#### I. PURPOSE

To seek Senator Evans' support for the nomination of Judge Robert Bork.

#### BACKGROUND II.

Senator Evans had a very cordial meeting with Judge Bork on September 14. He asked Judge Bork about his views on civil rights and privacy and seemed pleased with his response. He came to the Senate in 1983 in a special election after the death of Scoop Jackson, a Democrat. Senator Evans has said he is undecided and is still reviewing the hearing transcripts. However, it is felt he is leaning for supporting Judge Bork. Last year, he voted to confirm William Rehnquist and Antonin Scalia to be Chief Justice and Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, respectively. Senator's term ends next year, but he has not announced whether or not he will seek another term.

#### A. ARMENIAN ASSEMBLY OF AMERICA

#### I. Purpose

To provide the Armenian Assembly of America with a videotaped message.

#### II. Background

The Armenian Assembly of America will hold a tribute banquet for California's Governer George Deukmejian on October 10 in Boston. The purpose of the conference is to explore the past achievements and the future potential of the Armenian community in America. Vice President Bush will be the keynote speaker at the banquet.

At this conference, the Assembly will launch the Deukmejian Fund for Public Service, which will support research, training seminars, fellowships, symposia and other activities to encourage Armenian Americans to pursue careers in public service.

Your message will be seen by 1000 attendees from across the nation. 95% of the audience will be Armenian Americans and many are public officials.

### B. BETTER BUSINESS BUREAU

## I. Purpose

To provide the Better Business Bureau (BBB) with a videotaped message.

#### II. Background

The BBB will celebrate 75 years of service to consumers at its Annual Assembly in Washington from October 19-22. The BBB has allied itself with your policies of self-regulation, reduced government involvement in the marketplace, and private enterprise initiatives.

Your message will be shown at the opening session on October 19 to 400-500 representatives from BBB's offices across the nation, local businessmen, and spouses.

#### C. U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

#### I. Purpose

To provide the USDA with a videotaped message.

#### II. Background

USDA is sponsoring "World Food Day" on October 16. This event focuses attention on world hunger and is observed on the anniversary of the founding of the Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. The theme this year is "The Small Farmer."

The program will last one hour and will be a live satellite telecast to 800 downlink sites in the U.S. Most of these sites will be universities, local farms, and USDA extension offices.

The program will be held at USDA where your message will also be seen by the several hundred people in the audience.

#### D. AMERICAN DENTAL ASSOCIATION

#### I. Purpose

To provide the American Dental Association (ADA) with a videotaped message.

#### II. Background

The ADA is holding its 128th session October 10-15 in Las Vegas. This convention is one of the largest meetings of any national organization, attracting more than 30,000 people. Last year the group enthusiastically received your taped message on tort reform.

Approximately 3000 people will view your message at the opening ceremony October 10.

#### E. GREAT INTERNATIONAL SOCIETY OF SATELLITES IN SPACE

#### I. Purpose

To provide the "Great International Society of Satellites in Space" with a videotaped message.

#### II. Background

This event is an international conference of communications specialists which will take place in Washington D.C on October 14-16. The 400 attendees at the event will be members of the International Society of Satellite Professionals, an organization formed to promote the dissemination of knowledge regarding satellite technology, especially commercial satellites.

The audience will be from a variety of professions: satellite technology companies, related manufacturers, and distributers of television programming. Your message will be introduced by Charles Wick, who is addressing the group. Dan Rather is the featured speaker and will address them from New York on the topic of "How the Uses of Satellites Have Influenced Government Decisions."

#### F. THE THALIANS

#### I. Purpose

To provide the Thalians with a videotaped message from you and Mrs. Reagan.

#### II. Background

The Thalians are holding their 32nd annual gala on October 17 in Los Angeles. The group is a non-profit charitable organization with 150 members and 300 auxiliary members from show business. This year the Thalians hope to raise \$500,000 for the Thalians Community Mental Health Center.

Approximately 1400 members of the corporate and show business communities will attend. Mary Martin will introduce your tape as a close to the show. This year's show may be made into a syndicated television special.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF BETTER BUSINESS BUREAU MONDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1987

I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate the Council of Better Business Bureaus on its 75th anniversary. Having a deep understanding of what it takes to be active and vibrant after 75 years, I fully appreciate the Bureaus' continuing role in American life.

Few organizations have the rich heritage of service that distinguishes the history of the Better Business Bureaus. Fewer still can point with pride to years of selfless sacrifice, yet that is the hallmark of the Bureaus' activities.

In 1912 a clarion call echoed across the land -- a call for honesty. PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: WORLD FOOD DAY MESSAGE MONDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1987

World Food Day is observed each year on the anniversary of the founding of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

This is a day when people around the world focus on the twin scourges of hunger and poverty. This is a day when we seek ways to end hunger and plan strategies to alleviate suffering.

We couldn't ask for a more appropriate theme for World Food
Day than the one chosen this year, "The Small Farmer." Over half
the world's population still earns a living directly or
indirectly by farming -- many of those small farmers.

Our American farmers have always played a vital role in the well-being of our country. A common misconception today is that American agriculture exists only on the big, commercial farms. In reality, an estimated 600,000 of our Nation's 2.2 million farms are less than 50 acres. The last census showed a 17-percent increase in small farms. And indications are that the next census will show continued growth. Small farmers, then, are still doing their part to provide food and fiber to their fellow citizens and to the people of the world.

Every television screen brings home the horror of death and destruction caused by food shortages in distant lands. Sound agricultural economic policies are essential if hunger is to be alleviated. The small farmers of Asia, Africa, and Latin

America -- given the incentives to plant, grow, harvest, and sell -- can be a mighty force for their countries' survival.

We will help where we can. The United States has a record of agricultural assistance of which we can be proud. This year, for instance, we began an initiative to end hunger in Sub-Saharan Africa that will deal with the overwhelming problems faced by the people of the region. Through economic growth and private initiative, Africa can erase the specter of famine by the end of the century. But it will take the support of all of us -- both here and abroad.

I am proud to be a part of this satellite telecast from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, honoring small farmers around the world. I understand it is being received throughout the United States -- by agricultural and university communities, by public and private sector gatherings, and even in farm homes.

This program focuses on the crucial role of our U.S. institutions of higher education -- particularly historically Black colleges and universities -- in the development and future of the small farm community. One need only remember the incredible scientific contributions made by one man, Dr. Booker T. Washington of Tuskegee University, to know how much can be accomplished when we set our minds to it. Today our universities stand ready to assist the small farmer. Education brings modernization and diversity -- keys to agricultural growth and prosperity.

I want to commend Secretary Lyng and Dr. Joan Wallace,
Administrator of U.S.D.A.'s Office of International Cooperation

and Development, and all the others who helped organize this event. I also want to thank all of you who have organized World Food Day events, and I extend my best wishes and good luck in this worthwhile and exciting endeavor.

I know each and every one of you will join me in honoring the small farmer today and every day. No group of Americans is more deserving of this country's respect and gratitude.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: AMERICAN DENTAL ASSOCIATION CONVENTION MONDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1987

Good morning. I am delighted to greet members of the American Dental Association at your 128th annual session.

My special greetings to your president, Joe Devine, as he completes a most successful year and best wishes to his successor Jim Saddoris [suh-DOOR-iss].

The A.D.A. has a long and honorable history of service to the public. With this in mind, I want to discuss for a moment an issue of great concern to all of us, the AIDS problem and infection control. I have appointed a commission to study the public health dangers of the epidemic, including the medical, legal, ethical, social, and economic impacts.

I know the dental profession is making every effort to prevent the spread of this disease. Your association's infection control guidelines and guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control are a big step forward -- they represent state-of-the-art knowledge about AIDS and will go a long way in preventing the transmission of this disease in the dental office.

But we need more. And we are doing more. Astounding progress has been made against this dreadful disease. It took 40 years to learn as much about polio as we know about AIDS. It took 19 years to develop the vaccine that protects you and your patients against hepatitis B. We're just as committed this time as we were in the battle against hepatitis.

Important work is being done through the National Institute of Dental Research. Their survey of working adults and older Americans documented a national decline in dental disease and identified aspects of dental care that require further attention. The Dental Institute is also working on the AIDS problem. Scientists are looking at a possible early indicator of the disease in saliva and are studying the way the AIDS virus moves through the body.

The dental unit at the National Bureau of Standards has generated so many milestones -- the high speed dental handpiece, the panoramic x-ray, new methods for restoring teeth, just to mention a few. The technological strides that have been made are reason for optimism about the years ahead.

On another matter, as I mentioned in a message to you last year, we are pleased with your support of tort and insurance reforms. I recently received a report from Health and Human Services Secretary Bowen recommending steps to reduce liability insurance costs. His report said increases in liability premiums may prevent some Americans from getting health care, and that concerns me greatly.

Too many individuals, for whatever reasons, simply aren't getting the care you can provide. Some, perhaps, don't understand what modern dentistry can do for them or don't appreciate the value of good dental health. Others may be blocked by physical, mental, social, or financial barriers. I'm committed, with you, to tearing down those barriers and getting the word out.

In closing, let me just say, I wish you the best as you set policies that will guide the dental profession in the years ahead. May your deliberations be productive and your policies wise. Good luck and God bless you.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: CONFERENCE OF GREAT INTERNATIONAL SOCIETY OF SATELLITES IN SPACE MONDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1987

Good afternoon. I'm delighted to join all of you during "The Great International Celebration of Satellites in Space."

And there is much to celebrate when we reflect upon the enormous accomplishments in satellite technology over the past 30 years. I would like to commend the International Society of Satellite Professionals for organizing this event, and I understand that, quite appropriately, you have speakers and guests from a variety of nations. To our friends from Great Britain, Canada, France, Italy, Japan, Mexico, and the Soviet Union, I extend an especially warm welcome to the United States and Washington.

I vividly recall the 1950's, when the United States and the Soviet Union led mankind's venture into space. It was in 1957, during the International Geophysical Year, that the first man-made earth satellites were put into orbit. Well, credit must be given where credit is due: the Soviets were first, 30 years ago this month, when they successfully launched Sputnik I.

But we weren't far behind. Within 4 months of the first Sputnik, the United States successfully launched Explorer I. These extraordinary accomplishments by the Soviet Union and the United States, during the 1950s, triggered a series of technological breakthroughs that have profoundly changed our world. In retrospect, the competition between the United States

and the Soviet Union has been a boon to all mankind in that it has pushed us to reach achievements in the peaceful use of space.

We Americans, of course, relish competition. But, let me stress, we also believe in cooperation. I'd like to take this opportunity to reaffirm America's willingness to work cooperatively with the Soviet Union to the benefit of all humanity in regard to the research we are both conducting on strategic defenses. Rather than restrict progress, we should appreciate its benefits together. I firmly believe that advances being made in defensive technology have great potential for ushering the world into a safer future. The spirit of international goodwill concerning the use of space, as is evident at your gathering today, could well suggest the possibility for more extensive cooperation in the years ahead. Some may call it a dream, but perhaps new technology can help break down old barriers and make this a more secure world for all.

Mankind has tremendous opportunities ahead. The United States is now about to embark on exported private sector development, exploration, and commercialization of space. I think we can be confident that if we set our sights high -- perhaps on the stars -- that current obstacles to the forward progress of mankind will be overcome.

Again, my thanks for the opportunity to be with you. Enjoy yourselves today, tonight, tomorrow. We do indeed have a lot to celebrate.
