# Christian right finds little interest in race

ROANOKE (AP) — Conservative Christian political groups have largely remained uninvolved in the contest for governor between Republican Marshall Coleman and Democrat Charles S. Robb.

"There is not much to get excited about," said Harry Dean of Richmond, executive director of the Virginia chapter of the Rev. Jerry Falwell's Moral Majority.

Dean and others said neither Robb nor Coleman has talked at length about issues central to their movement — abortion, the Equal Rights Amendment, pornography. And when they have, he said, they often have taken the same stand.

Also blamed was a letdown following the 1980 election of President Reagan and other conservatives around the country. It's hard to get the troops moving again so quickly, especially without a major issue to rally around, spokesmen for the conservative Christian groups said.

The state chapter of Moral Majority will mail a newsletter to about 10,000 Virginians in the final weeks of the campaign. It will include interviews with the candidates on its key issues, but the interviews will be printed "with no editorializing whatsoever."

"If you remember, Falwell said he isn't going to take a personal interest," said Harry Covert, editor of the Moral Majority Report. He referred to a statement made by Falwell during the summer after Robb came to call in Lynchburg.

Covert is one of few Moral Majority leaders who have taken a public stand. He is a member of the newly formed Virginians for Coleman committee.

He is also recruiting members of Falwell's church and students at Liberty Baptist College to work for the local Republican operation. But he agreed that such activity isn't common across the state.

### Lack of activity noted

If there is a post-1980 letdown, "it's really a tragedy, because Virginia is the first test" for Reagan policies at the polls, Covert said. And he is disappointed in the state chapter's lack of activity.

"I would think they would be more active. I do not know why they aren't. Personally, I think they should be out pitching for conservatives," he said.

"Nobody is really blowing the trumpets," said the Rev. Rudy Holland of Berean Baptist. Church in Salem. "You don't see our people with bumper stickers on their cars. Robb and Coleman have divided the conservative ranks, even with our people."

Like many leaders of the movement, Holland said he is committed to Coleman, but doesn't expect to see many members of his church get as involved as they did in Reagan's campaign or the unsuccessful bid of former Del. Guy Farley for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor.

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

## Recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature from the Chairman

- 1. That the State of Alabama adopt a comprehensive plan for children based on the needs of children and families and that such a plan embrace areas of all state agency jurisdictions and cover the following six areas:
  - 1. Basic health care and education for families using the public health system.

Nutrition education and assistance.

- Basic education for literacy and individual worth.
- 4. Social services for children and families in poverty, and/or trauma.

5. Justice for children and juveniles.

 Prevention programs - interdisciplinary in nature.


Such a comprehensive plan based on <u>need</u> would have the advantage of forcing Federal programs to have a degree of conformity to the State master plan. This would enable the elimination of overlapping services and duplication of much administrative expense.

- 2. That the legislature adopt a community school act which would be a state statute proclaiming local schools the property of local communities. This in fact would make local school facilities more easily used for the dissimination and delivery of health and social services in each county and delivery of health and social services in each community as well as for an extension of educational programs for adults and other special populations.
- 3. That the governor's office establish an Office of Volunteerism whose primary purpose would be to utilize the private sector willingness to cooperate with existing and new programs to serve children and families. Examples of this would be that a multi-disciplinary team such as social workers from DPS, public health workers, and agricultural extension personnel, and mental health workers might all cooperate in the training of the volunteers

to carry out such local community programs as follows:

- a. Mothers Day Out programs.
- b. Day Care Centers.
- c. Crisis Shelters.
- d. Homes for Pregnant Teens
- e. Counseling abusive parents
- f. Counseling abused persons.
- g. Training of foster parents.
- h. Training of foster grandparents.
- i. Prevention education programs.
- j. Parenting Assistance.
- k. Awareness of special populations "in need" or "at risk".

The outreach of these programs could be carried out through Junior Leagues, local Charity Leagues, Agricultural Homemakers Clubs, individual Churches, Communities' Mothers Clubs, Parents Without Partners organizations, and on and on.



- a. Providing aid and insight to industries who desire to give day care assistance for employees with young children.
- b. To motivate industry to prorate the fringe benefits of working mothers with young children at home.
- c. To encourage industry to explore alternative job hours for mothers of young children as well as varying days on and off the job.

The Office of Volunteerism could seek out in the private sector the recognized leadership that is capable of training volunteers for effective service such as the Junior League membership, the Agriculture Homemakers Clubs, retired teachers, and men caught in forced retirement.

Another recommendation for the Office of Volunteerism would be analysis of advertising policies in the private sector and attempt to encourage more public service advertising such as Liberty National's advertising emphasis on child abuse and neglect in 1979.

Sub-committee recommendations are to be found in the section of the report dealing with their particular areas.

Re: Evangelical/Pro-Family Meeting for Budget Cut Support

Last week when representatives of the Family Policy Advisory Board met with the President, I mentioned to him an idea, of which this memo is, at your request, an elaboration.

The evangelical/pro-family movement would probably be willing to support the President's proposed budget cuts, if asked. However, they have not been asked yet. I recommend strongly that a particularized overture be made to ask for their support.

Why is a special overture needed? When we speak of leaders of the religious revival (which overlaps but is not co-terminous with the "evangelical right"), we are speaking of people with full agendas and hectic schedules. Many are people who do not ordinarily think in political or policy terms , and who do not hear political conversations. Many are green to politics; thus, in all candor, it would not occur to them to realize how they could be helpful. Some of them retain ancestral shyness from politics; some are skeptical of giving their support. Most of them are of sufficient stature in their own circles that I suggest they be personally asked to support the President. Withthe predictable storm of protest that the budget cuts are going to provoke from the National Council of Churches/U.S. Catholic Conference types, some favorable editorializing and preaching from the religious community will be needed by the Administration.

I would be happy -- and hereby offer -- to work with you and anyone else from the White House to set up a meeting for this purpose.

I suggest the following scenario: a day be chosen, on which the President himself will come for at least 10-15 minutes to speak to the group, to be preceded and followed by perhaps Director Stockman, Secretary Schweiker, or others familiar with both the budget process and the special concerns of this group. I will be happy to co-sign telegrams inviting leaders to the meeting; If need be, I will foot the bill for such telegrams.

The invitation list ought to include many of those attached. Principles only -- with this exception: in the case of a few evangelists with national or international following, whose schedules have been set for months in advance, an alter ego ought to be allowed. I am sure, however, that with just a little advance notice, most of them would be able to come in person.

I look forward to hearing from you.
