PUBLIC TELEVISION LOOKS AT THE VIETNAM VETS
EXPERIENCES THROUGH SPECIAL PROGRAMS ON VETERANS DAY

WASHINGTON, D.C., September 28, 1981--Veterans Day,
November 11, will be commemorated on public television with
special programs on the experiences of the Vietnam War veteran.\*
National radio personality Larry King will host two hours of
documentaries and special reports about the veterans who came
home to a less than enthusiastic nation.

"The Vietnam Veteran: A Matter of Life and Death Special,"
will be distributed nationally by the Public Broadcasting Service
(PBS) at 9:00 p.m. (ET) on November 11.\* This special program
combines two documentaries "Frank: A Portrait of a Vietnam
Veteran" and "Warrior's Women" along with special reports on
the black veteran and veterans who have found themselves in
prison with "post traumatic stress disorders."

"Frank: A Portrait of a Vietnam Veteran," the first documentary presented during the evening, looks at the problems of the returning vet through the eyes of one, who today is a social worker living in Boston. Frank is a twice-wounded, often-decorated U.S. Navy river patrolman. Upon his return from Vietnam Frank found himself unable to reconnect with society. In a compelling and emotionally-charged recollection, Frank tells the story of the night he arrived back in the States and -more-

his subsequent bouts with alcohol, drugs, a divorce, recurrent nightmares and occasional violent impulses.

The second documentary in the two-hour special is "Warrior's Women," a story of the women Vietnam veterans came home to. Four women speak candidly about the problems they faced and how their lives were affected. They also raise questions about society's neglect of the Vietnam veterans and the effect this will have on the next generation.

Black Americans made up a disproportionate share of foot soldiers in the Vietnam War. The next segment explores the impact of the returning Vietnam vet on the black community.

Another segment looks at the large number of vets who have ended up in prison.

"The Vietnam Veteran: A Matter of Life and Death Special," is a presentation of WGBH Boston and is funded through a grant by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) and public television stations.

Dear Mr. Grossman:

I am writing in regard to PBS's plan to broadcast a special two hour Veterans Day program and to advise you that television stations around the country have been contacting American Legion officials to promote the program as well as handle phone calls from those who see it.

We have reviewed one segment of that program package, "Frank: A Vietnam Veteran", and find it to be a potentially damaging portrayal of Vietnam veterans. If the other segments are consistent with this one in content and tone, then your presentation will have been a disservice to the millions of young veterans who have made successful adjustments. Although we would never question your right to broadcast a program of this type, we do question the wisdom of once again portraying Vietnam veterans as a group of social and moral deviants.

Broadcasting "Frank" will likely reinforce certain prejudices which, over the last decade, have created employment and other obstacles for this youngest generation of veterans. It will also be perceived by many as justification to challenge the concept of service to the nation. I, therefore, am advising all Legion officials in the various states that the program is an unbalanced presentation and that their decisions to participate as phone volunteers must be made with the understanding that some of the callers may require professional counselling.

Mr. Grossman, I regret that your Service has decided to focus a major portion of the November 11 program on an individual whose interview lacks credibility because of contradictory remarks contained therein. But I regret even more that an opportunity will have been missed to treat the vast majority of Vietnam veterans with the respect they deserve.

Dear Bill,

As we discussed today, I am enclosing a cassette of FRANK: A VIETNAM VETERAN (which contains 6 minute followup program), a copy of my original memo which sets out the design and rationale of the followup program and phone in, and an in house memo from WGBH which details the response to the followup when FRANK aired locally on May 25.

The local response makes obvious the need for similar followups across the country when FRANK airs nationally on PBS on November 11 in nearly 200 cities.

I am grateful for your offer to assist us in making this happen. I only hope that the VA and other organizations and individuals will recognize the need.

I will be available to come to D.C. at the earliest date you feel is appropriate. As you pointed out, November is fast approaching and the organizational and financial problems to be solved are enormous.

At this time the specific kinds of support we are in need of are:

- 1) Phone banks to take incoming calls in each city in which the program will be aired.
- Qualified Vietnam veterans and wives and familiy members of veterans to field the telephone calls. (organized through VA outreach centers?)
- 3) Professionals (psychiatrists, social workers, counselors,) to act as backups for the veterans answering the phones. The professionals would take the calls if crisis intervention is needed or if the caller desires to speak to a professional or a non-veteran.

4) The funding necessary to organize and execute a plan of this scope. (WGBH is actively seeking funding but all requests are still pending, and the amount needed will likely be in excess of what they can raise.)

As we discussed, I will call you on June 25 or 26.

Again, thanks for your concern and your help: I'm glad you're there.

Frank runs 51:51 exclusive of opening WGBH logo and funder credits, leaving approximately 6:30 for the followup.

# PREMISE

Virtually all Vietnam veterans who have seen FRANK have voiced one common concern - that there are countless vets who have repressed for years the kinds of things that Frank talks about, and that seeing FRANK may be a catalyst which forces those things to the surface, along with serious anxiety. They have said, and we concur, that in broadcasting a program so potentially explosive for the vet who is watching, we are obligated to use the available followup time to encourage him to seek the help he needs and advise him where to find it.

(There are approximately 250,000 Vietnam era veterans in Massachusetts and 150,000 in greater Boston. Approximately 30% of these served in Vietnam.)

A further point - a followup directed at the veteran would also demonstrate to non-veteran viewers two important realities - that the kinds of problems Frank talks about are shared by other vets and that the Vietnam veteran's adjustment difficulties are not necessarily over.

# THE PROGRAM

Those veterans who will be most disturbed by FRANK are likely to be those who have not yet come to terms with Vietnam, and consequently who probably have the most difficulty talking about it. It is these vets, along with their wives, families, and friends, that the followup should be designed to reach.

Both the tone and format of the followup should be non-patronizing, low key, reassuring, informal, honest, personal, and direct. It It should both segue smoothly from FRANK, and provide a similar kind of identification for the viewer.

The "host" should be a Vietnam combat veteran rather than a television personality, psychiatrist, or other expert who may be viewed as another alien authority figure by the veteran.

The host should be able to make contact with the viewing veterans by his ability to show himself to be one of them. He should

be able to speak openly about his own readjustment problems, his own reactions upon seeing FRANK, his own difficulties in beginning to talk about Vietnam, his own reluctance to seek help, and the ultimate benefits of having become able to do so.

By virtue of both who he is and what he says, the host should be able to give the viewer license to admit and express his own feelings.

The host would list and describe the programs available to Vietnam veterans. The names, addresses, and phone numbers of those programs would appear on screen. (See enclosed list)

The host would explain that phone lines have been set up to receive calls from veterans for the rest of the evening; that the phones are being manned by other Vietnam vets but that psychiatrists and counselors are available should viewers want to talk to them; that the calls will be handled off air; that anyone wanting more detailed information on the programs available or simply wanting to talk to someone (anonymously if desired) should call in.

The host would acknowledge that it is not only vets, but also the wives, families, and friends of vets who must struggle with readjustment problems. He would then either give the names and phone numbers of appropriate places that offer help, or may instead introduce a veteran's wife who would establish herself as one who has gone through these problems and then give those names and phone numbers. (Perhaps a group of volunteer wives and family members might take calls on a second phone line.)

In closing, the host would give an address/phone number from which a complete list of programs mentioned in the followup could be obtained.

Nowhere in the followup would there be an attempt to comment on or analyze the content of FRANK. Nowhere would there be an attempt to postulate political, sociological, or psychological causes or ramifications of the adjustment problems of Frank in particular or the Vietnam veteran in general. The followup would function simply to offer needed falling time after FRANK and to quietly and reassuringly offer help to those who may need it.

The response to FRANK is heartening. The prevailing sense from Vietnam Vets and the community in general has been one of gratitude for the program itself and to 'GBH for providing the follow-up support service.

I ordered 30 phones but more people could have been serviced if we had utilized the full compliment of 50 phones. Immediately following the broadcast 302 calls were taken. This is an estimate because everyone was so busy answering the phones that some calls went unrecorded. For 2 days following the broadcast the Viet Vet Centers in Boston, Brighton and Brockton averaged 40 calls each pot day in direct response to the program. The centers are also averaging 7-10 drop-ins per day in response to FRANK. On Tuesday morning (5/26) I took 6 calls in \$\frac{1}{2}\$ hour on the 492-1111 number before it was disconnected. One wonders what happened to the people who called after the phones were disconnected. Hopefully they tried the Vet centers.

The switchboard and Audience Services report no calls in the days following FRANK. This indicates that the follow-up and the connected services provided did it's job - the Vets are using the appropriate channels for help. We have received 5 letters to date, 4 pro and one con, asking for equal time. We have received two requests for transcripts.

Following is a breakdown of the phone calls:

Out of the 308 calls eleven were against the broadcast. All of the con calls were from Vets who felt that the portrayal of FRANK was stereotypical - "Not all VETS are like that." There were 93 calls applauding the program. We received 19 calls from women. There were 204 calls for immediate and/or referral service. 4 VETS called in threatening suicide. They are now receiving help from the VET Centers & professional counselors. One call was from a lawyer seeking back-up info for his client who is incarcerated for 20 years - life & seeking an appeal on delayed stress syndrom grounds.

In addition to the 4 potential suicides previously mentioned, one VET came into the station and sat with us throught the night. This VET contacted us three weeks prior to the broadcast of FRANK. Audience services referred his letter to me. The letter was accompanied by the VET's complete psychological evaluation, his poetry & article on Agent Orange, delayed stress, nightmare and suicide studies. All of the material suggested that he was suicidal, though there was no outright threat. However, Rick Stahl who is a VET counselor at U. Mass. and the VET we used in the follow-up received the same information along with an actual suicide threat. Rick and &1worked with the VET, his psychiatrist and the psychiatrist we used as a consultant for FRANK. On Memorial Day the VET called Rick and again threatened suicide. Rick told him we would be at the station at 7:00 and he was welcome to come and stay with us. I don't know how much good we did but at least the VET knows we cared enough to try to help. We have since gotten the VET job counseling and we have gotten the VA board to review his case with an eye to upgrading his discharge and benefits.

Several VETS and one woman called to volunteer to talk with troubled VETS and their families. One group of Jamaica Plain VETS called to volunteer for the Auction as a way of saying 'Thank You' to 'GBH for airing FRANK.

A Connecticut VET called to get information on how to set up a VET outreach program in New London.

Another VET called wanting to contribute money.

Parents Against the Draft called to lend their support.

A VET program called requesting a cassette of FRANK for use in their therapy groups.

Frank came into the station the night of the broadcast. He wanted to thank everyone personally for coming together to

make the follow-up possible. Frank stayed for a short time and then left. He was unsure of what people's reaction would be to him after the broadcast. When it became clear that the over-whelming response was positive we called FRANK and he returned to the station. The fact that he returned was a triumphant moment for all concerned.

Eight staff members and the producers of FRANK acted as facilitators for the follow-up call-in. Their help was much appreciated and needed. Most of us wound up taking calls because the phone reponse was so great.

After Auction is over I plan to get the VETS back together. There are many ways that the follow-up process can be streamlined and the VETS input is essential.

These this all points to is the absolute need for a follow-up. When FRANK is broadcast nationally I think it must be every station's responsibility to provide support services to their communities immediately following the broadcast and back-up support in the days following. Henry mentioned yesterday in Executive Staff that Lewis Feeedman would be coming to Boston next week. Can we enlist CPB's economic support to defray the per station cost of a follow-up program and all that it would entail?
