Dear Wayne:

Our headquarters office in New York called something to my attention recently involving the White House and asked if I could shed any light on it. Since it puzzles me too, I hope you won't mind an informal inquiry directed to you.

For several years now, ITT has underwritten the production and distribution of a daily radio program by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale called "The American Character." The program is based on the idea of making listeners feel better about their country and themselves through exposure to the positive achievements of ordinary people like themselves. It is carried on more than 350 stations in all fifty states. I want to stress that we do this as a public service and there is no product or corporate advertising involved.

Dr. Peale recently discussed with Mrs. Dole the possibility of the President making a brief presentation to one of the "American Character" honorees. Following a phone conversation with her, Dr. Peale sent the attached follow-up letter.

He next heard from Morton Blackwell, of Mrs. Dole's staff, that President Reagan would meet with Dr. Peale and an honoree. He informed Dr. Peale, however, that White House policy precluded the presence of a corporate representative. Dr. Peale had intended to be accompanied

to the presentation by Rand Araskog, ITT's Chairman and Chief Executive, whom you will recall endorsed the President's economic program in our company publication as well as before the shareholders at our annual meeting in May.

In a letter to Mr. Blackwell, Dr. Peale asked that he be allowed to invite Mr. Araskog as his personal guest with the understanding that the "President Reagan will not acknowledge ITT in his remarks." As I understand it, Mr. Blackwell has informed Dr. Peale that even that will not be acceptable.

I can fully understand concerns of the staff that commercial promotions be avoided at White House functions and we fully agree with that policy. I was not aware, however, of such a broad interpretation that would exclude an executive of a company which underwrites, as a public service, a radio program promoting the best of the American character, even with the understanding that our company role would not be acknowledged.

Wayne, I wouldn't bother you on this but I have been asked whether that, indeed, is the current policy. Since it is one with which I am not familiar, I hope you don't mind my inquiry.
