Hello to all of you attending the National Grocers Association meeting in San Francisco. I'm delighted to wish you well on your First Annual Convention and Food Industry Exposition.

The industry you represent has been a cornerstone of America's free enterprise system. And I feel about free enterprise the way Mark Twain felt about good bourbon -- too much is barely enough. Decades ago, mom and pop grocery stores epitomized the drive of American small business, as well as the values that made us such a good and caring people. Today, as modern community supermarkets, served by sophisticated distribution centers, you still epitomize small business and you still represent those values that give our Nation its unique character.

That's why I so appreciate the support you've given us in our attempt to return those same values and character to government. And I'm delighted to report that after taking some medicine for problems which had been ignored too long, we are turning this economy around; we're putting our economic house back in order. But I want to thank you for your support not only of our economic policies but of our private sector initiatives program.

Last December, we asked your assistance in coordinating and expanding the food bank system, which is an effective, local way

to help the Nation's needy. Your president, Tom Zaucha [ZAW-ka], responded immediately, marshalling the resources of independent food retailers, retailer-owned cooperatives, wholesalers, manufacturers, and State and local association executives. In fact, Tom, you organized things so well, you wouldn't want to try your hand with the Congress would you? But earlier this year on my visit to the North Texas Food Bank, I singled out NGA's contributions to the food bank idea and today let me again commend you on your efforts.

I'm now told the NGA's Women Grocers of America has launched a pilot project with the North Texas Food Bank. The goal is to make the program even more effective by using women volunteers to assist in managing local food bank activities.

This is exactly the type of private sector initiative we have worked to encourage. I told a group here at the White House recently that at the economic summit in Williamsburg, the Japanese heard about the success of our private sector initiatives; they asked for information and now they're studying all the possibilities. If the Japanese are interested, we must really be onto something.

But without your help in any number of areas, our country would not be where it is today. With your continued support and participation, we can do more. We can keep the American dream alive and well for our children, and our children's children. Thank you for inviting me today, my best wishes and God bless you all.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: NATIONAL SECURITY TELECOMMUNICATIONS
ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING
THURSDAY, JULY 14, 1983

When I spoke to you 7 months ago, I expressed my great appreciation for your willingness to participate as members of the NSTAC. Since then, Judge Clark and Secretary Weinberger have kept me continually informed concerning your activities. I know you've committed not only your personal time, but substantial corporate resources to support the NSTAC's efforts. What you and your Industry Executive Subcommittee have accomplished in these last 7 months is a direct tribute to the quality of people and degree of support each of you has contributed. I want to thank your Chairman, Rand Araskog [Air-s-kog] of ITT, and your Vice-Chairman, Joe Charyk [Chair-ik] of Comsat. You and your people's dedication epitomize the spirit of voluntary industry-Government cooperation so critical to the future of our Nation.

Last December, you began your efforts by focusing on three key issues involving national security telecommunications: coordinating industry-wide responses to national security and emergency preparedness telecommunications needs; improving the survivability of the nation's commercial satellite communications resources; and enhancing the survivability of the automated information processing resources upon which communications capabilities are becoming more dependent. These complex issues go to the heart of our efforts to support national security leadership requirements and thus contribute to our overall deterrence capability.

As you have been meeting to develop industry advice on how to address these issues, the Government has also improved its own ability to deal with them. Last month, I signed a National Security Decision Directive which updates our National Security Telecommunications Policy. It will permit us to continue developing a national telecommunications infrastructure to support and enhance our deterrence posture and national security. The NSTAC is a key element of that National Security Decision Directive. Mr. Robert Helm of the White House staff is representing me at your meeting and he will acquaint you with the specifics of this new policy directive.

I'd like to close with two points. First, I believe your service on the NSTAC, and your willingness to fully support it demonstrate the clear importance of the issues being addressed. Industry-Government cooperation can significantly contribute to enhancing national security. Second, I trust that your activities are just the beginning. By identifying specific actions to improve the security, survivability, and endurance of the Nation's commercial communications resources, your continued advice will be invaluable in implementing approved Government initiatives. The Executive Order which established the NSTAC requests that you conduct reviews and assess the implementation of national security telecommunications policy. I want, and need, your continuing independent advice to ensure we select improvements wisely and implement them effectively.

Again, my personal thanks for your continuing assistance. Keep up the good work!

I. PURPOSE

To accommodate the request of Congressman Larry Winn (R-Kansas) to have the President meet with Ernestina Verduzco, the Poster Child for the National Organization on Disability.

II. BACKGROUND

On December 3, 1982, the UN General Assembly proclaimed the period 1982-1992 as the Decade of Disabled Persons and urged each nation to carry out its Decade program in a manner suitable to its stage of development and the nature of its society. The U.S. Congress, federal agencies, governors, mayors and national and local organizations are issuing "Decade" proclamations and resolutions and are initiating programs.

The first major public awareness campaign of the Decade of Disabled persons in the United States was launched by the National Organization of Disability (N.O.D.) on April 25, 1983. The campaign consists of a series of six posters which will be distributed throughout the United States. Each poster depicts a disabled person who has achieved full participation in his or her area of interest or occupation.

The subject of the first poster is 10-year old Ernestina Verduzco from San Francisco, California, who lost both her legs in a train accident when she was four. Ernestina's poster captures what disabled persons strive for - independence and a place in the mainstream of life gained through courage and determination.

The posters, which have been donated by the Eastman Kodak Company, will be distributed throughout the United States by N.O.D.'s Community Partnership Program.

BACKGROUND CONTINUED

Congressman Larry Winn (R-Kansas) represents the Third District of Kansas (the North-central portion of the State). The Congressman has been a consistently strong and vocal supporter of Administration initiatives. Larry spearheaded a congressional hearing on the Decade of Disabled Persons in April of this year and is a co-sponsor of House Resolution 39, a resolution on the Decade of Disabled Persons.
