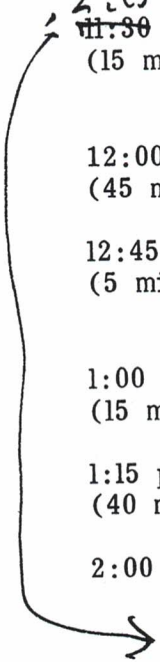
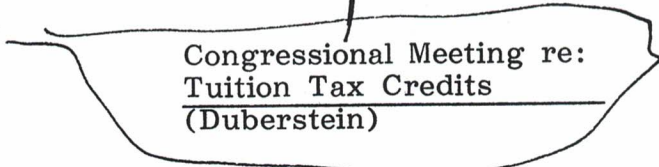

I. PURPOSE

To brief the GOP leadership on the President's trip to Japan and Korea and to review the legislative schedule for the remainder of this session of the Congress.

II. BACKGROUND

This is the last scheduled meeting of the GOP leadership for this session of the Congress. The target date for adjournment is this Friday, November 18, and, barring any last minute hitches, Senator Baker and Speaker O'Neill are confident work will be completed for this year. The Congress plans to reconvene on January 23rd.

There are several major items on this week: Bill Clark's confirmation, the Debt Ceiling Extension, Export Administration Act, IMF Authorization (and, if time permits, appropriations), Revenue Sharing Conference Report, DOD Appropriations Conference Report, Civil Rights Commission Reauthorization, Tuition Tax Credits (in the Senate), Intelligence Authorization Conference Report (if conference completed), Reconciliation, and a hearing before the Ways and Means Committee on enterprise zones.

This meeting also provides an opportunity to brief the leadership on the results of the President's trip to Japan and Korea.

TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH REPUBLICAN
CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

JAPAN/KOREA

- I want to report to you briefly on the highlights of my trip to Japan and Korea.

- Our recent trip to Japan and Korea was informative, enjoyable and productive.

- In Japan, we discussed trade, finance, security assistance, and energy matters. We received a commitment from the the Japanese to import from us a minimum of 10-12 tons of metallurgical coal. On the other issues, we have established an agenda for progress between now and next summer. To demonstrate our commitment to this process, I have asked George Bush to monitor our side's efforts.

- In Korea, we sought to reassure President Chun and the Korean people of our abiding security commitment and our support for Korea's improving political climate. My visit to the DMZ was truly moving. You all would have been so proud of our soldiers there, who are literally on freedom's front line.

-- Overall, our trip sought to demonstrate that we, too, are a Pacific country. Without lessening our Atlantic and other commitments, we intend to participate fully in the exciting and promising future of the Pacific region.

-- I will now ask George Shultz to add any thoughts he would like.

LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

- With the target date for adjournment being this Friday, there are many items that need to be completed.

- A debt limit extension must be passed before you go home. There is no acceptable alternative. I will ask Don Regan to say a few words on what would happen if an extension is not adopted.

REMARKS FOLLOWING DON REGAN'S COMMENTS

- There are several other must-do items: Bill Clark's nomination, IMF and consideration of tuition tax credits (in the Senate).

- On tuition tax credits, let me just say I am absolutely committed to the passage of the legislation. I know some of you have problems with it, but I believe this proposal to bring tax equity to the parents of private school students is correct public policy.

- We also must complete action on the Defense Department Appropriations Bill.

- I am hopeful there will also be final and favorable action on Revenue Sharing, Export Administration, Defense Production Act and Intelligence Authorization Conference Reports.

- This is an ambitious last week of the session but I believe these items are all doable.

- Now let me turn to Howard and then Bob for their reports.

I. PURPOSE

To express your enthusiasm for the up-coming vote on your tuition tax credit legislation, S. 528.

II. BACKGROUND

You transmitted S. 528, the Educational Opportunity and Equity Act of 1983, to the Congress earlier this year. The first meeting you held this year with Members of Congress concerned tuition tax credits.

The Senate Finance Committee, earlier this past summer, reported your legislation virtually unchanged. In conjunction with a coalition of private school leaders, the White House has been working towards finding an appropriate vehicle in order to bring this measure up on the Senate floor. Yesterday, Senator Baker moved to call up H.J. Res. 290, a minor tariff bill, to which the tuition tax credit legislation is being considered as an amendment. Opponents, apparently believing that they do not have the votes to table the tuition tax credit amendment, have launched a filibuster against the motion to proceed to H.J. Res. 290. A cloture petition has been filed and will be voted on one hour after convening on Wednesday. Sixty votes are needed to invoke cloture.
