PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: LUNCH WITH REGIONAL EDITORS AND BROADCASTERS MONDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1983

Welcome to all of you. I know you are anxious to get to your questions, but in recent times we have made some important announcements at sessions like this. Today, also, I do have an announcement to make about my political plans for next year. It concerns, in particular, the presidential race. Despite anything else you may have heard, the decision I am about to announce was not a difficult one for me to reach after close consultation with my wife and family. Ladies and Gentlemen, with regard to next year's presidential race, I want you to know that after careful thought, Nancy and I have decided that we will both vote Republican.

Please forgive me, but as I said the other night at the news conference, I never stop marveling at the different ways the press corps can formulate the same question. And you know sometimes those of us in public life have to be permitted to have a little bit of revenge.

Before we begin, please permit me to make a few brief points about some of the major goals of this Administration. There is no delicate way to put it. As I said when we took office: We inherited the worst economic mess in 40 years. Runaway inflation, record interest rates, and high tax rates were stunting growth and denying opportunity. The greatest burden fell on those who were supposed to benefit most from the growth of Government: low income or fixed income households. We should

never forget just how unfair that inflation was. A family on a fixed income of \$10,000 at the beginning of 1979 found that it's purchasing power had been reduced to \$8,000 by the end of 1980 -- because of the runaway inflation of those years. Let's face it: All of us were suffering and we were getting nothing from Washington except lectures about our national malaise.

Since we took office, the economy has been transformed. GNP rose at an 9.7 rate for the second quarter and 7.9 for the third. Inflation is down from double digits to a 2.6 annual rate. The prime rate has been cut nearly in half, and unemployment, while still too high, is improving steadily. 400,000 people found jobs last month. More Americans are now on the job than ever before in U.S. history. Economic growth without inflation provides the greatest opportunity for all Americans -- and that's what our program is helping bring about.

We did this by lowering tax rates, cutting the growth of Federal spending, reducing the regulatory burden and supporting a monetary policy designed to ensure stable prices.

We also faced a crisis in the area of national security.

Our Nation was undergoing one international humiliation after another. The Soviets were rushing ahead of us in a massive arms buildup; our diplomats were held hostage in Iran; one nation after another fell to the Marxists. And our military strength had declined to where press accounts were almost routine about aircraft that couldn't fly, ships that couldn't leave port and a rapid deployment force that was neither rapid nor deployable or much of a force.

Again this is changing. America's credibility is being restored, our military strength is being rebuilt and for the first time in a long while there are serious negotiations underway for verifiable and equitable arms reduction treaties. In fact, we have arms talks underway with the Soviets on more substantive issues than any recent administration. This kind of progress both at home and abroad symbolizes the traditional goals of American Government: economic growth and peace through strength.

But these very goals spring from traditional American values and it is these values we have also worked to strengthen and enhance. That's why we are supporting prayer and anti-abortion amendments, tuition-tax credits and a return to excellence in our public schools. We welcome the fact that, at last, the trend toward more and more divorces is finally being reversed. We're also cracking down on drug-traders and organized crime, and we support an omnibus crime bill that would do much to assist in this effort.

This is not to say we do not confront grave problems. If the Congress does not join us in holding down deficits by cutting Federal spending, our economic recovery will be put in jeopardy. We don't face large deficits because the people's taxes are too low. We face those deficits because Government spending remains too high.

There are also crucial votes on the defense budget. That budget is essential to our resisting Soviet imperialism and negotiating a verifiable and equitable arms reduction agreement.

This is especially true in the House where there will be crucial defense appropriations votes this week.

America is moving forward again. We are regaining prosperity and military strength, and we're trying to restore traditional values to American life. I think that's making many people feel better about our country.

## I. PURPOSE

# II. BACKGROUND

Greg Harkins of Jackson, Mississippi, is a woodworker who has been an avid fan of President Reagan for several years. He has operated his own woodworking business for eight years and has primarily worked alone during that time. Congressman Lott boasts of his own oak rocker made by Mr. Harkins which has a prominent place in the Republican Whip's office in the Capitol.

When the President traveled to Mississippi in 1980, Mr. Harkins presented him with one of his oak rocking chairs, and subsequently furnished another one for Mrs. Reagan to use at their ranch in California. President Reagan again traveled to Mississippi in June of this year to attend a Mississippi Republican Party fundraising event, accompanied by Congressman Lott. At that time plans were initiated for Mr. Harkins to present a double rocking chair to the President and First Lady. However, due to time constraints it was not possible to schedule the presentation during that trip, and Congressman Lott requested that Mr. Harkins be allowed to meet with the President at a future date.

Congressman Lott is the House Republican Whip and has played a vital role in virtually every major legislative success of this Administration.

During the 98th Congress, Steve has been a strong and active supporter of Administration-backed legislative initiatives. He has recently been most involved in behalf of the IMF quota increase initiative.

Donald F. Mitchell is the author of Profile of Dallas: Love Affair with a City, and would like to present this book to the President. It should be noted that Mr. Mitchell has requested that the President write an introductory chapter to the book so that it can be re-published for the Republican National Convention which is to be held in Dallas in 1984. Congressman Bartlett has transmitted this request to various White House staff members, and it currently is under review. Bartlett has agreed not to raise the introductory chapter request during this photo session.

#### PURPOSE I.

To accommodate the request of Congressman Bob Livingston (R-Louisiana) that the President have a signing ceremony for H. R. 3321, which authorizes the minting of commemorative medals for the 1984 Louisiana World Exposition to be held in New Orleans beginning on May 12, 1984.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Bob Livingston (R-Louisiana) has requested that the President have a signing ceremony for H.R. 3321 in order to provide a "kick-off" for the Louisiana World Exposition, or World's Fair, which will begin in May of next year, and asked to have the members of the Louisiana Congressional Delegation who represent the New Orleans area and the two Senators from Louisiana, who have also worked extremely hard on the Exposition, attend.

The coins this bill authorizes to be minted will be sold by the Exposition to the public to raise money to offset the cost of the Exposition, which is expected to attract eleven million visitors from all over the world. Twelve countries are officially participating in the Exposition at this time, and negotiations are continuing with 30 other countries to be represented. Activities during the Exposition will include educational events, international symposiums, and various international trade meetings.

Congressman Livingston (R-Louisiana) is from Louisiana's First District (which includes part of New Orleans). serving his fourth term in Congress, and sits on the He has been a consistently Appropriations Committee. strong supporter of the Administration.

Congresswoman Lindy Boggs (D-Louisiana) represents Louisiana's Second District (which also includes part of New Orleans). Mrs. Boggs was elected to her late husband's seat in 1973, and is currently serving her sixth term in Congress. The Congresswoman has been generally supportive of the Administration.
