I. PURPOSE

To recognize three champions and the director of last Sunday's New York City Marathon.

II. BACKGROUND

Rod Dixon, 33, of New Zealand, was crowned Sunday the winner of the New York City Marathon after one of the most dramatic finishes the race has seen. Dixon, originally a track star, was the bronze medal winner in the 1500 meters at the 1972 Olympics. When New Zealand supported the boycott of the 1980 Olympics, he turned to road racing.

Grete Waitz, 30, of Norway, was crowned Sunday as winner of the women's division of the Marathon for the fifth time in the past six years. She is the first five-time winner of the event and was among those honored by the President after last year's event.

John Paul Cruz, 22, of New York, as a result of the drug thalidomide, was born with one leg. He is the first one-legged person to complete the race without the assistance of an artificial limb. He has been sponsored and supported by the Achilles Track Club, a group for handicapped runners.

Fred Lebow, 51, is the Director of the New York City Marathon and President of the New York Road Runners Club (NYRRC). He created the New York City Marathon in 1970 and has been the driving force behind it since that time. In recent years, NYRRC, a private non-profit corporation, has sponsored handicapped runners through its subsidiary, the Achilles Track Club, and has encouraged running among those in the lower income urban community. Mr. Cruz is a product of these efforts.

MEETING WITH SENATORS STROM THURMOND (R-SOUTH CAROLINA)  
AND PAUL LAXALT (R-NEVADA)

DATE: Wednesday, October 26, 1983

I. PURPOSE

To respond to a request from Senators Thurmond and Laxalt for a meeting with the President to discuss the Administration's anti-crime legislation pending before the Congress.

II. BACKGROUND

In their letter of September 14, Senators Thurmond and Laxalt requested a meeting with you to urge that you personally become more closely identified with the issue of crime and the Administration's response to that problem. They want to explore ways by which you can emphasize the Administration's impressive record in Federal law enforcement. They further have stated their belief that your personal involvement in this issue is critical in insuring the passage of the Administration's Comprehensive Crime Control Act.

The Senate Judiciary Committee has favorably reported your Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1983. This legislation has been reported as a package of several individual bills. It includes a "core" bill. This is a consensus bill which includes several elements of the original Administration legislation. In addition, six other bills were reported from the Committee dealing with: reinstatement of the death penalty; habeas corpus reform; reform of the exclusionary rule; a Kennedy bill on sentencing reform; a Biden bill on forfeiture reform; and a Biden drug tsar bill.

Senator Baker had hoped to begin debate on this crime legislation on Monday, October 24. That did not occur and as of yet has not been rescheduled although floor action is expected in the very near future. Senators Thurmond, Laxalt, Biden and Kennedy have agreed to

work actively to move the core bill and push for its enactment. Senators Biden and Kennedy also have agreed to support Senators Thurmond and Laxalt's efforts to have the controversial items considered by the Senate as separate bills. This includes an agreement to fight against any filibusters against floor consideration of these proposals.

### I. PURPOSE

To express appreciation for the support of the National Republican Jewish Coalition, to welcome its new members, and to engage in a dialogue with these American Jewish leaders who support you on matters of concern to the American Jewish community.

### II. BACKGROUND

The National Republican Jewish Coalition is a group of American Jewish leaders who support your policies. The Coalition was formed in 1980 with fifty members and now has two hundred members. Currently Richard Fox of Philadelphia serves as Chairman and Max Fisher (who unfortunately will be in Israel at the time of this meeting) is Honorary Chairman. The two Co-Chairmen are George Klein of New York and Gordon Zacks of Columbus, Ohio. Also present will be a number of Jewish appointees in your Administration, such as Philip Abrams, Deputy Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, Elliott Abrams, Assistant Secretary for Human Rights, Department of State, and Gerry Carmen, Director, General Services Administration.

Prior to your arrival, this group will have met briefly with Jim Baker and the Vice President. During the afternoon, the Coalition will meet with Senator Paul Laxalt, Frank Fahrenkopf, Chairman, Republican National Committee and Ed Rollins. They will also be briefed on the Middle East by Richard Murphy, Assistant Secretary of State for Near East Affairs, and on the economy by Martin Feldstein, Chairman, Council of Economic Advisors. Later in the day the Coalition will attend a reception for Israel's Ambassador Meir Rosenne, hosted by the Republican National Committee.

This group is quite anxious to hear you articulate your views on U.S. - Israel relations, the Jordanian Rapid Deployment Force, Lebanon, Egyptian - Israeli relations, Jerusalem and Soviet Jewry. I believe you can expect questions on these subjects.

On the platform will be Richard Fox of Philadelphia, Chairman, National Republican Jewish Coalition, who was your State Chairman in Pennsylvania in 1980, George Klein and Gordon Zacks, Co-Chairmen, National Republican Jewish Coalition. Also seated on the platform will be Faith Whittlesey and Michael Gale, who serves as the Jewish liaison in the Office of Public Liaison.

In your opening remarks, you should recognize Dick Fox, Max Fisher, who unfortunately could not attend because he is in Israel, George Klein and Gordy Zacks. At the conclusion of your remarks, if you so desire, the group would appreciate the opportunity to ask a few questions.
- 11:47 a.m. A receiving line will be formed to have photographs taken of you shaking hands with the participants.
- Noon You depart.
