I. PURPOSE

To review Democratic attempts to cap the third year of the tax cut at \$720 and to discuss other legislative items likely to be voted upon prior to the July 4th recess.

II. BACKGROUND

The House and Senate will be in session during the next two weeks before recessing on July 1 for 10 days. During the two week span, several key votes are likely:

- This Thursday, the House is slated to vote on the third year tax cap and probably the FY84 budget conference report. Senate action on both items would occur next week. The outlook in the Senate to defeat the cap (and perhaps the budget conference report) are much better than in the House where Tip O'Neill is invoking party discipline and "loyalty to Democratic principles" to rally his troops.
- The supplemental appropriations bill is in conference and should be on the House and Senate floors early next week. As you know, the House added approximately \$250 million in domestic spending and the Senate raised that total to \$1.5 billion. Unless the conference deletes a significant amount of this add-on, a veto is likely.
- In addition, the House is trying to complete action on four appropriations bills (the House has already passed 5 and the aim is 9 before recess). The Senate may consider 2 or 3 appropriations bills and Radio Marti before going on vacation.

- Unfortunately, the Senate is not scheduled to consider the FY84 Defense Authorization bill until it returns on July 11. The House began consideration of the bill last week but set it aside and will not get to the MX section until after recess.

To discuss whether the Administration should support a PIK program for 1984, specifically discussing the wheat program which is the crop needing a decision most promptly.

II. BACKGROUND

Synfuels Corporation: Conditions have changed dramatically since the Synfuels Act was passed in 1980. There is a concensus among the members of the Oil Price Decline Working Group of this circumstance but no agreement on the underlying substantive issues involved. Consequently the recommendation to create a Commission which would report back within 60 days was discussed and is presented for the CCNRE's consideration.

PIK Program: In the implementation of the 1983 PIK program, participation and resulting outlays hit record highs. Now the Cabinet must review the program to determine whether the program should be continued for another year. Is it doing the job it was supposed to do? The specific issue to be discussed today is the 1984 Wheat PIK since an early announcement must be made in order to accommodate the winter wheat decisions.

ISSUE

Should the President establish a Commission on Synthetic Fuels to study and report back promptly to him and to Congress on the costs and prospects for government financing of synthetic fuels development, compared to conditions when the Synthetic Fuel Corporation (SFC) was created?

BACKGROUND

Based on papers prepared by the Oil Price Decline Working Group (attached), high-level departmental representatives extensively discussed the synthetic fuel issues at a meeting on May 5. At that meeting, there was a consensus that the circumstances underlying synthetic fuel development had changed significantly since 1980, when the SFC was created. The discussion did not reach agreement on whether under these changed circumstances a change or reduction in the financial commitment to synthetic fuels was wise, or politically feasible.

DISCUSSION

Conditions have changed substantially since the Synthetic Fuels Act was enacted in 1980. At that time, most observers thought oil prices would rise sufficiently that synthetic fuel production from known technologies would be very competitive with conventional fuel production, if only proper financing and protection from price declines could be arranged. However, oil and natural gas prices have not followed the trajectory assumed in 1980. Real oil prices have instead fallen significantly and show little prospect of dramatic increases in the next few years.

Under these circumstances, a commitment to construction of additional synthetic fuel plants will mean very substantial government cash outlays. Since current and projected prices will not sustain synthetic fuel production, the government must either provide very substantial price support guarantees or be prepared for substantial loan defaults, where only a loan guarantee has been given.

It now is clear that the goals established by Congress in setting up the SFC (500 million barrels a day by 1987, 2 million barrels a day by 1992) will not be met. Instead, the current SFC estimates are that assuming the commitment of over \$13 billion in financial support by 1984, production could reach the equivalent of 86,000 b/d by 1987 (.5 percent of U.S. oil consumption) and 179,000 b/d by 1992 (1 percent). Thus, the role of short-term crisis protection has definitely passed to the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) with synthetic fuels arguably providing long-term protection. By the end of 1983, the SPR will contain over 350 million barrels, the equivalent of about 3 months net imports at current rates, and over a year of Arab OPEC imports.

With these substantial changes in world events and the rationale for synthetic fuel plants, the CCNRE members concluded that a reassessment of the goals and prospects of the synthetic fuels program should be carried on by an objective body from outside government. This body should report both to the President and to Congress on its findings with options or recommendations for action. Because congressional action on the Great Plains Program may be requested in the near future and because prospects for reducing or eliminating SFC financial exposure will diminish if not taken in the near term, this commission should report back within 60 days of being named.

Chairman Noble of the SFC noted that there had been no change in the long-term fact that the vast majority of America's energy resources are in solid form, such as shale oil, coal, and tar sands, which must be converted to more readily usable liquid and gaseous forms. He and others indicated that congressional support remains quite strong for the principle of synthetic fuel development as a long-term component of national security and as a deterrent to exorbitant energy price increases.

Although there was a consensus on the Commission recommendation, there was no consensus on the underlying substantive issues presented in the attached paper.

RECOMMENDATION

That the President immediately appoint a Commission with a mandate to report back within 60 days on the changes in circumstances since the creation of the Synthetic Fuel Corporation with options and recommendations as to costs and benefits of proceeding with government financing of synthetic fuels.

Advantages:

- o Creates a specific mechanism outside the Administration to force a new look at the synthetic fuels situation, and its changed circumstances.
- o Removes the necessity for an immediate decision on contentious synfuels questions.
- o May reduce pressures for an increase in government financial commitments until the Commission reports.

Disadvantages:

- o May be seen as only postponing decision.
- o Appointment of the Commission may be criticized as a lack of confidence in synthetic fuels.
- o Commission report may not actually be helpful in facing up to the issues presented by financial outlays for synthetic fuel development.
- o May overuse Commission form for advising on decisions.

SUBJECT: 1984 Wheat Program

- I. ACTION FORCING EVENT: Need to Announce 1984 Wheat Program Provisions
- II. STATEMENT OF THE ISSUE: The Department of Agriculture is required, by statute, to announce the 1984 Wheat Program provisions by August 15, 1983. An earlier announcement is desirable in order to increase efficiency in winter wheat producers' planting decisions. Many producers begin land preparation for fall seeding of wheat immediately following the completion of harvest. Winter wheat harvest began in May in the Southwest and will continue through August in the Mountain and Pacific states. We are seeking approval from the Cabinet for the implementation of a 1984 Wheat Program with supply adjustment features similar to the 1983 program, but with substantive differences in a number of the provisions, that can be announced by July 1, 1983.
- III. ANALYSIS: We are requesting approval from the Cabinet for authority to implement a 1984 Wheat Program that will insure an adequate supply at reasonable prices to consumers; be fair to wheat producers; recognizes the realities of budget constraints; and begins to address the problem of U.S. agriculture's competitiveness in world markets.

Successive record crops in 1981 and 1982 accompanied by weak and faltering demand and the after-effects of the Carter embargo has led to a substantive build-up in ending stocks. Prior to the Presidential announcement of the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program on January 11, 1983, the Department was projecting ending stocks of 1,771 million bushels, 72 percent of 1982/83 utilization. Ending stocks would have increased 17 percent over the same level of a year ago, 60 percent greater than the preceding 5-year average and exceeded generally accepted carryover levels by more than 700 million bushels in the absence of 1983 PIK Program.

Because of unusually good weather, ending 1983/84 stocks are expected to be down only marginally, in spite of a 75 percent participation rate and a reduction in harvested acreage of 23 percent from 1982. Without a 1983 production decrease of 466 million bushels (16%), ending stocks may have reached the 2 billion bushel level.

IV. RECOMMENDATION: USDA to be given the authority to implement the recommended program. This program would contain the following key provisions:

- (a) 25% Acreage Reduction Program (ARP)
- (b) 10-25% Land Diversion Program with Payment-In-Kind (PIK) compensation at 80 percent of farm payment yield
- (c) \$4.30 per bushel target
- (d) \$3.30 or \$3.55 per bushel loan rate
- (e) No advance payments
- (f) PIK participation limited to producers with adequate outstanding loan collateral
- (g) 20 cents per bushel storage payment for farmer-owned reserve (FOR) with delayed entry.
