How Chicago draws private support to public schools

On an average day 20 percent of the students at Chicago's largely Hispanic Juarez High School simply fail to show up for class.

But a concerted effort since last fall to cut absenteeism - through daily phone calls in Spanish to parents and the launching of a bilingual school newsletter - has led to a 3-to-5 percent improvement in regular monthly attendance.

Although Juarez administrators approved the plan, it was actually education specialists at Illinois Bell Telephone and a squad of company volunteers. who drafted specifics and the manned the phones.

Bell is one of 73 Chicago companies, social service organizations, and academic institutions that have teamed up with individual schools over the last several months under Chicago School Superintendent Ruth Love's Adopt-a-School' program.

Actually this kind of public-private partnership, so encouraged by Washington these days, has a long tradition in many cities. Adopt-a-School, an idea now practiced in several cities around the country, shoots for improvement in basic reading, writing, and math, and a commitment of at least an hour a week in class for one year.

Three textbook publishers, for instance, have introduced their curriculum materials in an effort to improve students' basic skills. EXAMPLES OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints World Headquarters: Independence, Missouri

The following community services are administered on a national level from offices in Independence, Missouri:

- (1) CHILD PLACEMENT SERVICES: Counseling and adoptive services are provided for unwed mothers throughout the United States.
- (2) SERVICES TO THE BLIND: A twenty-five year service that provides braille reading materials for the blind and large type materials for the visually impaired. Through a network of volunteers across the country public education materials are also made available in braille.
- (3) ECONOMIC AID: Administered from the national office a network of agents in the 1200+ local congregations are authorized to dispense economic aid to needy persons and families in their local communities. An offering is received in every local congregation on the first Sunday of each month to fund this broad based economic aid program.
- (4) HOMES FOR THE ELDERLY: The church provides excellent facilities for the care of the elderly in both Missouri and California. Where government assistance programs or personal resources are not sufficient the economic aid fund mentioned in (3) is available to assist residents of these rest homes.
- (5) ASSISTANCE FOR THE ELDERLY: The church-sponsored hospital in Independence, Missouri provides several programs of assistance for the elderly including a day-care center, home bound services and meals on wheels. This program is funded primarily through a trust from a private donor.

There are a number of community services provided by local jurisdictions. Examples of these are:

- SOCIAL MINISTRIES AND SERVICES: These are local offices for family counseling and stores for economical purchasing of used clothing and household furnishings.
- (2) Several examples of noteworthy projects:
 - (a) Portland, Oregon local congregation has teamed with community to determine the unmet needs of the elderly. A program called "Project Linkage" has arisen to meet these needs.



Should you consider any forums in which such a person might logically participate, I would strongly urge that Dr. Bennett be included. The ripple effect would be positive and widespread.



SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH RELIGIOUS LEADERS ON PRIVATE SECTORS INITIATIVES

- People in America have many problems which have gotten worse in our lifetime. Crime is up. Morality is down. Suicides are up. Personal savings and investments for the future are down. Divorces are up. Quality of personal workmanship is often down. Illegitimacy is up. All of these can be traced to a decline in personal responsibility. These problems have become much worse during the very period when a well-meaning government assumed responsibility for solving most or all of our problems.
- -- As recently as 1935, approximately 50% of the assistance going to the needy in our country came from the churches. Now that number is down to about 1%.
- -- Reverend Don Moomaw, the President's pastor in California, preached an interesting sermon last year here in D. C. He said he had recently read through the Bible and found many places where the Lord urged individuals to take personal action in behalf of the poor and needy. He found many places where the Bible says the church has responsibility for caring for the less fortunate. But nowhere, he said, does the Bible say that it is the government which must take responsibility for solving all our human problems.
- -- Government is not the only answer. It is not even the main answer. Too often government programs are run by bureaucrats who are better at helping themselves than helping the truly needy.
- -- Money is not the only answer. It is not even the main answer. Too often money can create rather than end dependence.
- -- I believe that the main answer is increasing personal involvement in solving the problems of our communities. The greatest resource we have is the people in our local church congregations.
- -- The purpose of this meeting the President has called is to help the church leaders of America share, pool, and increase their wealth of experience in private sector initiatives.
- -- We cannot solve the problems of the world or the problems of our nation until we act on the instructions the Lord has given to guide us in our personal lives.
