SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING
WITH SENATOR LAXALT

- Paul, it is good to see you and to have this opportunity to discuss the State, Justice, Commerce appropriations bill.

- I know you have managed this bill well in the Senate, and that you were successful in keeping even more funds from being added during Senate debate.

- However, I also understand that the bill is approximately \$731 over my request, and this gives me great concern in terms of approving it. I know that you and Dave (Stockman) have been discussing this issue, and I am interested to hear your thinking on it.

 (Let Laxalt make his case for supporting the bill; ask Stockman to participate in discussion of the specifics.)

- Well, Paul, I think this has been a helpful discussion, and I will talk further with Dave and others before we make a final decision. Your comments, as always, are appreciated.

I. PURPOSE

A meeting with some of the leading Attorneys General prior to the National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG) Winter meeting in Hawaii, December 5-9, 1983, will demonstrate the Administration's interest in NAAG and confirm your appreciation for their general support of your crime package pending in Congress.

II. BACKGROUND

Attorneys General are second only to governors as prominent statewide elected officials. The NAAG Winter meeting is expected to be well attended and resolutions are likely to be considered. The NAAG annual meeting will be held next June.

The Attorneys General can be expected to raise the following topics for which NAAG has supported the Administration's positions:

- o Attorneys Fee Reform Proposal
- o The bulk of the Crime Package
- o The Solicitor General's decision not to appeal the Exxon oil overcharge case court ruling.

General Greely can be expected to invite you to attend the NAAG conferences.

The Attorneys General are especially complimentary of Attorney General William French Smith and his assistance in providing training for Supreme Court appearances and improving office management through the lend/lease program.
