I. PURPOSE

To encourage this select group to support the MX missile and to oppose any amendment which deletes funds for the missile from the Defense Appropriations Bill.

II. BACKGROUND

On Thursday, October 20, the House Appropriations Committee marked-up and reported the Defense Appropriations Bill. The legislation contains funding for the MX "Peacekeeper" missile and the other aspects of the Scowcroft Commission recommendations. The House is tentatively scheduled to begin consideration of the bill on Tuesday, October 25.

During consideration of the bill, an amendment or amendments are anticipated which would delete funding for the Peacekeeper. As always, the vote on such an amendment will be very close and the Administration cannot afford an erosion in past support.

This select group of Democrats consists of several Members who supported the Administration on the MX basing Resolution of Approval, but not on the Strategic Forces Title of the Defense Authorization Bill. Also in attendance are Members who supported the President on both votes.

This "swing" block of Congressmen needs to be reassured that the Administration has complied with its commitment to vigorously pursue arms control negotiations. They also need to be convinced that the Peacekeeper remains an integral element of successful arms control negotiations.

I. PURPOSE

To discuss political unity.

II. BACKGROUND

During the first year of this Administration, one of the most important issues to come before the United States Senate was the sale of the AWACs to Saudi Arabia. As you recall, Senator Packwood was a leader of the opposition to this sale, and the ensuing battle left a somewhat tense relationship between Packwood and the White House. Exacerbating that problem was the fact that Packwood served, at that time, as Chairman of the Senatorial Campaign Committee, and many of our large contributors expressed their personal dissatisfaction with Packwood's behavior. Since that time, despite day-to-day efforts to maintain a cooperative relationship with the Senator, there still exists an atmosphere of "estrangement."

Senator Laxalt and Senator Lugar discussed this situation with Jim Baker, and all agreed that it would be a good idea, as we approach the campaign, to make this effort to affirm mutual support among Republicans. Packwood has indicated (through Lugar) that he wants to be "on the team," and we feel that a meeting at this time would be most productive.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
SENATORS BAKER, LAXALT, LUGAR, AND PACKWOOD

Conversation will be informal "cocktail talk" as the event begins. Once participants are seated, Senator Lugar will start the conversation by pointing out that this is a group of Senators who are anxious to be helpful in the campaign. Lugar will point out that occasionally we have differences among ourselves, but that it is important in the upcoming year that we remain a united team. In this respect, today's meeting is an "attempt to clear the air" in terms of any past differences.

You should make the following points:

- Thank all the Senators for gathering today.
- Express your appreciation for Senator Lugar's comments about the need for unity in the upcoming year. Echo this statement with firm conviction.
- Acknowledge the fact that from time-to-time, we Republicans do have differences among ourselves.
- Suggest that one way to ensure harmony in the upcoming year is for all of you to counsel together when it appears that a divisive issue may be coming up. Turn to Howard Baker and others for more general discussion.

II. BACKGROUND

On Thursday, October 20, the House Appropriations Committee marked-up and reported the Defense Appropriations Bill. The legislation contains funding for the MX "Peacekeeper" missile and the other aspects of the Scowcroft Commission recommendations. The House is tentatively scheduled to begin consideration of the bill on Tuesday, October 25.

During consideration of the bill, an amendment or amendments are anticipated which would delete funding for the Peacekeeper. As always, the vote on such an amendment will be very close and the Administration cannot afford any erosion in past support.

This select group of Republicans consists mostly of Members who supported the MX basing Resolution of Approval and the Strategic Forces Title of the Defense Authorization Bill. However, their support for MX is based predominantly on the missile's usefulness in achieving an arms control agreement.

The GOP Congressmen in attendance at this meeting need to be reassured that the Administration is vigorously pursuing arms control negotiations. They also need to be convinced that willingness to deploy Peacekeeper and successful arms control negotiations remain part of an integral and complementary package.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

- Earlier this year, in May and July, many of you supported the Scowcroft Commission recommendations of pursuing an arms control agreement, developing a mobile, single warhead missile, and proceeding with the deployment of the Peacekeeper missile.

- We need the MX, not only for force modernization, but to keep the Soviets moving at the negotiating tables. Although the Commission called for the deployment of 100 missiles, the level ultimately deployed will be influenced by the outcome in Geneva.

- Soon the House will vote on the appropriation of funds for Peacekeeper in the Fiscal Year 1984 Defense Appropriations Bill.

- I wanted to have this meeting to personally assure you that this Administration remains totally committed to reaching an arms control agreement with the Soviets. In fact, we have recently taken a series of new, flexible initiatives in our arms control position.

- The latest initiative which the U.S. has proposed - a guaranteed build-down designed to encourage stabilizing systems - was developed after months of consultations with your colleagues.

- This flexibility on the part of the United States has been possible and will continue to be possible, only if we are moving forward on procurement and deployment of the MX missiles.

- Remember, the three elements of the Scowcroft recommendations which you voted to support are an integral and complementary package. (MX, Small Missile and Arms Control)

- Some Democrats want to make arms control a political football in 1984. The American people do not believe that this should be a partisan issue and neither do I. Arms control is too important an issue to let the bipartisan consensus, which was reached earlier this year, slip away.

- We have fulfilled our promise with respect to arms control. Now Congress must show the resolve necessary to allow us to continue to move forward on the other aspects of the Scowcroft Commission recommendations.

- I hope I can count on your help to implement all elements of Scowcroft Commission recommendations.

- Now I'll recognize Bud McFarlane to bring us up to date on where we stand in the negotiations now underway in Geneva.
