Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to you directly because I feel strongly that you should be personally aware of what I regard as a serious lack of understanding on the part of some of your subordinates on a major issue of public concern. A lack of understanding which is causing a serious erosion of trust and confidence in your Administration among American veterans.

On the first of this month, several thousand veterans gathered in a rally in Washington in support of the more than two thousand American servicemen still unaccounted for in Southeast Asia. I, and several other Members of the Congress, had requested that the leaders of the group meet with you, or with one of your assistants involved in the efforts to get the communist regimes in Southeast Asia to account for these missing men. We asked that the meeting be held in the White House to demonstrate to the assembled veterans the serious concern of the Reagan Administration in this issue.

Unfortunately, the White House appointments official in charge totally misunderstood the nature of the rally. The official dispatched Mr. Charles Hagel, Deputy Administrator of Veterans Affairs for the Veterans Administration. Mr. Hagel spoke to the group and made a most able effort to convey to them your interest and concern in this issue.

The problem was that just about everyone attending the rally was fully aware that the Veterans Administration has no direct involvement whatsoever in the MIA/POW issue. There was audible muttering and grumbling among the crowd despite Mr. Hagel's efforts to reassure the veterans present. I believe it was a serious error to dispatch Mr. Hagel to this rally.

However, I feel that the adverse reaction which was produced by this error can be countered, if your Administration would agree to a meeting with the leaders of this rally. One of them, a good friend and fellow Long Islander, Mr. Thomas Kaiser, had previously sought a meeting with you on this matter. I believe it would be in the best interests of your Administration if you, or a high ranking senior White House official involved in the MIA/POW issue would meet with Mr. Kaiser and other representatives of the groups which held the rally earlier this month.

It would go a long way toward reassuring these leaders that the Reagan Administration is reversing the do-nothing attitude of the Carter Administration,

and is actively pursuing avenues to bring to the families of the missing Americans some definite word as to their fate.

Please believe that this intrusion upon your crowded schedule is offered in the hope of adding to the strength of support of your Administration, which I firmly believe is forging a bright, new future for our great Nation. You can be assured of my continued support for your efforts in this regard.

Congressman Lent of New York requests that the President meet with a "Coalition of Veterans working with the National League of Families of the MIA/POWs" (Tab A). I recommend against such a meeting.

As you are aware from the briefing we received, now is a particularly inauspicious time to generate national publicity on this issue. Further, Ann Griffiths, Deputy Director of the League of Families, told me yesterday that she does not believe a meeting with the President would be productive at this point, but that the League's Board of Directors may request time with the President during their annual meeting in late April. Also, there apparently is some strain in the relationship between the League of Families and the Coalition of Veterans, and I believe it better to deal directly with the League and not ancillary groups.

RECOMMENDATION:

That you sign the memorandum at Tab I, which recommends against scheduling the meeting requested by Congressman Lent.

Dear Mr. President:

It is difficult for me to seek to add to the heavy demands on your time as you get your new policies and programs under way. But I feel that the matter I bring to your attention is of sufficient importance to you and to the success of your Administration to make this request necessary.

In the midst of the joyous homecoming for the 52 Americans who had been held hostage in Iran, there seemed to be little thought given to the more than 2,000 American servicemen who have been Missing in Action or Prisoners of War for years in Southeast Asia, with their fate still unknown. They, and their long-suffering families, are, in truth, still being held hostage by the communist government of Vietnam.

A Coalition of Veterans working with the National League of Families of the MIA/POWs would like to meet with you to discuss this deplorable situation and what can be done to correct it. I am acquainted with the Chairman of this grou, Mr. Thomas E. Kaiser, the National Coordinator. He resides on my native Long Island, and I have worked with him for a number of years to resolve this problem. A meeting with the officials of this Coalition, would, I believe be most helpful to you and to your Administration in furthering a better understanding of your policies and plans in this area.

We don't need another Liberal Committee or Congressional Junket to report Hanoi's lies that all the Americans have been returned to the U.S. Won't you be the President to rightfully finish the task with swift rescue of these men? It would go so far toward your goal of our Nation again being a strong and righteous Nation!

Please, with all respect for my U.S.Government, do not depend on Departments of State or such for an answer. Their excuses and "line" have been the same for over 14 years since my son, a USMC Sergeant, was shot down in 1967! He was declared dead by President Carter without proof in 1980! Dear Morton:

A suggestion has been made by several individuals concerning dedication of the 1981 National Christmas Tree to those still missing from the Vietnam War.

In discussing the subject with Kathy Christiansen, she mentioned that several calls had been received requesting that red ribbons honoring those still missing be used in decorating the tree, and suggested that I draft a statement for consideration. The statement follows:

"This time last year, the nation's Christmas tree was dedicated to the Americans being held hostage in Iran. I know I express the sentiments of all in being thankful for their release in January, 1981.

This year, we are dedicating our beautiful living Christmas tree to all American servicemen and civilians whose fate remains unknown as a result of the war in Southeast Asia. Nearly 2,500 Americans are still missing as a result of that tragic conflict.

I pledge to their families and friends and to all citizens of our country that this Administration will devote maximum effort to obtaining the release of any Americans still held captive and assign high priority to achieving the fullest possible accounting for those still missing."

Whether red ribbons are utilized in decorating is another question, particularly since numerous colors are currently in use to honor POW/MIAs. We appreciate your willingness to consider this request.



Hanoi Withholds POW/king Information

Over eight years ago, at the end of formal U.S. military involvement in Southeast Asia, over 1,400 American servicemen and civilians remained officially listed as prisoners of war (POW) or missing in action (MIA), with some 1,200 listed as killed in action, body not recovered. Since that time, due primarily to the determination of the families and a nucleus of concerned citizens and dedicated Congressmen, the Vietnamese have been persuaded to provide information on about 75 of these men. Some 2,500 remain unaccounted for and the communist governments of Indochina have steadfastly denied holding additional American prisoners and have refused to provide information on those whose fate remains unknown.

The families of the missing are not so unrealistic as to believe that all the men are alive or that information is available on each individual, but neither are they so naive as to believe that an accounting can not be made for a substantial number of the missing. Department of Defense statistical data indicates an accounting is possible for more than half of the missing men. In numerous cases, pilots were known to have successfully ejected from their planes and to have landed in populated areas. In other instances, the communists announced the capture of men who were never released.

Vietnam claims to be searching for information on the missing; however, the sincerity of their claim is dubious since recent substantiated intelligence information indicates they are secretly holding, in Hanoi, the remains of over 400 Americans.

Staff Sergeant Donald Sparks was captured by the Vietnamese on June 17, 1969, and was officially listed by the U.S. Army as "missing in action." That classification was later changed to "prisoner of war" when a letter from Sgt. Sparks was found on the body of a Vietnamese soldier. The letter, dated April, 1970, was addressed to his family and assured them that although he had not seen another American in his ten months of captivity, he was in good health.

The influx of Indochinese refugees into this country over the past few years has brought convincing new evidence that the Vietnamese and Lao continue to hold Americans in captivity. The Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) is currently investigating over 325 first hand reports pertaining to men still held captive; some sightings are as recent as last year.

As a result, U.S. government policies and attitudes are changing. Where for many years official statements claimed a lack of credible evidence that men were still alive, new government policy reflects the increasing reports indicating some Americans are still in captivity. According to the Director of DIA, all of the intelligence collection disciplines are now being brought to bear on locating POWs. Reconnaissance photography reportedly shows POWs held in various locations throughout Indochina.

One sighting report received by the League of Families includes information that in 1978, some 30 American POWs were held in three closely separated camps in Thanh Hoa, Vietnam. The source stated, "The POWs I saw were very thin and were covered with scabies. They were just skin and bones. The Americans were forced to carry wood from the forests and they often fell down. Sometimes they were beaten by the guards."

Another refugee provided detailed physical descriptions of five men whom he was told were American pilots. These men were held in a cave near Vienxay, Laos. The source of the report was kept tied up near the cave for over a month, in 1976, and was able to observe the captive servicemen.

Through all the Presidents - Johnson through Carter - there has not been an <u>Executive Policy</u> from the "top" to ensure that every effort be used to rescue and account for Americans left behind (and still living) at the end of the Vietnam War. It cannot be stressed enough that live sightings and intelligence data show these men alive but dying from the years of inhumane treatment. We don't need another Liberal Committee or Congressional Junket to report Hanoi's lies that all the Americans have been returned to the U.S. Won't you be the President to rightfully finish the task with swift rescue of these men? It would go so far toward your goal of our Nation again being a <u>strong and righteous Nation!</u>

Please, with all respect for my U.S.Government, do not depend on Departments of State or such for an answer. Their excuses and "line" have been the same for over 14 years since my son, a USMC Sergeant, was shot down in 1967! He was declared dead by President Carter without proof in 1980! At the National League of Families Meeting, I heard the same meaningless phrases from the State Dept. as I did on my first Washington trip in 1969!

With all my heart, I request on behalf of my fellow mothers, fathers, wives and children, that you make this a <u>PRIORITY TASK to</u> bring these so-long forgotten Americans home. For further update, will you kindly meet with the Executive Director or Board of Directors of the National League of Families (in Washington D.C.) at your earliest convenience.

On behalf of the National League of Families, I would like to request that you meet with the leadership of our organization at your earliest possible convenience. I am sure you are aware that the POW/MIA situation is attracting rapidly increasing government and press attention.

Your long-standing interest in the POW/MIA problem is well known to the families as is your commitment to resolve the uncertainty as to whether there are, in fact, Americans still held captive in Indochina.

The League's board of directors will be in session April 24 - 26th here in Washington. It is our hope that you will agree to meet with us on Friday, April 24th. If that date is unsatisfactory, arrangements can be made to either bring the board in early or delay their departure. Alternative dates include, in order of preference, Thursday, April 23rd, Wednesday, April 22nd, or Monday, April 27th.

It has been customary for Presidents of the United States to meet with representatives of the League. The present state of U.S. government priority and your personal interest should be directly conveyed to those who represent our missing servicemen and their families.

I will look forward to hearing from your staff concerning this request.
