forward to working with you in this critical endeavor.

- I want to thank you for coming here this afternoon and I want to take this opportunity to state that I am personally committed to the security of the State of Israel. You all know that my commitment to the State of Israel has been long and active. My commitment to the security of the State of Israel, is not only for strategic, but moral reasons as well.
- -- I am very pleased with the recent efforts of George Shultz in working out the Israeli-Lebanon withdrawal agreement.
- -- The bold initiative undertaken by Israel and Lebanon in this agreement is another step to achieving peace between Israel and her Arab neighbors.
- Only through peace will Israel be able to achieve real security.

 We are going to continue our efforts of working towards the goal of the withdrawal of all foreign forces, Syrian, PLO, as well as Israeli. As you are aware, we undertaking serious diplomatic efforts towards that goal. I am very concerned over the Soviet build-up in Syria and I pledge that I am committed to maintaining Israel's qualitative edge in the military balance of power. In addition to the Israel-Lebanon withdrawal agreement, we are continuing our efforts to expanding the peace process by encouraging other Arab nations to recognize and negotiate with Israel. We are hopeful that there will be progress in that area.
