SENATORS URGE BALANCED PROGRESS IN THE HELSINKI PROCESS

WASHINGTON, DC, September 23, 1986 -- Senators Charles E. Grassley and Dennis DeConcini, co-founders of the IPG in the U.S. Senate, today welcomed the final agreement reached by the 35 signatory states to the Helsinki Final Act at the Stockholm Conference on Confidence and Security-building Measures and Disarmament in Europe, but urged equal progress be made in the human rights areas of the ongoing Helsinki process. Their statements came on the opening day of the Preparatory Meeting for the Vienna Review Conference of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) which convenes November 4, 1986.

The Stockholm Conference, one of a series of meetings mandated by the Madrid CSCE Review Conference (1980-83), reached an accord aimed at reducing the chance of an accidental war in Europe through a system of notification, observation and verification of major troop movements.

Senator Grassley stated, "The Stockholm accord is an important step forward in arms control and East-West relations; at the same time, the mandate of the Madrid Concluding Document called for balanced progress in all sections of the Helsinki Final Act. To date, there has been no agreement reached at the CSCE Human Rights Experts Meetings in Ottawa (May-June 1985), Budapest (November 1985) or Bern (May 1986). As such, there is an imbalance between progress in improving the implementation of the security and human rights standards of the Helsinki Final Act."

Senator DeConcini noted, "It is essential that progress in the military/security area is accompanied by similar progress in the human rights field. The 35 signatories to the Final Act must bear this in mind at the upcoming Vienna Review Conference."

The Vienna CSCE Review Conference will review implementation of the Helsinki Final Act by signatory states (the United States, the Soviet Union and all of Eastern and Western Europe with the exception of Albania) since the Madrid CSCE Review Conference.

The International Parliamentary Group for Human Rights in the Soviet Union (IPG) is a planning and coordinating body of 700 parliamentarians in the United States, Canada, Western Europe and other countries who are committed to increasing public awareness of the human rights situation in the USSR. The purpose of IPG is to establish a multinational system to monitor Soviet human rights performance and respond immediately to human rights abuses. IPG's Chairman is Senator Charles E. Grassley; its Vice-Chairman is Senator Dennis DeConcini. Rita E. Hauser serves as Chairman of the IPG International Advisory Board. Stuart Eizenstat is Legal Counsel to IPG.

The following are suggested points which would be appropriate to include in the President's address on Monday. Of course, this is not an exhaustive list, but it may give you some ideas should you want to have RR make reference to some of the types of people who will be in the audience, and their major concerns.

Arms Control

- -- Reaffirm RR commitment to SDI. RR could make reference to SDI supporters in audience.
- -- RR restates opposition to freeze, stating that we now have real chance at reductions, not just freeze.
- -- Condemn House CR actions on; SDI, nuclear testing, SALT II limits, chemical weapons, ASAT

Regional Issues

- -- Reaffirm RR commitment to freedom fighters.
- -- RR could make reference to Afghanistanian, Cambodian and Vietnamese refugees (now U.S. citizens) in the audience.

Bilateral Issues

- -- U.S. supports people-to-people exchanges such as the recently concluded Chautauqua conference in Latvia, where both sides are free to discuss U.S./Soviet differences openly. In the audience today we have individuals who participated at that conference, and they can testify to the benefits of this ground-breaking event.
- -- U.S. will ask for liberalization of emigration for those who wish to leave U.S.S.R., especially Soviet Jews
- -- RR should make appeal for reunification of families on humanitarian grounds. Perhaps reference to 6 year old

Kaisa Randperre, a little Estonian girl whom the Soviet refuse to reunite with her parents currently living in Sweden. (RR has received alot of mail on this case.)

-- U.S. will protest reluctance of Soviet officials to warn the people of Ukraine, Byelorussia and other parts of the Soviet Union, as well as the countries of both Eastern and Western Europe of the dangers of the Chernobyl disaster.

Human Rights

- -- U.S. will ask for release of political prisoners, and granting of permission for them to leave if they so wish. Orlov is a good first step.
- -- U.S. will call for the end of the persecution of Sakharov.
- -- U.S. will protest persecution of Catholics in Lithuania, Jews, Moslems, Lutherans, Baptists and Orthodox throughout the Soviet Union.

SUGGESTIONS FOR PUBLIC OUTREACH FOR ICELAND MEETING October 1986

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Background: The President's announcement of the Iceland meeting with Gorbachev surprised the general public, including to key constituencies which have special interest in U.S./Soviet relations. While they believe the President will stand firmly on his four part agenda, they seek reassurances that the meeting will not turn in favor of the Soviets. This is especially true in light of the manner in which the Daniloff case was resolved, an outcome which they believe came as a result of the U.S. bending to Soviet pressures.

A series of meeting, one each day before the President's departure, would:

- 1. provide the President an opportunity to reassure human rights, ethnic and national defense groups, thereby gaining their understanding and support
- 2. provide media forums for the President to accentuate the four parts of the U.S. agenda
- be an indication to the Soviets that the President is coming to Iceland with the support of the American people
- 4. publically accentuate the contrast between the way in which a national consensus is brought together in the U.S. and the U.S.S.R.
