SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES

AWACS BRIEFING: by Under Secretary of State James Buckley and Col. Robert Lilac of the Air Force was very enthusiastically received by the audience of 60 leaders of veterans, military, conservative, and religious organizations. Many expressed the view that they will accelerate their efforts to convince Senators to support the President. After the meeting a number of the leaders remained in discussions and exchanged information on Senate targets for their attentions.

BRIEFING on FAMILY PROTECTION ACT: by Senator Jepsen and Congressman Albert Lee Smith and leaders of the Eagle Forum, Moral Majority, Pro-Family Coalition, and United Families of America. Briefed were representatives of OPD, OMB, OPL, Congressional Affairs, HHS, and Department of Education. This was a cordial first meeting. The first major indication to these pro-family groups thus far that the White House policy makers have an active interest in their cause.

SHOWING OF PBS FILM, "FRANK, A VIETNAM VETERAN" Had 30 leaders of veterans and military groups preview controversial film to be run nationwide on PBS on Nov. 11. Veterans groups leaders appreciated previewing this program which many feel gives a terribly one-sided picture of the Vietnam Veteran: drugs, war crimes, homosexuality, psychiatric problems, employment instability, etc.

RED FLAGS:

1. Growing unrest among conservative-religious leaders about their perceived exclusion from Presidential task force on Private Sector Initiatives.
2. Strong objections to proposed new cuts at VA from veterans groups heretofore strong supporters of the President's legislative program.

SUMMARY:

These ladies were primarily concerned about the lack of support by this Administration for pro-family positions which the President took during the 1980 campaign. They were particularly embittered about the recent Sandra O'Connor controversy. They said that the Republican upsurge in Minnesota is likely to collapse because their grass-roots supporters, who were recently activated in pro-family causes, were close to giving up political activism on the grounds that even winning elections doesn't change government policy.

They intend to keep fighting but they say their troops will melt away unless the Administration changes its passive role on social issues.

I reminded them of Senator Laxalt's speech before the Eagle Forum last Friday night in which he said his recent conversations with the President convinced him that the Administration will start taking an activist role in social issue controversies early next year.

RED FLAGS

1. Comment by Ed Meese at meeting of Pacific Legal Foundation has set off controversy among conservative and pro-family groups. Reportedly Mr. Meese said that the President was likely to sign a bill extending the life of the Legal Services Corp. if it were attached to an important appropriation bill. These groups are prepared for a massive effort to support a Presidential veto. They feel that only masochism could impel the Administration to keep funding this nest of hard-core activists against his legislative program.
2. A rising level of concern about the issue of criminal code revision. Current proposal has many elements analogous to defeated changes in D.C. sexual offense law. Also offends many "law and order types" by decreasing penalties for hundreds of offenses. Many Kennedy-supported elements of this proposal also drastically increase criminal liability of business executives. This hot potato could quickly become of great concern to major elements of the President's winning coalition.

MISCELLANEOUS

Senator Jepsen getting great reaction from a broad spectrum of political groups for his proposal to defund the Federal Election Commission. He would retain disclosure but eliminate all F.E.C. regulatory power.

They do not recognize the legitimacy of the tribal corporations recognized by the federal government. They said that there would be starvation and violence this winter if the federal government did not promptly move to deal through their traditional structures. Fran Ayer of the BIA took down their information and responded, that by law, the government is required to conduct its dealings through the federally recognized governments. She referred to an example of a New York tribe where, dissident, traditional leaders organized and overthrew the elected tribal leadership.
