PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: LUNCH WITH AMERICAN SECURITY COUNCIL TUESDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1983

We're honored to have all of you here today. As you know, I've had some experience on the after dinner speaking circuit. So I'm well aware of how dangerous it is to make long speeches -- especially before the audience has had a chance to eat. My remarks are going to be brief because what I have to say is important but can be simply put.

You would not be here today if you had not already shown your willingness to make sacrifices and lend a personal hand in the struggle now going on in the world between totalitarianism and human freedom.

For those of us who have been part of it for the last quarter century, that struggle has sometimes been a very discouraging one. We can remember the sad circumstances of only a few years ago. Everywhere in the world, freedom seemed on the retreat. Soviet expansionism in Central America, Africa, Southwest Asia, especially Afghanistan, was unchecked. We had been getting lectures about our inordinate fear of communism. And we were afraid to broadcast the truth while the Soviets were flooding the world with propaganda.

I think that is turning around now -- there are insurgencies in a number of Soviet client states, the fissures in the Soviet empire are deepening and the United States is emerging as a consistent and strong defender of freedom and democracy.
