National VFW chief is against consolidating 52 VA centers

"The 16 pct budget increase for national defense proposed by the Reagan Administration elates the Veterans of Foreign Wars, National Commander Arthur Fellwock, of Evansville, Ind., said Monday, April 6, in a press conference.

He noted the U.S. defense establishment had been "pushed around" during recent years of drifting and

indifference.

Fellwock appeared at the Dept. of Nebraska VFW headquarters, 2431 No. 48th st., in Lincoln and launched a four-day visit to 22 posts in all sections of the state, accompanied by Dept. Commander Bob Gall, of Plattsmouth, and Dept. Quartermaster-Adjutant Bob Bethel, of Lincoln.

Of U.S. policy in El Salvador, Fellwock said "We must draw the line somewhere and the National VFW firmly supports the administration." He discounted any comparison to Vietnam.

'Surge' in needs

Fellwock said the VFW is opposed to any cutbacks proposed by the Office of Management and Budget that would affect "quality of care" in the Veterans Ad-

ministration hospitals.
"The surge of World War H veterans, whose average age now exceeds 60 years, and who need and are entitled to medical services, will be unprecedented. It's no time to cutback," he said.

Fellwock said the VA reduced bed capacity by five thousand and reduced hospital personnel by seven thousand in "Carter's underfunded 1981 budget.'

"The diminishing concern for veterans caused the National VPW to organize a political action committee in 1979. Last year, the first time in our 80-year history, the VFW's PAC endorsed candidates.

"In fact," he said, "we endorsed Reagan for president before he was nominated. Of the endorsements we made for president, the Senate and House 89 pct were elected. We intend to intensify our political action

activities."

Fellwock declared the Nebraska VFW posts are doing a "good job" in the membership area and "that's one reason I'm here - to acknowledge their good work." 50.000 new members

"Nationally, so far this year we have 50 thousand new members, primarily from the Vietnam veterans ranks," the Indianan said. In part, he said, this is attri-buted to a "resurgence in Americanism."

In office since October, Fellwock said the allvolunteer military concept "isn't working" and a se-lective service system is "a must." He said improved in-ducements to enlistees is helping but will fall short of sufficient quality and quantity of personnel.

Fellwock said the National VFW wants the 52 regional VA offices maintained even though there is a move to consolidate. Additionally, he said the VFW is opposed to closures of the outreach centers opened during the past several years in most urban centers.

The national VFW chief said there are rumors the regional consolidation could mean three principal centers. "I've heard mentioned Los Angeles, Chicago and an East coast point - possibly Philadelphia."
Until reaching Nebraska,

he said, he hadn't heard

Lincoln mentioned.

"In any event, our position is for maintaining the 52.

"The VA 'game plan' is a reduction of 1,600 employees in the VA's Dept. of Veterans Benefits in 1982 and a reduction of five thousand in the VA Dept. of Medicine and Surgery in 1982," be said.

"Those figures are unconfirmed and wholly unaccept-

able," he declared.

"The VFW is willing to help President Reagan establish a sound financial govern-ment," he said, "but not, so help me, at the further expense of our nation's veterans."

MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

Thank you for the privilege of appearing before this Committee to present the views of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States regarding the nomination of Harry N. Walters as the Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

My name is Cooper T. Holt and it is my privilege to serve the more than 1.9 million men and women of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States as

Executive Director of our Washington Office.

First, Mr. Chairman, permit me to thank you for holding this confirmation hearing so expeditiously. It is imperative that the Administrator-designee be confirmed at the earliest possible date so that he may take a leadership role in the final evolution of the Fiscal Year 1984 VA budget.

As the record reflects, Mr. Chairman, Mr. Walters, who is presently the

Assistant Secretary of the Army for Manpower and Reserve Affairs, was born July 4,

1936 in Fostoria, Ohio. He is a 1959 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at

West Point, New York where he won honors as an All-American fullback on the Army

team. Mr. Walters was commissioned in the infantry and attended the Airborne and Ranger School at Fort Benning, Georgia following which he served with the 25th Infantry Division and was separated from active duty in 1963.

In civilian life he held a number of positions including the Executive Vice

Presidency of the Standard Paper Manufacturing Company in Richmond, Virginia. He was
also associated with the Kimberly Clark Company in Wisconsin and New York City and
the Pure Oil Company in Miami, Florida. In 1977 Mr. Walters purchased and became

President and Chief Executive of the Potsdam Paper Company in Potsdam, New York. His
executive ability is reflected in the fact that this particular paper mill had been
idle in an area of large unemployment and by reactivating the mill, he brought
employment and prosperity to hundreds of employees.

Mr. Walters makes his home in McLean, Virginia with his wife and two children.

Mr. Chairman, I have met personally with Mr. Walters as have the Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States James R. Currieo and all of the Directors in our VFW Washington Office.

Mr. Walters projects strength and ability and impresses us as one who will not permit anyone to usurp his authority or prerogatives as Administrator of Veterans Affairs. We are always optimistic that the Administrator will be the true veterans' advocate within the Administration and this is what we expect of Mr. Walters. The VFW hopes he would make his first priority as VA Administrator a sincere attempt to carry out President Reagan's commitment to veterans made at the 80th VFW National Convention, i.e., hospital and medical care with adequate funding, compensation kept abreast of inflation, an increase for Vietnam veterans going to school under the GI Bill, keeping the VA hospital system separate from any national health plan, and national cemeteries located near relatives.

The priorities of the VFW with respect to veterans' benefits are to maintain the integrity of the VA hospital and medical care system for the treatment of all veterans in need of health care; to maintain the integrity of the compensation

program for the 2.2 million veterans in receipt of benefits thereunder and the Dependency and Indemnity Compensation program (DIC) for the 1.3 million survivors of veterans killed on active duty or permanently and totally disabled at the time of death; and to maintain the integrity of the pension program for the more than 800,000 veterans in need due to their nonservice-connected disabilities and their more than 900,000 survivors. We believe we have made our priorities clear to Mr. Walters.

While speaking of the position of the Administrator, Mr. Chairman, the VFW has long held that the incumbent should be elevated to Cabinet Level to provide him both the authority and stature commensurate with the vast responsibilities of directing the third-largest agency of the Federal Government. As a matter of fact, our last National Convention passed Resolution No. 613, entitled "Create Cabinet Status for Administrator of Veterans Administration," a copy of which is appended to my testimony. Accordingly the VFW recommends the introduction and passage of legislation to accomplish this.

Given the foregoing, Mr. Chairman, the Veterans of Foreign Wars endorses the nomination of Harry N. Walters to be the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. We wish Mr. Walters well and look forward to a working relationship beneficial to the veterans of all wars who have rendered a very special service to this great Nation of ours.

SUBJECT: CABINET STATUS FOR VA ADMINISTRATOR

FROM: COOPER T. HOLT, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, VFW WASHINGTON OFFICE

STATEMENT:

The VFW fully supports and will seek the introduction and passage of legislation during the 98th Congress to create a Department of Veterans Affairs and to change the title of Administrator to Secretary.

When the VA's programs and their economic impact on national affairs are considered as a whole, one cannot but conclude that this agency should enjoy full and acknowledged Cabinet status.

RATIONALE:

The Veterans' Administration is the fifth largest budget entity and employs the second largest number of personnel in the Federal Government. It is noteworthy that the VA is larger than five current Cabinet departments combined.

The VA's constituency represents a more diverse cross-section of the country's population than any other department or agency. That constituency consists of 30 million veterans, and, including their dependents, directly impacts on an estimated one-half the nation's population.

The VA administers a number of programs that contribute directly to the national economy. First, it administers the nation's largest income maintenance program through the veterans compensation and pension benefit systems; second, has the largest direct loan and loan guarantee programs in the Federal Government, a good barometer of the entire housing industry; and, third, the VA administers the largest direct insurance program in the country through its various insurance programs for disabled and other veterans.

The VA also operates the largest independent hospital system in the United States. As a result, the VA hospital and medical care system exerts a direct impact on the cost of health care in the nation. Further, the system has been in the forefront of medical care and research, having produced a number of Nobel laureates in this field. It is also the primary medical backup system to the Department of Defense.

Finally, the VA administers a GI Bill education program interacting with virtually every post-secondary educational and vocational institution in the nation, resulting in a stronger national economic base.

Dear Friends:

I am delighted to extend greetings and best wishes as you meet for the 82nd National Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

You are to be congratulated for your individual contribution for the success of your organization's unselfish and essential programs of service to our nation during the past 82 years. The support you have shown to America's veterans and their families over the years is a cherished monument for all to behold.

I am certain that your convention will not only be enjoyable and productive, but will renew the beginning of another year of vital, valued service to our war veterans and their families by the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Dear Mrs. Dole:

Thank you for including me as a representative from the Veterans of Foreign Wars at your meeting last Saturday. I believe it was a worthwhile get together and I am hopeful we can have more such gatherings.

In case you are unaware, Elizabeth, I would like for you to know that our organization broke an 80-year tradition a year and a half ago when we organized a Political Action Committee. Incidentally, our very first endorsement made last July was to support the candidacy of Governor Reagan as President of the United States. I know the endorsement was of tremendous assistance to him—I know this because he told me so while attending our National Convention held last August in Chicago. He also told me if he was elected that our organization would be consulted regarding the appointment of the Administrator of the Veterans Administrations. He has not kept his promise.

We definitely feel President Reagan should know why we are so strongly supporting former Congressman Bill Ayres for this high position. In your capacity as Assistant to the President for Public Affairs, I am most hopeful you will make certain his promise is honored.

In addition, Elizabeth, for 32 years our organization has sponsored what we call an Annual Washington Conference for our top national and state officials. This Conference culminates with a Banquet honoring Members of Congress. AGENT ORANGE REPORT SHOCKS VFW

WASHINGTON, D.C.--"The General Accounting Office report of the Veterans Administration's handling of complaints by
Agent Orange victims should shock every veteran," said James
R. Currieo, National Commander-in-Chief of the VFW.

The report by the investigative arm of the Congress pointed out inadequate physical examinations, a central register which did not contain addresses of those examined, little or no attempt to reach those who might have been exposed to herbicides and only one of 14 VA hospitals surveyed had a follow-up program for veterans with diseases which might have been caused by Agent Orange.

"This proves complaints made by Vietnam veterans and the VFW concerning the VA's Agent Orange program," said Currieo.

"The VA has had years to establish a good outreach plan and a study of the effects of exposure to many types of chemicals. It is time for the new Administrator to take charge and win the confidence of Vietnam veterans in an agency they look to for assistance," said Currieo.

VFW REQUESTS QUICK ACTION ON AGENT ORANGE STUDY

WASHINGTON, D.C.--"The VFW is pleased that the Veterans

Administration has designated the Centers for Disease Control to

undertake the Congressionally mandated Agent Orange study. The

procedure for getting the study started has taken too long; therefore, we are requesting quick action by the CDC in determining what
herbicidal exposure does to veterans," said James R. Currieo.

The VFW National Commander-in-Chief pointed out that several years ago the VFW suggested this study be conducted by someone, other than the VA, who could assure a credible scientific work which would be accepted by Vietnam veterans.

"The VFW also has recommended that veterans with diseases probably caused by exposure to the defoliants used in Vietnam receive compensation now and the burden of proof be shifted from the veteran to the government when disallowing service connection for the diseases," said Currieo.

"It is vital that the CDC undertake its study at once to determine the effects of these poisons on the human body. The VFW calls for rapid, but professional, action," he said.

VFW REQUESTS LAW TO COMPENSATE
VIETNAM AGENT ORANGE VICTIMS

(Editors note: The following is a statement by VFW Commander-in-Chief James R. Currieo, Sierra Vista, Arizona, leader of the 2.5 million VFW and Auxiliary, at a joint press conference with Representative Tom Daschle, D-S.D.)

WASHINGTON, D.C.--"The VFW is requesting that legislation be introduced in the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives to authorize Vietnam veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and other herbicides to receive compensation for service connected diseases and disabilities.

"These infirmities must bear a causal relationship
to such exposure as determined by Veterans Administration medical personnel and should be incurred by veterans who served in
Vietnam in areas where herbicides were used.

"Such service in these areas should be presumptive

of disability and proof of the lack of exposure and disability

should be on the government.

"The VFW requests this legislation because Vietnam veterans have suffered enough at the hands of their government which sent them to fight, used potential disabling herbicides and has done little to assist them in treating probable disabilities and determining the effects of exposure to herbicides.

"It is clear that the VA was derelict in the early phases of its study of Agent Orange and similar herbicides. The VFW urged at the start of the research that an all-inclusive study be conducted by an independent agency. Delays and procrastination have been normal practices. Recently, the National Academy of Sciences cited design flaws in the plan to question veterans who were in Vietnam and might be studied to ascertain the effects of exposure.

"It is clear that veterans must receive compensation at this time while the study continues. Veterans cannot wait another ten years to be told that they are disabled from Agent Orange and other poisons.

"The VFW recommends that after authorization, money in addition to regular funds for compensation be appropriated to cover payments for herbicide disabilities. If a man was disabled by his government, he should be cared for by that government, it's as simple as that."

September 1982 NEWSLETTER Deliberately Delayed

JUST IN CASE any of you might have missed the report on the delegation that just returned from Vietnam and Laos, we thought it would be better to delay our letter for about 10 days and give you an up-date on what transpired. Just prior to their return on the 29th, there were pictures beamed via satellite showing them examining a crash site of a C-130...stepping gingerly over rusted debris from the plane. Two minute shards of skeletal remains were recovered and given to the U.S. representative with them for delivery to the Lab in Hawaii. This crash site was in Laos AND was one they had asked to see. They were also going to be taken to the caves up north but the weather turned bad so they continued with the original plan to go to Hanoi. Their trip there was to last the week, but seemed to be under a news blackout. Ron Miller of ABC was with them but, we gather, was unable to send back anything. We sure look forward to a report from him soon. (Some small facts you may not know: they were not allowed to take along their own interpretor; and Anne Keegan of the Chicago Tribune was allowed in Laos, but not Vietnam) Before returning they were taken to the caves in Sam Neua Province, Laos. Perhaps you saw the film of them slogging through the rough terrain, slithering into the caves and searching. This was not their worst physical problem. They were also the victims of bat and insect attacks. And their physical torment undoubtedly was no where near what they suffered emotionally! These were all family members on the Board of Directors of the National League of POW-MIA Families. On Sept. 30th members of the group appeared on the TODAY SHOW and CBS MORNING NEWS and in the afternoon testified before the HOUSE COMMITTEE ON ASIAN

AND PACIFIC AFFAIRS. The League will be reporting to its members and guests and I don't want to take any of their thunder, but I don't think it unfair to tell you...their reaction seems <u>UP!</u> The Vietnamese promised to meet with the American representatives four times a year...a promise we hope they will keep...and make meaningful!! They felt the Laotians were more inclined to cooperate and that is great with us. We have had a request for a meeting with the Lao government in their hands for some time. More on that later

SINCERE THANKS

SOME DEBTS of gratitude have to be paid before I can go on and talk about plans for our BIG DAY, on Sunday, October 24th!

I must begin with the Air Force Sergeants Association's International Convention in Phoenix in August. The tremendous support we received from them last year was even more gigantic this year. We arrived there with a little over 3,600 members & hoped to get to 4,000 before I left. I was pretty discouraged the day before I left as I only had 57 new members - BUT - at the Auxiliary business meeting the last morning, Victor "Bart" Bartholomew, the AFSA Kansas President stood in the room as I spoke and bemoaned my disappointment. In less than 2 minutes I found out why things were so slow for me. He presented me with a stack of 192 new applications and \$425 from AFSA and the Auxiliary began showering applications and money over my shoulder at a rate too fast to count. Another group from Michigan had the white labels on their red ribbons laminated and stitched on.

MM's Chapter 1201 had 4000 bumper stickers with the POW logo and AFSA logo on each side that read: "HAVE THEY ALL REALLY BEEN ACCOUNTED FOR?" ASK YOUR CONGRESSMAN!" Kansas gave away a free chance on Budweiser scarf & hat set or beer mug...to anyone showing them a membership card from us!! There were RED RIBBONS all around and on nearly everyone not in uniform. But, the last night at dinner, someone started collecting \$1 fine from anyone not wearing a ribbon...she kept it up the next morning at breakfast, and I heard laughing complaints of being fined twice...but they paid! When I left I had 357 new members and \$1056...PIUS active help from Chapters in Alaska, Hawaii, as well as Germany and Italy. I know what its like on cloud nine! Also as a result, we have a Mid-West Coordinator in the person of Bart Bartholomew, and 2 state Coordinators: Mary Montgomery in Texas, and Charles Mank in Illinois. To everyone from AFSA, staff included, we send our heartfelt thanks.

More thanks go to; Co-State Coordinators for Connecticut...Angela Fabrizio and Debbie Franzione (who incidentally did a fabulous job on the Parade and program in Bristol, September 26.) For that too, our thanks. Minnesota has a State Coordinator thank you Patty Skelly, she will be remembered up there and in Washington, D.C. as one very knowledgeable lady on this subject. They'll be your local representatives to set-up statewide programs and answer your questions, but you will conintue to get the NEWSLETTERS from us here. We STILL need state coordinators.....so PLEASE CONSIDER HELPING US.....we'll help you, too! There are still more people to whom we must show our gratitude: To Cox Lumber Company of St. Petersburg for allowing us to use their parking lot for our garage sale; to an annonymous company in New Jersey whose employees cared enough to copy our application and individually send in 28 members. AND, our special thanks to the MARINE CORPS LEAGUE. Morris F. Dixon, Jr. Detachment, who sent \$1 for each of their \$113 members, plus a donation; and to the Young Marines of the same detachment, whose membership of 41 each signed up. (It would be the greatest thing any organized group could do....ask EACH ONE of their members to join us. The one dollar wouldn't strain a single person....BUT, the accumulated money and the added member would be an invaluable asset to us in membership clout and working capital.) To all the above mentioned, again....WE SEND OUR THANKS.

NEW RECORD!! We really set a record this time. In August we had 3,634 members. By the time our charter was 1 year old on September 28th, we had gained 998 more members....and today, less than 2 months later our total is 4,749...TMAGINE!! A growth of 1,115 members since August 13th. You have all been terrific....but if you thought I would allow you to rest on your laurels....THINK AGAIN. It's just so EASY for each one to bring in one...just one by Veteran's Day, November 11th and we'd have 9,498.........AND......then if each one sent one in by the New Year, we'd have 18,996 (no 19,000 cause I'd get the other 4) Imagine, the Board could go to the special 10th Anniversary Candlelight Ceremony at the White House on January 27th representing 19,000 members! Again, WOW! Please try! This special mid-winter meeting is sponsored by the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia.

While we're on this subject, I would like to invite anyone in the area OR able to attend to think about joining us there those 2 days. Let me know and we'll get the candles.....Boy! I'd love to see 1600 Pennsylvania Ave at 8 p.m. looking like noon! Rooms will probably be between \$40-\$50 per day to accommodate 2 to 4 persons. There will be more information of this in our November letter after I hear from the League...but for the sake of a good showing for our Missing Hostages... I wanted to tell you now so you can consider a two day trip to D.C. as a Christmas present or winter honeymoon as well as a VISIBLE SHOW OF SUPPORT FOR OUR MEN!

GOVERNOR JAMES A. RHODES OF OHIO issued a Proclamation and dedicated October 24 to the POW-MIAs and their families to draw attention to their special plight. If others of you are holding Proclamations, please send us a copy so we can properly thank the governors. Also if there are any from your cities. We have several here, but plan to list them for thanks in our November NEWSLETTER. . . . We have received another supply of RED BANNERS, (6' long x 4" wide - with a grommet. . . to fly under our country's flag until this situation is resolved).....all we ask is the request be written on the official stationery of your town. (Thanks for Proclamation to Viet Nam Veterans Memorial Post 4796, Willowick, OH, of the VFW)



Dear Morton:

I deeply regret having to write this letter but as you well know, I have tried unsuccessfully since last August to obtain pictures taken by the White House photographers during the President's visit to our National Convention in New Orleans. Following repeated attempts during the past four months, I have come to the conclusion it is almost an impossibility to obtain these pictures.

As I have indicated on several occasions to both you and Harry Walters, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, I was told by the Presidential advancemen that these pictures would be available to me immediately after the National Convention. I have had the privilege of working with advancemen for many years and have found most of them to be very trustworthy and sincere when making commitments of this type. However, the advance people for the President's visit to New Orleans were not very understanding with any request I made in behalf of our organization. Pictures are only a part of the story.

Our own photographers were barred from taking pictures during the President's visit and, again, I was assured by the advance people that pictures would be made available to our organization. If there is anything at all your office can do to obtain the pictures taken at that time, it would certainly be appreciated. I am especially interested in the photos taken of our national officers and Ladies Auxiliary leaders. These pictures were taken immediately after the President's speech and would probably be listed under what the advance people call "photo opportunities." Anyway, these particular pictures are, of course, sought by the individuals who had their pictures taken with the President. I can assure you, and if for no other reason than the political aspect, it would be a good idea for someone to look these photos up and get them to me as soon as possible.

Also, during the President's visit to New Orleans you will recall he signed the Veterans Job Training Bill and I have been trying to obtain two of the Presidential pens since that time. Again I have been unable to get any cooperation from White House personnel. Any assistance you can offer me in this endeavor will also be appreciated.
