## STEEL INDUSTRY EXECUTIVES MEETING

#### I. PURPOSE

To review the U.S. steel industry's problems and to hear recommendations by industry executives for remedial action.

## II. BACKGROUND

The steel industry was hard hit by the recession and is not expected to show signs of recovery until the first quarter of 1984. The industry's operating rate is 56% or 20 percentage points below all U.S. manufacturing. The industry also continues to be unprofitable. Aggregate net losses reported in the first quarter of 1983 approximated \$700 million.

The steel industry executives have urged the Administration to take a number of steps to improve the industry's condition. These include imposing quotas to limit imports to 15 percent of the U.S. market, additional tax credits, safe harbor leasing incentives, and clarification and revision of antitrust laws to encourage consolidation in the industry.

Relating to your Japan trip, industry executives will also talk about the effect of the undervalued yen on the industry's competitiveness and profitability.

I. PURPOSE

To sign into law H.R. 3913, the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education Appropriations of 1984.

#### II. BACKGROUND

On October 20, 1983 both the Senate and House approved the Conference Report on H.R. 3913 providing \$104.4 billion in appropriations for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education. Your signature on this legislation will mark the first time since 1978 that a Labor, Health and Human Services and Education appropriations measure has been enacted. During the interim years, funding has been provided for these agencies of government through a series of continuing resolutions.

H.R. 3913 includes \$9.2 billion more than the funding recommended in your FY 1984 budget. This legislation bars the use of Federal funds to pay for abortions unless the life of the mother is endangered. The legislation also includes \$7.1 billion in advances to the Unemployment Trust Fund in order to continue the Federal Supplemental Unemployment Compensation Program.

like it. Since 1978, Congress and Presidents have been unable to reach agreement on funding for Federal human services, so until today, those services have been financed not by appropriation bills, but by continuing resolutions.

These disagreements over funding have taken place against the backdrop of a larger struggle -- a struggle that transcends partisan politics and involves every American: the Federal Government's struggle to regain control of its own budget.

In the mid-seventies, Federal spending lurched out of control. Neither the Congress nor the Presidents seemed able to hold down the upward spiral. In the 10 years before we took office, Federal spending tripled. It became clear that unless something was done, our Nation would move from a mostly private economy, with all the marvelous benefits of enterprise and innovation that entails, to the grim stagnation of an economy where the Government controls most resources.

Our Administration took office determined to get that budget under control -- but to do so with compassion for all Americans. We cut taxes, passed tax indexing, and cut the rate of growth of Federal spending by nearly 40 percent. Now, those steps brought order back to the economy and cut inflation from more than 12 to under 3 percent, restoring economic opportunity for all. And lets remember: while many government services are important to our Nation's needy, in the long run no government program can help Americans in need as much as a healthy and growing economy.

Again and again, our Administration and responsible voices on the Hill have urged the Congress to join our effort to bring the budget under control. Though far from perfect, this appropriation bill proves that both the executive and legislative branches of our Government now recognize the overriding need for fiscal restraint and can work together to achieve it.

I know a big bill like this takes thousands of hours to put together, and I want to thank the chairmen of the appropriations committees, their staffs, and those concerned in the executive branch for all their hard work. This bill is a big step forward, and your time and effort represent a genuine service to our Nation.

Thank you, God bless you, and now let me sign the bill.
