The National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB) is a canonical entity operating in accordance with the Conciliar Decree. Christus Dominus. Its purpose is to foster the Church's mission to mankind by providing the Bishops of this country with an opportunity to exchange views and insights of prudence and experience and to exercise in a joint manner their pastoral office. The NCCB is the successor to the Annual Meeting of the Bishops of the United States, approved in the brief "Communes" issued by Pope Benedict XV,

April 10, 1919 and in a special letter of Pius XI issued on August 10, 1927. The present NCCB statutes with some slight amendment are those originally approved by the Sacred Consistorial Congregation in a decree issued on June 22, 1922.

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops is com-posed of every Bishop, residential or titular, who serves the Church in the United States, its territories or possessions. Each Bishop has an active and passive voice in the Conference. Under cer-tain conditions, enunciated in conciliar legislation, the National Conference of Catholic Bishops can initiate actions that are juridically binding on

all the bishops of the country.

Tre National Conference of Catholic Bishops is presided over by a president who is elected by the general membership. Other officers of the organigeneral membership. Other officers of the organization are a vice president, secretary, treasurer and general secretary. The organization functions through forty-two different bishops' committees. The National Conference of Catholic Bishops is a distinct entity from the United States Catholic Conference. Its relationship to the USCC is that of a sponsoring organization. 16

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES

Catholic Relief Services-United States Catholic Conference, Inc. is the official overseas relief and development agency of the American Catholic Community. It was established in 1943 as War Relief Services-NCWC to minister to the needs of the victims of

World War II. Since then, it has grown to be the largest private voluntary aid and development agency in the world. Annually, its programs touch the lives of 14 million people in 75 countries with aid valued at in excess of 350 million.

CRS-USCC is separately incorporated and is directed by a Board of Trustees from the United States Catholic

Conference of Bishops.
While, CRS-USCC receives support from various governmental and non-governmental organizations in about 20 countries, its basic source of funds is the annual collection in most U.S. dioceses on the fourth Sunday of Lent. This collection, known as the CRS Annual Appeal, replenishes the Bishops Welfare, Emergency and Relief Fund, from which the basic operational funds of CRS-USCC are disbursed. In addition, a family sacrifice and almsgiving program called Operation Rice Bowl provide 3.5 million each year. Of these funds 25 percent stays in the local dioceses for the relief of the poor and hungry and 75 percent goes to CRS-USCC for its feeding and development projects.

CRS-USCC is best known for its prompt and effective disaster relief efforts. The majority of its programs, however, are in the area of development. In 1980, besides its food programs, CRS-USCC supported 1,100 such projects valued at over 120 million. The annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection is sponsored by CRS-USCC for the needy

overseas.

Dear Secretary Schweiker:

I am gratified that the proposed regulations on parental notification in Title X family planning programs have been published. As you may recall, I spoke in favor of these regulations in the name of the U.S. Catholic Conference on April 12 of last year (see enclosed). The USCC does not see the distribution of contraceptives to unmarried minors as appropriate federal policy under any circumstances; because the new regulations will restrict some current abuses, we see them as a step in the right direction.

I am also glad to learn that the Office of Family Planning is being reorganized to make it more accountable to the Secretary, and that steps have been taken toward separating abortion more effectively from family planning programs. I hope this trend will continue. Pro-abortion political activity conducted by organizations receiving Title X funds is also cause for concern, as is the current absence of effective regulations protecting the consciences of grantees providing natural family planning services. Much more can and should be done to restrict the misuse of Title X funds, but the fact that reforms have been initiated is very heartening.

While I am sorry to see such a dedicated public servant as yourself leave office, I wish you all success and happiness in your future career in the private sector.

Parental Notification Urged Teen~agers and Prescription Contraceptives

A proposed regulation requiring notification of parents when a teen-ager receives prescription contraceptives has received the support of the U.S. Catholic Conference. However, in a statement released April 12 by Father Daniel Hoye, USCC general secretary, the conference also urged improvements in the regulation. A proposal of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the regulation would require notification of parents within 10 days after a contraceptive drug or device is prescribed. Hoye, urged that the proposal be amended to require notification of parents before prescription contraceptives are dispensed or

used. In the current state of affairs, the USCC statement said, "teen-agers are completely at the mercy of family planning operatives whose ideology of social engineering and population control blinds them to what is really in the best interests of the teen-agers themselves. Teenagers' parents are left to cope with the medical or psychological complications resulting from their children's sexual activity and use of contraceptives, and to deal with pregnancies resulting from the 'contraceptive failures' common among teen-age users of contraceptives." The statement follows.

The U.S. Catholic Conference has expressed its serious reservations concerning federal family-planning programs on several occasions in recent years. Our statement on the Adolescent Health Services and Pregnancy Prevention and Care Act of 1978, for instance, included the following points:

1. The national problem of teen-age pregnancy is linked to a number of complex moral and social problems and will not be resolved without addressing these problems. Programs of contraception, sterilization and abortion are likely to be ineffective as solutions, because they ignore the complexity of the problem in favor of a narrow technological approach. They may even aggravate the problem by promoting the kind of casual attitude toward sexual activity and reproduction that has helped give rise to it.

Abortion and sterilization should be absolutely excluded from any governmental

program.

3. Contraceptives should not be provided to teen-agers as a matter of government policy. This is a matter for the family and parents to deal with, and the government should not pre-empt the prerogatives and responsibilities of the family unit.

4. Any program that does touch upon such matters should require participating agencies to protect parents' rights, most notably the right to be informed regarding contraception, sterilization and abortion. Mechanisms for protecting these rights are absolutely necessary if teen-agers and their parents are to be protected from overt or subtle coercion by such agencies.

These suggestions remain sound. They are particularly relevant to the proposed regulation regarding parental notification when minors receive prescription contraceptives. This regulation has been attacked by some as an intrusion by the government into private matters. In our view exactly the opposite is the case. The very existence of a federal program for providing these drugs and devices to unmarried minors indicates a highly questionable intrusion into family life on government's part. The fact that this program includes no requirement for parental involvement is a national scandal.

In this state of affairs teen-agers are completely at the mercy of family-planning operatives whose ideology of social engineering and population control blinds them to what is really in the best interests of the teen-agers themselves. Teen-agers' parents are left to cope with the medical or psychological complications resulting from their children's sexual activity and use of contraceptives, and to deal with pregnancies resulting from the "contraceptive failures" common among teen-age users of contraceptives. At the same time they are completely excluded from the decision to prescribe these drugs and devices, while those who have made the decision are shielded by law from the consequences. A remedy for this obvious injustice is long overdue.

As currently formulated, the proposed regulation would seem to be the minimum required by the stated intent of Congress that parental involvement be encouraged in these programs. This is clear from several of its

features:

- 1. It requires only notification, not consent.
- 2. It applies only to prescription contraceptives (e.g., the pill and the intrauterine device), not to all birth control devices.
- 3. It requires notification within 10 days after a drug or device is prescribed.

4. It includes a loophole for cases in which physical harm to the teen-ager may result from notification of the parents.

Some have suggested that the proposed regulation is too strict because it goes beyond merely requiring grant recipients to encourage teen-agers to consult with their parents. But such an approach would be totally inadequate. If parental involvement is to be encouraged partly because it places some restraint upon the otherwise absolute discretion of a familyplanning agency serving unmarried minors, then to place the decision as to parental notification at the discretion of the agency and the teen-ager is to make any regulation meaningless. The proposed regulation does not require involvement of parents in their children's decisions about contraception, but gives parents the minimum information necessary to allow them to decide whether or not to become actively involved.

Some have also claimed that the proposed regulation would increase the number of teen-age pregnancies and abortions. Ironically, some of these same groups are aggressive promoters of abortion as a method of birth control and have even brought suit against state laws requiring the notification of parents when an unemancipated minor seeks an abortion. In any case, there is no evidence demonstrating the truth of the claim - indeed, there is no clear evidence demonstrating that federal family-planning programs as currently administered have been effective in reducing the rate of teen-age pregnancy. Current practice, without the requirement of parental notification, tends to separate teen-agers from the family unit, which alone is equipped to help children develop long-range goals, personal discipline and a sense of self-worth. As many researchers are beginning to realize, these intangibles may have a greater impact in discouraging teen-age pregnancy than any merely technological solution. Leaving even that aside, however, the central issue here is whether the federal government, whatever its attempts to justify itself in terms of alleged social benefits, has a right to usurp the rights and responsibilities of parents so completely as even to conceal its own activities vis-a-vis their children behind the mantle of the law.

Thus we accept and support the proposed regulation as a necessary step in the right direction. At the same time we recommend that it be improved in several respects:

1. The regulation as it stands is warranted by public health considerations alone. It allows parents to be aware of possible contraindications or side effects with regard to contraceptives whose effects on teen-agers' metabolism are not thoroughly known; and in case of a medical emergency it enables parents to inform a physician or hospital accurately regarding their child's use of these drugs or devices. This salutary aspect of the regulation should be improved by requiring parental notification before prescription contraceptives are dispensed or used. Since a minor's medical history may contraindicate the use of some forms of contraception, a family medical history is of great importance in assessing possible hazards.

2. Section 59.5(a) (12) (i) D requires the family-planning project to keep a record that notification has been received. Notification to the parents should include the name of the prescribing physician. The name of the prescribing physician and-or the case worker(s) involved should also be available to the secretary on request. Such requirements may be necessary to ensure the accountability of family-planning agencies participating in

federal programs.

REVIEW OF PRO-LIFE DEVELOPMENTS IN THE 97TH CONGRESS

Expectations on the part of Right to Life advocates were exceedingly high as the 97th Congress commenced its work in January of 1981. The November 1980 elections brought in a Pro-Life President of the United States and a large array of Pro-Life Senators and Congressmen. Yet, as the 97th Congress comes to an end, we find that we have not even achieved a roll call vote in either the Senate or House on either the Garn or the Hatch Constitutional Amendment. The one Senate vote taken was a losing roll call vote on a procedural motion on a Helms anti-abortion amendment to a bill.

How did a congressional session of which so much was expected produce so little?

I will explore this question in my remarks today and, at the conclusion, express my opinion as to a future course of action.

The Right to Life movement, at this moment, is divided into two camps as to how to proceed. Part of the movement wishes to pursue the traditional goal of seeking a constitutional amendment to set aside the Supreme Court's 1973 opinion in Roe v. Wade. This was the united Pro-Life objective of everyone almost from the day the Supreme Court handed down its decision up until fairly recent times. However, beginning in January 1981, some of the Right to Life movement, impatient with the burdens of pursuing a constitutional amendment, began espousing a Human Life Bill as a way of short-circuiting the burdensome constitutional amendment route. These two camps were represented in the Senate by Senators Garn and Hatch pursuing the constitutional amendment route and Senator Helms pursuing the Human Life Bill.

A telling result of this division became dramatically manifest to me when a small group of Senators and House members met at the White House with President Reagan on January 22, 1982. The President told us that it was necessary for the anti-abortion movement "to get its act together." He pointed out that, as we were meeting in the Oval Office, leaders of the movement were assembling in the Cabinet Room "half in favor of one thing and half in favor of another and they are at each others throats." The President was reluctant to choose between two divergent approaches and wanted, if possible, a unified position. Just a few days ago, on September 14, the President repeated his disenchantment with this division of effort when he said, "I've been a little critical about some of the human life groups, because first of all, they are not rallied behind a single measure."

As the year went on, the differences between the Hatch and Helms approaches were not reconciled. Indeed, they could not be because there is an inherent irreconcilability between seeking to amend the Constitution in the manner spelled out in the Constitution itself and in seeking to "amend" it by simple statute which many people, including the General Counsel of the U. S. Catholic Conference, deem to be an unconstitutional effort. I myself am in this latter group.

Yet, some of us thought we should find a way out of this divisive dilemma, and we tried to structure a procedural agreement whereby we could have consecutive votes on the Helms Human Life Bill and the Hatch Constitutional Amendment. In this way, the subject of abortion could be raised as a specific topic; the Helms and Hatch proposals could be debated in specific as to their merits; consecutive votes would put the Senate clearly on record as between the two proposals.

Various Senators urged Senator Eaker, the Majority Leader of the Senate who has the responsibility of scheduling Senate business, to try to work out such a scheduling of consecutive votes on the Helms Bill and the Hatch Constitutional Amendment. Senator Eaker submitted this scheduling plan to his Republican colleagues and reported to Senator Byrd, the Democratic leader, that he had worked out the agreement amongst the Republican Senators, including Senators Helms, Hatch, Packwood, and Weicker. He then asked Senator Byrd to see if agreement to such a course of action could be procedurally agreed to by the Democrats. At Senator Byrd's request, I went to work trying to sell this procedure to my Democratic colleagues. After considerable effort, agreement was reached amongst the Democrats for consecutive votes on the Helms Bill and the Hatch Amendment.

Then on August 6, to the surprise of most everyone, Senator Helms announced that he no longer was going to push his Human Life Bill, but was going to espouse some other undefined bill, the content of which he was not then ready to divulge.

The agreement that had been painstakingly worked out fell apart with confusion on both substance and procedure resulting.

Senator Helms did finally unveil his new bill which, in addition to dealing with abortion, also sought to deprive the Supreme Court from dealing with the First Amendment Freedom of Religion Clause as it would apply to prayer in schools.

This brings me to the second problem -- the commingling of the abortion issue with some of the other so-called "social" issues.

Senator Helms has a vast social agenda. He fervently believes in a whole host of statutorily imposed and, in my judgment, constitutionally flawed restrictions on the functioning of the Supreme Court. He sends out thousands of fund-raising letters from his vast North Carolina direct mail fund-raising operation, often raising the volatile "social" issues: abortion, school prayer, busing, gay rights.

He likes to intermingle these issues.

For example, this summer he crafted this amendment to an appropriations bill:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, none of the funds appropriated hereunder shall be obligated or expended for the administration, management, or funding of any program which provides monies, by grant, loan, or contract, to (1) any individual or organization which works with or is affiliated with any instrumentality of the Communist party, (2) any activity which promotes homosexuality as an acceptable life style including but not limited to nude theater, 'gay theater,' or materials advocating violation of state laws, or (3) any organization or activity which regularly promotes teenage promiscuity or promotes or refers for abortion."

I submit that the issue of abortion is of sufficient significance unto itself as to merit singular and reflective attention. The commingling of the "social" issues may suit Senator Helms' broad social agenda and his fundraising purposes, but as the recent Senate inaction on the combined Helms school prayer and abortion package sadly indicates, it does not well serve the purpose of having the issue of abortion meaningfully addressed.

I believe that if the same scheme of action takes place in the next Congress, we will have the same dismal result. Senator Helms will not, in my opinion, be able to muster the requisite sixty votes to terminate Senate debate on his Human Life Bill, either the original version thereof or his hastily revised version. He will be able to flail and fulminate, but he will not prevail.

Therefore, I wish to propose a course of action which I think is sound, is constitutional, and which has a chance of ultimate success.

I propose as follows:

- (1) That the various Right to Life organizations that are <u>singularly</u> interested in the abortion question (and not including groups that are interested in the abortion question along with a whole host of other issues) meet together to discuss a unified course of action.
- (2) That such a caucus consider a brief, directly worded Constitutional Amendment, perhaps, reading as follows:

"Nothing in this Constitution guarantees a right to an abortion."

It is my belief, based on numerous conversations with my Senate colleagues, that such a Constitutional Amendment would muster the greatest number of votes in the Senate. Such an amendment, if ratified, would return the law to where it was before 1973 when Roe v. Wade was handed down.

I believe there are some Senators who are not willing to support a Garn or Hatch Amendment or a Helms Bill, but who would support an amendment which in essence wipes Roe v. Wade off the law books and restores the law to what it was before -- that abortion is a matter for each of the states to decide.

There is ample historical and legal precedent for this. Four of our Constitutional Amendments were specifically crafted to reverse Supreme Court decisions.

The Eleventh Amendment to the Constitution, prohibiting the federal judicial power from being exercised in suits by citizens of a state against another state, came in response to an action of the Supreme Court in accepting jurisdiction over such a case.

The Fourteenth Amendment was proposed to the Constitution in response to the inflamous decision of the Supreme Court in the <u>Direct Scott</u> case finding that black individuals were non-citizens under the Constitution and, as such, not fully entitled to the protections of the Constitution.

The Sixteenth Amendment, permitting the imposition of a federal income tax, was later enacted in response to a Supreme Court decision finding that an unapportioned (by state) tax was in violation of Article I of the Constitution.

Finally, the Twenty-Sixth Amendment, according 18-year olds the right to vote in federal and state elections, was proposed following the Court's decision that the Congress lacked the authority to impose such an obligation statutorily upon the states.

Admittedly, this is not a perfect or ideal solution. But just as the Hatch Amendment was not perfect, nonetheless it was introduced and advanced because it might muster more support than the Garn and Buckley Amendments of earlier years.

- (3) That if the Right to Life organizations can agree on this concept, that it be taken to key members of the Senate Judiciary Committee which has jurisdiction over proposed Constitutional Amendments. Naturally, this would include Senator Hatch, Committee Chairman Strom Thurmond, and, I would suggest, Senator Howell Heflin, a Democrat, a former Chief Justice of Alabama, a distinguished legal scholar, and a states rights advocate.
- (4) That if Senators Hatch, Thurmond, and Heflin agree to sponsor such an amendment, Senator Baker be informed so that the Senate can proceed to its consideration in 1983 and not wait until the closing days of the Congress in 1984 when Senate action would be so late as to not give the House of Representatives time to act.
- (5) That a similar procedure be instituted with key members of the House Judiciary Committee with consideration also given, at a proper time, to a. House Discharge Petition to get an identically worded Constitutional Amendment to the House floor.

In conclusion, let me say that as I have watched the events of the past two years unfold, I have given this matter a great deal of thought. I am convinced that the course I propose is the most efficacious, and most responsible route to pursue. I am similarly convinced that, if in 1984 we rerun the 1982 scneme, we will end up with the same confused, divided, and dismal results.

Dear Mr. Blackwell:

A few days ago I received your undated letter regarding a meeting with representatives of the Clergy and Laity Concerned which I and many other religious leaders had requested of the President. We are sorry that the President is unable to schedule a meeting, but I understand the reasons and appreciate the fact that you have forwarded our request to Secretary Haig at the State Department.

The reason for my letter is to share with you a concern I have had for the last few months. Due to the nature of the office for which I am responsible (flier enclosed), I was often invited by the Ford and Carter Administrations to attend briefings of international nature, either at the White House or the State Department. These briefings would offer us the point of view of the Administration which I and the staff of my office would then share with American missioners and foreign dignitaries visiting the office. We might or might not have agreed on the Administration's point of view, but at least, we knew what was that point of view.

Since this Administration has taken over, neither I nor any of my colleagues who used to be called for the briefings, have been invited to attend any briefings at all. We consider this lack of information from the Administration very serious. Our office deals directly or indirectly with all Catholic missioners overseas and with many people from other countries, and information is continually being requested of us on the Administration's policies which touch millions of people; regretably, we are not able to give any answer which would represent faithfully the Administration's point of view.

I sincerely hope that you, or whoever is responsible for this aspect of the Administration's operations, will ponder my letter and see that something is done to correct what I consider a very serious breakdown in the relationship between the Administration and many American citizens overseas.




