Dear Mr. President:

We would like to express our concern about Mr. Kim Dae Jung and his co-defendants and to respectfully urge you to make this concern -- and your own -- known to South Korean President Chun Doo Hwan when he visits the White House on February 2nd.

In light of your past expressions of concern about Mr. Kim, we anticipate that you will encourage Mr. Chun to pardon Mr. Kim and other leaders of the democratic opposition in South Korea. Anything less will be construed as an endorsement of the gross miscarriage of justice that has been carried out in South Korea.

We deplore the repression of the Chun government which has perpetrated military violence, torture, death sentences and long prison terms for some of the country's prominent opposition leaders. Mr. Kim's trial symbolizes a travesty of justice for the Korean people, and the brutality of the Chun Doo Hwan regime has alienated many Koreans. If the new U.S. Administration does not make our country's concerns unequivocally clear, we fear that anti-American sentiment in Korea will grow, making it difficult for the U.S. to carry out our defense and security commitments there.

We urge you to convey these concerns to Mr. Chun at the time of his visit here.
