RED FLAGS: Conservative religious leaders who support the President are displaying increased concern over what they see as a disdain for them in the Administration. E. V. Hill, the black minister from Los Angeles who wasrecently offered the post of Chairman of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, turned it down primarily on the grounds that he is fighting to get White House support for his efforts to encourage church-related coluntary activism to help the needy. Perhaps (over) KUDOS:

Kudos to the National Right to Work Committee, the Senate Republican Conference, and the College Republican National Committee for their efforts to prevent the September 19th Solidarity Day from being a propaganda triumph for enemies of the Reagan Administration. This demonstration is largely funded by organized labor but is gathering momentum as it draws support from groups as diverse as the Democratic National Committee and the splinter groups of Marxist militants. Although organizaed labor purports to be pro-defense, the leftist protestors will skillfully attempt to capture the event for the "Ban the Bomb"

cause. With the exception of the National Right to Work Committee, the Senate Republican Conference, and the College Republican National Committee, there appears to be no effort to counteract the intended effect of Solidarity Day

like Thomas Sowell, the black economist who turned down the job of Secretary of Education, Hill saw himself taken away from his real area of interest for use as a token for public relations effect.

The Rally for Life on September 3rd in Dallas, which I have mentioned previously, seems virtually certain to increase unrest in the conservative religious community, as well as the explicitly pro-life organizations.

Our failure to be able to arrange meetings between the President and this segment of his winning coalition is a constant source of irritation and a frequent subject of conversation among the leaders of the respective groups. As a result, I have suggested that they lower their sights and request meetings, if appropriate, with Mr. Meese, Mr. Baker and Mr. Deaver.

This meeting was held at the request of Herb Ellingwood and me. Jim Rosebush explained what he was doing in the area of encouraging voluntarism. His primary emphasis is on the business community. At one point, he went so far as to express the opinion that efforts to improve the economic condition of the needy ought to be the responsibility of the business community and that the religious community should concentrate on filling spiritual needs. He waffled a bit on this position upon being pressed by Herb Ellingwood and me regarding the importance of involving the religious community in voluntary action. When I described the decision on the part of many conservative religious leaders in recent years to emulate the practice of most liberal religious leaders by taking it as part of their role in life to activate their congregations in the public policy process, Rosebush said he regretted this trend among conservative church leaders. To that, I responded that in my judgement, he would not be sitting where he does today if conservative religious leaders had not made that decision because their support made them an essential element of the President's winning coalition. All in all, it was not an auspicious meeting.

RED FLAGS: The O'Connor nomination continues to be a focal point of disappointment among conservative and pro family leaders. On Sept 3 there will be a rally at the Dallas Convention Center in which conservative organization leaders will attempt to focus public attention on this issue. See attached sheet.

KUDOS: Ron Andrade, Executive Director of the National Congress of American Indians, who has been notable in his praise of the process by which the Administration is developing its policy toward issues of importance to Indian people.

CHANGES IN ISSUE FORECAST: Conservative and Republican organizations are gearing up in anticipation of the Sept. 19th "Solidarity Day", which is being organized by the AFL-CIO and co sponsored by a growing coalition of AFL-CIO fronts and other liberal and left wing organizations. RED FLAGS: The repeated news stories regarding the contents of a forthcoming report by a Justice Department Commission relating to gun control has our pro-gun allies in an agitated state that is reminiscent of the pro-life groups nitial reaction to Sandra O'Connor. According to press reports, this commission will recommend stiffer gun controls, including a provision requiring citizens to eport the loss or theft of handguns. This is a big red flag for the pro-gun groups who see this as another move toward an eventual policy of gun confiscation. the pro-life groups and the pro-gun groups are two of the most highly organized cont)

Kudos to John Fales of the Blinded Veterans Association who rranged a meeting with Ed Meese and Robert Nimmo and presented excellent locumentation of reasons why Dave Christian should not be appointed Deputy dministrator of Veterans Affairs. Until this meeting, Christian was the eading candidate for the job, but the depth of feeling among the major veterans roups (American Legion, VFW, DAV) wasnot known until Fales spoke up. (Sensitive to their difficulties in the selection process for Administrator, the leaders of eterans organizations were uncharacteristically reluctant to express their trong feelings against Christian.

CHANGES IN ISSUE FORECAST: Our relationships with Indian organizations ave been steadily improving. With the largest group, the National Congress of merican Indians, they are good. With the third largest group, the Council of nergy Resource Tribes, they are excellent. Our problem has been with the ational Tribal Chairmen's Association, which has operated on a confrontation asis with us, calling for the resignation of Secretary Watt. The designation f Ken Smith, Assistant Secretary of the Interior for Indian Affairs, as the head f a Cabinet Council level working group on Indian policy has had a good effect n Indian leadership across the country. We worked this concept out with Bob arleson of the Office of Policy Development. Ken Smith's announcement of this

ew policy working group at the meeting of the NTCA in Billings, Montana this eek had a calming effect on this group. The hotheaded executive director, lmer Savilla, is not mollified, but he is now operating under the contraint f a much warmer feeling to the Administration on the part of his own constituency.

RED FLAGS: The Mary Louise Smith appointment to the Civil Rights Commission will sow more discontent among conservative movement and pro-Reagan Republicans. Saying that she is not being appointed Chairman of the Civil Rights Commission, but will be a Commissioner will do no more for the President among pro-family forces than would telling them regarding Sandra O'Connor "at least we didn't appoint her Chief Justice."
