





Representative Gene Taylor has forwarded your letter to President Reagan. The President understands the difficulties that result from the prevailing interest rates. He has asked me to reassure you that he is taking the steps within his power to bring them under control.

As the President mentioned in his September 24 address to the American people, however, interest rates will not decline substantially until the Federal government is not competing for investment dollars in the capital markets. The Program for Economic Recovery has begun the steps toward a balanced budget that will enable a reduction in interest rates in the future.
