BACKGROUND: One impact of cuts in Federal social programs has
been dramatic reduction in government-funded employment
on Indian reservations. The largest tribe, the Navajos,
report total joblessness increased in 1981 from 40%
to 80%. Five presentations will be made of "success
stories" where tribal and corporate leaders have
cooperated in the past to create stable, productive
jobs for reservation Indians. Many benefits will
flow from a call from the President for more tribes
and corporations to learn from successful examples
and to get together and do likewise.

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

On behalf of Jim George, Ray Gilmartin and myself, I would like to thank you for the pleasant visit with you, Jack McClaughrey and Richard Glinn.


We are, naturally, very pleased with the success of our manufacturing facility on the Santee Indian Reservation, and we were happy to have an opportunity to talk about it with you.

As we discussed, we feel that given the right set of circumstances, other companies could also benefit from the establishment of manufacturing facilities on reservations. In order to have a successful venture, we think several key ingredients are necessary. We feel a successful project needs a management and tribal commitment to the long term success of the project; we also feel that some encouragement from Government could be beneficial. One suggestion we made to you at the meeting would be the creation of Enterprise Zones on appropriate Reservations. The existence of an Enterprise Zone could be just the sort of catalyst that is needed.

We started the operation after receiving a request from the Tribal Council to consider the possibility of helping them achieve economic stability by providing jobs for their members.


We started with a long term objective of 25 to 35 jobs in light manufacturing assembly. We now have a sophisticated production operation making critical health care devices manufactured to close tolerances employing 43 people, with plans for continued expansion. All employees are reservation or tribal members.

Mr. Morton Blackwell, Special Assistant to the President for Public Liasion, invited us to visit with him recently to discuss our experiences. During the course of the discussion, he suggested that if we were interested in sharing this information with others who might be considering similar ventures, we should contact you.

We would, of course, be happy to do anything we can to encourage the location of manufacturing facilities on other reservations and will cooperate in any way we can with you.
