I. PURPOSE

To speak with Chancellor Kohl to the crew of the Ninth Space Shuttle Mission carrying Spacelab built by the European Space Agency (ESA).

II. BACKGROUND

The current mission is the ninth flight of the space shuttle. The nine-day flight began on November 28 at the Kennedy Space Center and will conclude on December 7 at NASA's Dryden Flight Research Facility at Edwards Air Force Base (there is some consideration being given to extending the flight by one day).

The cargo, a scientific laboratory called Spacelab, was designed and built by the European Space Agency (ESA) for \$1 billion. The thirteen country members of ESA gave the spacelab to the United States to use for scientific research making this one of the most important cooperative space/science projects to date. It is noteworthy that West Germany paid over 55% of the cost of building Spacelab.

Spacelab facilitates advanced scientific research in space. It gives scientists unparalleled opportunities to initiate and alter experiments as well as to react to scientific opportunities as they develop in space.

In the onboard laboratory, more than 70 separate experiments are being conducted in five broad categories of research: life sciences, atmospheric physics and earth observations, astronomy and solar physics, space plasma physics, and materials technology. Additional detail on the experiments is as follows:

(a) Life Sciences: Fundamental data are sought to shed light on how plants and animals actually evolved on earth;

(b) Solar Science: Onboard experiments will help man

understand the relationship of the earth and the sun and also issues related to fusion energy sources;

(c) Astronomy: Continuous astronomical observations are being conducted in the pure and unobstructed space environment;

(d) Earth Sciences: Microwave radar and metric camera equipment will provide improved views of the continents and uncharted areas of the Earth;

(e) Atmospheric Science: Experiments will help us understand the causes and effects of our weather and magnetic storms on the sun,

(f) Materials Science: Experiments will increase our knowledge of the promising new field of weightless metalurgical and semi-conductor manufacturing.

The first non-American astronaut to fly on an American spacecraft is on board. He is Dr. Ulf Merbold, a West German physicist from the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart. The other crew members are: Commander John W. Young who has flown in space five times and has been to the moon twice (you have met John on a couple of occasions at the White House following the first shuttle flight), Dr. Owen K. Garriott who is an electrical engineer and was on the second Skylab mission, Brewster H. Shaw who is an Air Force major and is on his first mission, Dr. Robert A. Parker who is an astronomer and on his first mission, and Dr. Byron K. Lichtenberg, a biomedical engineer on his first flight.

Chancellor Kohl, this is a great day. Perhaps you could give us your thoughts on this marvelous occasion.

FINAL STATEMENT

I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate the entire crew. You're doing a fantastic job and we're proud of you. Your

energy, creativity, and your courage are an inspiration to us all.

It's hard to believe, when looking at the highly sophisticated project we've just witnessed, that it was just over 25 years ago that the United States launched its first satellite, a 31 pound cylinder-shaped projectile named Explorer One. Shortly after that NASA, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, was created to make sure mankind got every benefit possible from the exploration of space.

Our investment in space has been an exceptional bargain. By-products now touch our lives in so many ways. This phone hook-up, as well as the calls everyday of millions of people around the world are made via communication satellites. Weather and navigation satellites guide us and help us protect our lives and property. The high tech spinoffs of our space effort are too numerous to list.

The experiments on this shuttle mission will add to the treasury of human knowledge and be put to practical use, improving our lives right here on Earth.

This mission is also a shining example of international cooperation at its best. The Spacelab we've just toured was a gift to the United States from our European friends. Building on that goodwill, this is the first time a citizen from another country has joined one of our space missions as a member of the crew. It is an exciting first.

It must be particularly exciting for our German friends. Chancellor Kohl, I just want to tell you that it is such an honor

for us to be together in demonstrating to the world that when people are free and work together, there is nothing that can't be accomplished. Together the free people of the world, with the use of technology, are building a world of prosperity and peace never imaginable a few decades ago.

Chancellor Kohl, perhaps you have some parting thoughts.


